## Pastor's Pen

### The Extraordinary in the Ordinary

*When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him "Teacher." **John 20:14-16***

When you read the accounts of Jesus appearing to his disciples, including the women who were among his closest followers, you cannot help but notice the strangeness of the stories. Jesus finds his way into locked rooms. He appears suddenly and is gone just as quickly and mysteriously. Among the remarkable and somewhat baffling features of some of these stories is that those who knew Jesus best don't recognize him right away.

Here, in John's gospel, Mary hears Jesus, but apparently does not recognize his voice. She looks at him and supposes him to be the gardener. How odd. It is when Jesus calls her by name, "Mary," that she recognizes him.

Rather than simply odd features of the stories of Jesus post-resurrection appearances, these mysterious details may have something important to say to us about our lives as followers of Jesus today.

Where do we find Jesus in our lives today? Traditional answers may include: during worship, studying the Scriptures, during prayer. We may say that we find Jesus in ecstatic or mystical kinds of experiences, if we have them. What if the risen Christ is as likely to be encountered in some of the ordinary events of our day, if only we can see with fresh eyes? Might we see something of Jesus in the people we meet every day? What if every person has something of the light of Jesus inside her or him? Maybe we only see this as we open ourselves to others, to their stories. Maybe we only see this as

## Church council approves moving forward with capital campaign

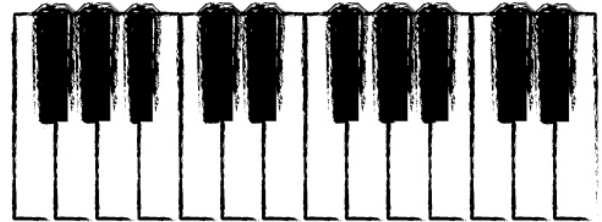
Following a thoughtful discussion, the church council voted March 10 to enter into an agreement with the Minnesota United Methodist Foundation to conduct a capital campaign. Val Walker, Executive Director of the Foundation, will be our chief campaign consultant.

The proceeds from the sale of the Chester Park UMC church building and another recent significant bequest give us a unique opportunity, as we near the fiftieth anniversary of our ministry here at the Coppertop on the Skyline, to do some necessary work for our next fifty years of ministry.

We anticipate kicking off the campaign on Sunday, April 12 and concluding with a commitment Sunday celebration on May 17. While more information will be coming to you soon, it is never too early to ask for your prayers for this campaign and for the ongoing ministry of our congregation.

## From the Parish Nurse: Water is Life

This month I will be volunteering at the third and fourth grade health fair, being held in the Social Hall during the week of April 20. My partner and I will be responsible for the International Health Awareness area so I thought it would be good to talk about the importance of clean water and access to it.

Every March 22 is United Nations World Water Day. This day marks the need for new infrastructure to help ensure efficient delivery and access to clean and safe water as water demands continue to grow across the globe.

While clean water is essential for a healthy human life, 1.1 billion people lack access to water. By 2025, it's anticipated that two-thirds of the world's population may be facing water shortages.

Water is at the core of sustainable development. Water resources, and the range of services they provide, form the basis of poverty reduction, economic growth, and environmental sustainability. From food and energy security to human and environmental health, water contributes to improvements in social well-being, affecting the livelihoods of billions.

Each American uses 7,500 liters of water per day—mostly for food. One liter of water is needed to irrigate one food calorie. Inefficient water use can mean 100 liters are used to produce one calorie. Irrigation takes up to 90% of water withdrawn in some developing countries. Globally, agriculture is the largest user of water, accounting for 70% of the total withdrawal.

Pressure on fresh water sources will continue to increase as we face climate change, increased urbanization, increased food production needs, increased need for energy. Our current practices for energy production, and food production are unsustainable.

Please take time to think how precious our water is and what can be done to keep it as clean as possible. *Linda Wiig, Parish Nurse*

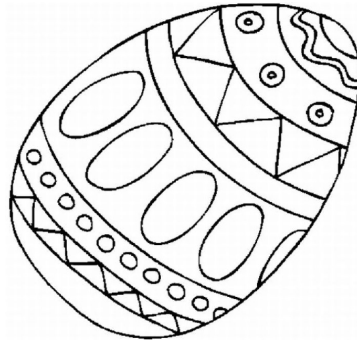

## The Steve O'Neil Apartments

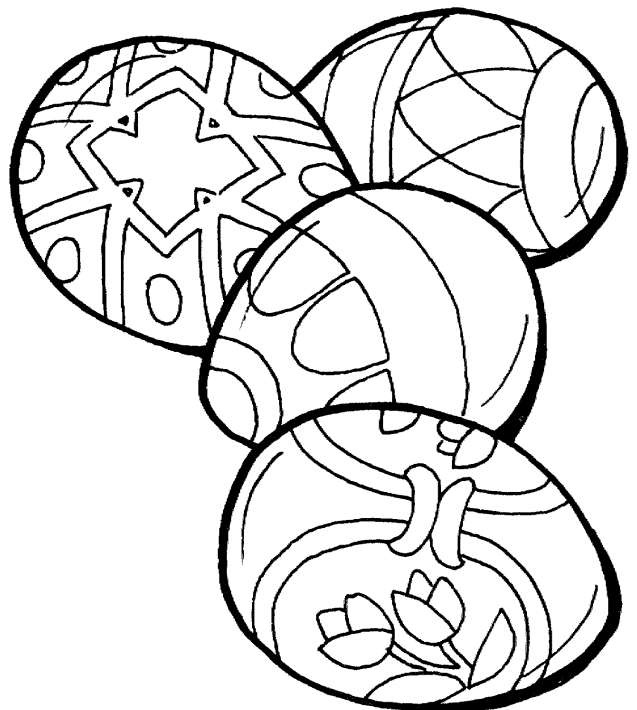
The Steve O'Neil Apartments have begun to provide housing for families who have otherwise experienced homelessness.
