

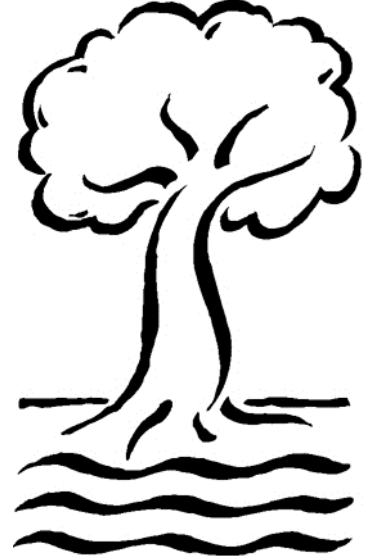

Two streams, one river, at one year

It's been a year and more since Chester Park and First United Methodist churches merged to form a new First United Methodist Church in a process described as "two streams, one river." Progress to report includes a 14% increase in membership, an 11% increase in worship attendance with a companion increase in visitors, along with new members on committees and in choirs and many more people involved in worship leadership and volunteer opportunities.



Yet that's only part of the story. "One thing that's not captured in these numbers is the spirit of the place," said Geoff Bell, a CPUMC and new FUMC member who has joined the adult bell choir and frequently serves as a reader in worship. "I for one feel very much at home at FUMC, and the move for me personally has been very good. I've made several new friends, and the move has helped Duluth feel more like home than it ever has."

From the FUMC side, Sarah Maddy affirms, "Our members with roots in Chester Park have brought along a strong spirit of embracing challenge. Bold fundraising ideas have sparked new energy in FUMC volunteers. People are helping out and having a good time doing it. The can-do, everybody-pitch-in attitude of a small congregation has helped expand the way we think about what is possible."

Large on the list of expanded possibilities are the Roast Beef Dinners, a long-time tradition at Chester Park. In their new home, the spring and fall dinners raised over \$8,000 for church ministries, and involved an astonishing 300+ volunteers.

A new mission committee, a Christmas reception after church, and an Easter prayer vigil from Maundy Thursday through Good Friday are among other new endeavors sparked by members coming from Chester

'Intelligent, critical reading'

Every part of Scripture is God-breathed and useful one way or another – showing us truth, exposing our rebellion, correcting our mistakes, training us to live God's way. Through the Word we are put together and shaped up for the tasks God has for us.

II Timothy 3:16-17, *The Message*

In our meditation we ponder the chosen texts on the strength of the promise that it has something utterly personal to say to us for this day and for our Christian life.

Dietrich Bonhoeffer, *Life Together*, 82

In my summer sermon series on "Sticky Scriptures" we have tackled some challenging subjects. How can we make sense of the Bible at all? Does it have to be interpreted literally? Did God, in essence, write every word? How do we try and distinguish the human element in the Bible? How do we distinguish the metaphorical, symbolic, mythic? Why do bad things happen to good people? Why do we pay so much attention to the two verses in Leviticus supposedly about homosexuality, ignore most of the rest of the book, and miss what is most important in it? What do we do with all those passages where God is violent? What about Revelation – the book?

My underlying approach has been to see the Bible as both inspired by God (God-breathed) and as a human work written by people at a particular time, in a particular culture, with particular worldviews influenced by time and culture.

The Bible requires intelligent, critical reading. I asserted in the first sticky Scripture sermon that we might get less stuck if our reading kept in mind certain principles: (1) admit that the Bible can be difficult and problematic; (2) hold together the ideas that the Bible is Spirit-inspired and human; (3) read the parts of the Bible in light of the whole story being told in its pages; (4) remember that for Christians, Jesus is the center of that story.

Along with intelligent, critical reading of the Bible, we also read with a faith that God still speaks to us through the pages and words of this book, this collection of books. We read trusting a promise that these texts have something utterly personal to say to us for our daily lives as followers of Jesus.

I trust that. When I read I bring the fullness of my mind to what I read. Questions arise to be considered and thought through. On the other

Raising Money the No-Bake Way

How would you like to help raise money for the church budget without cooking or baking, spending hours at the church, or selling something to friends, family and neighbors—all while helping the environment?

New Page paper here in Duluth offers a program that will allow us to do exactly that by collecting and recycling qualifying shiny paper (magazines, catalogs, advertising circulars or plain white office paper).

Think of it this way...

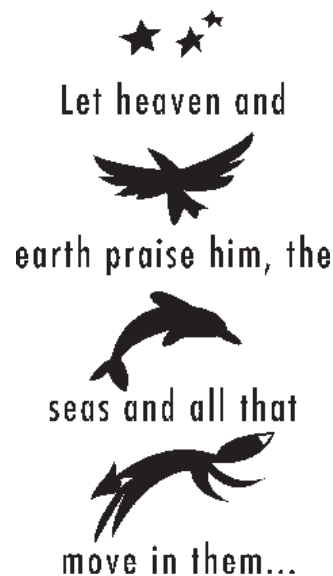
If 100 households here at FUMC were to participate and collect one grocery-sized paper bag per household each month—about 20 pounds—that would generate 2,000 pounds per month, or 24,000 pounds per year. At 10¢ per pound, that would generate \$200 per month, or \$2,400 per year!

Now some households may collect more than 20 pounds a month, and during the “sales” season from November through the January white sales most households will collect more. This means we might be able to bring in \$2,800 from our congregation alone.

Then if some FUMC families help family, friends, and neighbors recycle by collecting their shiny paper and bringing it to a recycling program here, we may be able to raise \$3,000 or more a year—the equivalent of one Roast Beef Dinner.

Wondering how much your household would collect? Just take a grocery bag and put it next to your trash/recycling containers at home and see how long it takes you to fill it. You may be surprised.

If your household would be interested in participating in this painless and environmentally friendly fundraiser, please let the office know. We want to be sure we have sufficient interest to make this program a worthwhile endeavor for the volunteers who will be involved.

Park. In addition, many new art pieces and banners have been added that were memorials at CPUMC.

“I think the former CPUMC folks really like being a part of FUMC and that we are ready, willing and appreciative to be able to contribute to and participate in the life of FUMC,” reports Steve Hansen. “I share the wonderful experiences I have enjoyed at FUMC with the people I come in contact with outside of church.”

Says Rev. David Bard, “I appreciate how often folks from CPUMC have expressed appreciation for the welcome they have received and how at home they now feel. I would also want to note that this merger has energized many long-time members of First UMC. There is a spirit and energy here that is quite wonderful. It continues to be a joy to be part of the new First UMC.”

Meanwhile, back at the ranch, the CPUMC building has been rented to a small congregation called New Hope Bible Church. This congregation took care of snow removal and lawn care. A water pipe break this past winter caused damage on two floors that has been repaired and was covered by insurance after a \$1000 deductible. A conditional purchase offer has been made by a potential buyer, while the asking price has decreased from \$325,000 to \$295,000.

Cindy Hedlund, an active member of CPUMC and now of the new First UMC, collected much of this information. She concludes, “The spirit of God is strong. Praise God!”

Docs: 'Monster' drinks not safe for children or teens

Does your child or teenager drink energy drinks? The FDA considers caffeine a drug, and the amount of caffeine in these highly caffeinated drinks is too much for kids.

The daily maximum for caffeine is 100mg for teens, while a 16-ounce can of an energy drink may contain 160mg. Soda is capped at 71 mg per 12-oz can, but energy drinks are not regulated—there is no limit on the amount of caffeine that they can contain. Younger children should consume even less caffeine, yet a significant number of calls to poison control over energy drinks are for kids under 6 years of age.

According to the American Academy of Pediatrics, "Energy drinks pose potential health risks because of the stimulants they contain, and should never be consumed by children or adolescents."

August is Immunization Month. It is important that all children be vaccinated against diseases, especially those under 6. Do you know what shots your child needs? Do you have their record available? And us adults we need vaccinations, too, including a tetanus and diphtheria booster every 10 years. Check out the CDC's website on vaccinations, where you will find a plethora of information about childhood and adult vaccines.

HPV (human papilloma virus) vaccine is relatively new. It is highly recommended that all girls and boys receive this vaccine by the age of 11 or 12 because this vaccine provides better protection in preteens. If your child is older and has not begun the series of three shots (given over six months), immunization is still recommended, up to age 26 for females and 21 for males. This vaccine can prevent cancers and other maladies from the virus.

Another opportunity to **donate blood** will arrive on August 20 from 3 to 6pm. Please sign up after church or call the office at 727-5021. For every pint of blood donated, a one-pound donation of food will be given to the food shelf. Have a safe and enjoyable August! As the proverb says, Kind words are like honey—enjoyable and healthful.

Kids can apply for music scholarship

Young musicians age 12 to 18 are invited to apply for a scholarship to cover lessons, music books, and related expenses such as reeds, rosin, strings, or organ shoes.

The \$350 scholarships were established in honor of Carol Donahue upon her retirement last year from 25 years as FUMC organist.

Conditions of the scholarship are generous. Young musicians do not have to be members of FUMC or demonstrate financial need, and auditions and interviews are more of a progress report than a deciding factor. They are asked to be "serious and enthusiastic."
