Lent: Prayer and pondering

It seems that we just put away the Christmas decorations, and now we are thinking about Easter, as the season of Lent, the forty-day church season before Easter, is just around the corner. Time goes so quickly.

With the rushing currents of time come the experiences of life, joyous and celebratory, disappointing and painful. In the title of a newly released CD, we experience "What a Terrible World, What a Beautiful World." This summer I heard someone describe the world as a place of "beautality," a combination of beauty and brutality.

Many of us are fortunate not to experience some of the worst brutalities of the world, things we see on the evening news, places of destitution, grinding poverty, daily violence. Yet we are not immune from pain, disappointment, and heartache. Nor do we miss out on beauty, grace, and love.

So where is God in all of this? We will be asking that question together in Lent. Where is God? We will turn that question over a bit and also ask, "What might God alone see in our lives and in our world, that God invites us to see so that we might live differently?"

Here are some of my hopes for this upcoming Lenten season:

I hope we will all find some additional time to pray, deepening our relationship with God in Jesus Christ and connecting us more deeply with those for whom we pray.

I hope we will all find some additional time for pondering the presence of God in our lives and our world. Where is God? What does God see that God invites us to see, too? Some of that pondering time might be at Sunday Faith Forums.

I hope one of those pondering times will be Saturday morning February 21 as Joetta Schlabach shares with us ideas about being the church in the midst of cultural conflict.

I also hope that you will both pray and ponder about First UMC. What does God see for our life together? Is this the time when we need to embark on a capital campaign, preparing ourselves for the next fifty years of ministry here on the skyline? What other things continued next page

Choirs to perform 'Gospel Mass'

On Sunday, February 8, our Sanctuary Choir and the Northwestern High School Chamber Choir will present a concert featuring Robert Ray's "Gospel Mass." The 3 pm concert is the third in the 2014-2015 Music at the Coppertop concert series.

Robert Ray composed "Gospel Mass" in 1978 when he was a liturgy team member of the National Office of Black Catholics. He intended it for a one-time performance, but the piece caught on and is now a standard part of the choral repertoire performed by choirs all over the world. The work combines the words from the traditional Catholic Mass with the harmony and rhythm of contemporary African-American music.

In addition, each choir will perform selected repertoire focusing on spirituals and gospel music. Michael Goodlet will conduct the performance. A free-will offering will be taken.

Transition to College

FUMC to host dinner for graduating seniors and their families

High school seniors, parents, and staff are invited by the Minnesota Conference of The United Methodist Church to come together for a meal and involve themselves in a conversation about the transition to college.

These dinners, being held around the state, are a time to discuss next steps for high school seniors heading in the college direction.

One dinner will be held at our church on Thursday, February 12 at 6 pm.

Participants will be divided into one of three groups: Parents and guardians will discuss how to help their students transition to the next step of their lives while they are away at college; staff will discuss best practices regarding graduation ceremonies and supporting students once they leave for college; and the students themselves will have a chance to meet other college students and ask questions and think through what this transition will be like.

There is no cost for this program, and Minnesota UMC churches are encouraged to bring all their high school graduating seniors to these events. We'll collect names and information about where students are headed and giving them gifts from the conference.

Health Notes: How's your heart?

February is Heart Health Awareness month so here is a little information for you to read. All information shared here is from the American Heart Association.

Much evidence now shows that we can stave off heart disease, which is the No. 1 killer of Americans, and can also help you avoid stroke, the No. 5 killer. You probably know, some of those steps: don't smoke, eat a health diet, and stay active. Research is also showing that non-smokers, healthy eaters, and routine exercisers stay ahead in avoiding cognitive decline such as dementia and Alzheimer's.

Recently a report on aspirin findings show that aspirin is an effective and important treatment to prevent a heart attack or stroke in someone who has a history of heart disease or stroke," said Mark Creager, M.D., president-elect of the American Heart Association and director of the Vascular Center at Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston. "That's not the case for the healthy person

who's at low risk for these events."

Research shows that among heart attack survivors, regular aspirin use can reduce the risk of a second heart attack, stroke, or cardiovascular-related death by about 25 percent. For stroke survivors, it lowers the risk of a second event by about 22 percent.

A new study presented last November at the AHA's Scientific Sessions 2014 and published in the *New England Journal of Medicine*, found that long-term use of aspirin plus a second anti-clotting medication cut the risk of having a heart attack by more than half in people who had received a stent.

If you have questions about whether to take aspirin ask your health provider about your risk of heart attack or stroke, ask whether you would benefit from taking aspirin, ask if it would interfere with other medications that you are taking, and ask about side effects.

Help yourself to the bright pink sheets of paper on the Welcome center to remind you of the stroke and heart attack warning signs.
