## Advent and Christmas at FUMC

"Walking Lightly" is our theme for Advent this year, and it has nothing to do with sneaking around trying to hide gifts from family members.

Advent is the church season where we anticipate new light coming into the world. We believe that the light of God's love shone particularly brightly in Jesus, and that we are called, as followers of Jesus, to walk in the light.

On December 1 we will consider how we walk lightly in our personal lives, and on December 15 we will consider what walking might mean for how we seek to shape our world.



On December 8 we will celebrate the light that our children and youth bring to our community with their Christmas program. December 22 we will celebrate with a choir cantata.

During the Advent Season, please also watch for a letter from the church offering an opportunity to give a special gift to the ministry of our church and to other important ministries in our community and the world.

#### Pastor's Pen

## In Jesus, a mirror and a window

Gift giving is a tradition of the Christmas season. For all the excesses and anxieties of this tradition, there are wonderful intentions behind it. We give in celebration of the birth of Jesus, the Christ child. We recall the story of those who came to him bearing gifts. We give to others because Jesus as the Christ is a gift of God to the world – a unique and special gift. We understand that God gives God's very self in a unique way in Jesus.

As I was thinking about this gift-giving tradition, though, it strikes me that I remember few specifics of the things I have been given at Christmas. What I remember most are the times shared with family and with friends – songs sung, meals enjoyed together, traveling between churches when, as a pastor, I was responsible for Christmas Eve services in four different congregations. The intangibles of love seem to stick with us more deeply than the particular gifts that may also express love.

Two rather intangible yet real gifts that come to us through our faith in Jesus Christ are a mirror and a window, and obviously I speak metaphorically. In Jesus we are given a mirror in which to look at our hearts, our minds, our souls. Where are we loving? Where have we failed? Where are we struggling? Where are we growing? To be a Christian is to be willing to look inside and to open our lives to the Spirit of God we know in Jesus. I hope you find time in this busy season to welcome this gift of self-reflection.

In Jesus we are also given a window to look out at the world. This window of faith invites us to see beauty, wonder, and mystery. These long, dark nights allow us to see more stars, or to see them longer. There is beauty in the falling snow and the changing of the seasons. There is wonder in the way this season brings out so much good in so many.

The window of faith also invites us to see where the world is not yet God's dream for it – to see the violence, the hatred, the war, the poverty, the hunger, the abuse, and the degradation that still exist. We are invited to look at this not with discouragement, although we may be discouraged sometimes, but to look at this and re-commit ourselves to love's work in the world, the work Jesus embodied.

The greatest gift celebrated at Christmas is the gift of love. The message of Jesus the Christ is that before, above, and beyond anything else we are loved. Before, above, beyond anything else, you are loved. Before the mirror, before the window, you are loved. Receive that gift this Christmas. May it bless your new year.

# Let's have a healthy season

Flu season is upon us, so we'll need to take extra precautions to keep ourselves healthy during this holiday season and through the winter.

A flu shot is your first line of defense. Have you had yours yet? Don't wait too long, especially since we will be with more people soon. One option is that the St. Louis County Health Department will be offering free vaccinations at our

church December 19 during the Ruby's Pantry food distribution.

Since we live in the north, our vitamin D levels are not what they need to be unless we take a supplement. If our vitamin D levels are low it tends to decrease our immunity and make us more susceptible to the nasty virus, which promotes our contracting the flu.

What else can we do to help keep ourselves healthy?

Studies have shown that the simple act of washing hands at least four times per day, prior to meals, when you get home, and after using the bathroom can decrease gastrointestinal illness by 50%. Good hand washing includes washing the front and back of hands with soap and water for at least 30 seconds—abou as long as the "ABCD" song.

Two more important techniques are to cough or sneeze into your elbow, not your hand (the vampire sneeze), and to avoid the T Zone, the area that includes your eyes, nose, and mouth. Do not put your fingers into any of these areas, as germs spread easily through your mucous membranes.

Make your body as safe as you can by following these tips. Let's all have a happy, healthy season!
