The Trustees have reviewed funds available for the coming 2016 Summer construction season and have approved bids from Jamar Co. for the remaining roof work. They are reviewing final recommendations for the Upper Sanctuary windows. Our pledged funds and those received show that tuckpointing could proceed in 2017.

Music Notes: New on the job

New Assistant Organists

We are fortunate to have many young people in our congregation who are willing to share their musical talents with us. I am particularly pleased that two of them – Parker Hinnenkamp and Joshua Peterson – are studying the organ.

Over the past several years, we have heard Parker and Josh play the organ in our worship services and watched them steadily improve in their playing abilities. They have now agreed to take on a more formal role at our church as Assistant Organists, a position filled by Dick Peterson for many years.

I asked Josh and Parker to write a short biography about themselves and their interest in the organ. Here's what they said:

Joshua Peterson: I am a junior at Duluth East High School and have been studying organ for four years with Velda Bell. I am also a violist and play in orchestra at school as well as with the DSSO's Youth Symphony where I have been the principal violist for two years. Outside of music, I enjoy freestyle skiing in the winter, I golf and caddy in the summer, and I enjoy running year round. My favorite aspect of organ playing is having a tremendous amount of sound right at your fingertips. I have always been interested in orchestral music, so I especially enjoy playing organ arrangements of orchestral works. Playing these arrangements is essentially like having an orchestra right under your fingertips.

Parker Hinnenkamp: I am a senior at Hermantown High School, and I've been studying organ under Carol Donahue consistently since October of 2013. I also play in Strikepoint, sing in three choirs (including a select vocal jazz ensemble) at school, and do a lot of teaching. I help teach kindergarten at school with Connie Adamec and I sometimes can be seen conducting rehearsals for 6th, 7th, 8th, and 9th grade choirs. Outside of music, I am an Eagle Scout, and I enjoy being a part of the school's drama club. I quite enjoy working on the organ for many reasons, but I absolutely love the uniqueness, grandeur, and history of the instrument. Compared to a piano, the organ has such a more diverse range of styles and sounds. Plus, where else can you play an instrument with your hands AND feet?!

To Your Health: Water Is Life

Water is life's most basic need. Access to clean water and sanitation is a basic human right, but many choose to ignore and take it for granted. Water affects everything—education, health, jobs, animals, our earth's balance. According to World Water Day information, contaminated water kills more children than malaria, AIDS, and wars combined.

Pollution, agriculture, and industry despoil and deplete water. Take, for example, a Coca Cola plant in India. The company is pumping out more ground water than can be naturally restored. Farmers in proximity to the plant are going without; their wells running dry. Why do governments allow companies to do such a disservice to their own citizens?

Maude Barlow has written a book called *Blue Gold*. She makes the point that one third of the world is experiencing water stress and in 45 years over **half** the world's population will experience water stress. Water is being bought and traded by private entities such as big transnational corporations and governments. Those who can pay for water will have it and those who cannot will have none. Isn't water a basic human right as well as the right of animals and plants?

The Minnesota Department of Health has standards and safeguards in place to help ensure safe drinking water for our state residents. These safeguards include Prevention, Monitoring, Education, and Treatment.

People with home wells should have their water tested for contaminants.

Did you know the Safe Water Drinking Act does not cover bottled water?

Testing for lead is individual and not routinely performed since lead contamination occurs with infrastructure such as water mains and pipes leading to homes. According to the 2014 Annual Drinking Water Report, Minnesota needs an estimated 7.4 billion dollars in the next 20 years to upgrade its infrastructure for water.

According to the EPA it costs upwards of 10 to 30 times more money to clean up contaminated water wells that supply communities than it does to protect them.

Protecting our water drinking *sources* makes much more sense economically as well as for the health of people and the environment. Ultimately it is up to each one of us to not take our water safety for granted.
