# Let it shine!

In two weeks, on November 13, 2016, we will mark the 50th anniversary of the Coppertop, our home on the Skyline. But the story of how we got here starts well before November 13, 1966.

As early as 1946, a Future Building Committee was formed to address major problems with the old church at 3rd Street and 3rd Avenue West. Built in 1893, the impressive brownstone building had a beautiful cherrywood interior and could seat 2,200. But it was a church designed to be walked to, and as the congregation moved farther out and up the hill, parking became an issue. At first the committee looked at options for renovations and off-street parking, but it soon became clear that just bringing it up to code and doing absolutely necessary repairs would cost over half a million dollars.

The focus switched to building, and a long search began for a site in keeping with the church's commitment to the downtown area. In 1959 a group of 25 members bid on a seven-acre site on Skyline Drive, which had been held in conservation by St. Louis County, and donated it to the congregation. The congregation accepted the challenge, and a million-dollar building drive began, spearheaded by four millionaires then in our congregation, including two Congdons.

Another big piece of the pie came from the women of the UMW, who pledged an astonishing \$10,000. They held monthly luncheons of great appeal to downtown workers, and met, then exceeded their goal. At the groundbreaking, UMW president Lee Ball suggested that the foundation of the new building was built on meatballs.

As the money came in from the UMW and others, it was invested at 4% interest. By April 1963 pledges totaled \$560,000. Bids were opened on 1964, building proceeded on schedule, and the cornerstone was laid on October 9, 1966.

We'll mark our anniversary on November 13 with a spectacular celebratory worship service and program attended by several former pastors, and a program where Bishop David Bard will be the featured speaker. And you're invited to a catered luncheon. On the menu—meatballs, of course (vegetarian and gluten-free options provided).

# **RB Dinner: Cindy says 'thanks'**

To the Supporters and Volunteers of the Fall Roast Beef Dinner: THANK YOU!

The beef was consumed by 900 guests in 2 ½ hours, 500 in the drive through and 400 in the dine in. This ties the number of last fall, our largest ever. We closed the drive through 30 minutes early because we only had beef scraps left.

Thank you to all of you--all 153 volunteers who worked the cookie day, the pie day, and the dinner day, plus the prayer crew. This is another record-breaking number.

We had ten international students from Marshall School helping us as they receive community service hours for working with nonprofits.

The cost of the beef was 20¢ less per pound than last spring. We are hoping to have around \$5,000 for our church ministries, which is the same as last spring.

What is priceless is the community enthusiasm and the outreach we all experience. I thank God every day for all of you and your gifts you so graciously give to the church community. Thank you and bless you!

# Help for caregivers

Greetings! Here it is November and I would like to let you know that this month among other items focuses on National Family Caregivers.

Did you know that family and friends provide the majority of support needed by older Minnesotans? Only 10% of Minnesota's long-term care is provided in facilities. This unpaid care is valued at \$8.2 billion in Minnesota alone.

"Caregiving" is simply helping another person who needs care or support due to a chronic condition or disability. Caregiving can come on suddenly or gradually and either can cause a heightened amount of stress. There are resources available to help.

Our Arrowhead Agency on Aging is a great resource at 218-722-5545 or 800-232-0707. They have a staff of counselors, aging services planners, a community living specialist, health promotion activities, and other support staff.

If you are an older adult and need help or you are a family member or friend wanting information to help care for an individual, the Senior Linkage Line at 1-800-333-2433 can answer your questions and help you find resources too.

• **Caregiver education** and training can help you acquire new information and skills to care for yourself and others. This training is called Powerful Tools for Caregivers which can give you skills to take better care of yourself as well as the one you care for. Call 218-529-7531 for info.

• A caregiver consultant can help you assess your situation, set goals, and develop an individualized plan so you can live your own life while caring for another person.

• **Support groups** can help you find emotional support as you share your experiences with other family caregivers.

• **Other services and supports** such as meals, home modification and emergency response systems can make your caregiving easier.

A new service called "Age Well Arrowhead" can provide services such as snow shoveling, light home maintenance, grocery shopping, visiting, and local transport. This agency serves Duluth, Proctor and Hermantown. For information you may contact Becky Perrett at 218-481-3150.

The Welcome Center will have flyers that include further information about this topic.

Let us remember that God is our ultimate resource, whom we can choose to call on to forgive, to deliver, to give strength, and to provide hope.
