### Capital Campaign, Annual Budget Report

Dear Friends,

On Sunday, November 22, we celebrated the success to date of our combined stewardship campaigns for the Annual Budget and the Capital Campaign for 2016-18.

We are happy to report a 3% increase in projected giving to the 2016 Annual Budget. The First Phase of our three-year "People, Place, Purpose, Promise for the Future" Capital Campaign concluded with \$400,842 in pledges from 105 members. We want to acknowledge again the \$40,000 additional contribution by the Memorial Committee from the McCarthy Fund.

If you have not yet pledged, you'll find pledge cards by the campaign bulletin board in the Narthex. Remember, no pledge or donation is too large or too small. All are critical to the continued mission of FUMC. Donations for this tax year must be made by December 31.

We will keep you informed about the Trustees' projects and the funding sources with updates in First Family or through the bulletin board by the Lower East Entrance.

Thank you to everyone who has helped on the steering committee and the visitation/information packet delivery committee and with the kick-off brunch. We extend a special thank you to Val Walker, our campaign consultant and former FUMC member.

### **Pastor's Pen**

### **Trusting in Peace, Goodwill**

It does not look or feel like Christmas as I pen this essay. In fact, today, for the first time in three days I can see the lake from my office. It has been obscured by fog for the past couple of days. Weather or not (slight pun intended), Advent is just around the corner, with Christmas in its wake.

I also write this in the days following the attack by the selfproclaimed Islamic State on the city of Paris. If foggy weather seems to make Christmas feel distant, mass shootings and suicide bombings have an even more devastating effect on the Christmas spirit.

Christmas is about peace on earth and good will. It is about hope, peace, joy, and love, symbolized by the Advent candles we light in preparation for our celebration of Christmas. The Paris bombings, suicide bombings in Beirut, killings by Boko Haram in Nigeria, are all reminders that our world is not peaceful.

That these incidents are part of a longer history of events makes hope seem ever more fragile. We weep in sorrow, rather than shed tears of joy. Love seems so weak in the face of such violence and hatred.

Retired United Methodist Bishop Will Willimon wrote recently that the job of Christian congregations is to "help people reflect on and interpret their lives in light of God's purpose in Jesus Christ." God's purpose, as we see it in the Christmas story, is peace on earth and good will. It is to come near in love. It is hope. It is joy.

The Christmas stories remind us that peace and good will are relevant even when the world is difficult. Jesus was born a Jew in a Palestine occupied by the Roman Empire. The gospels were all written following the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem in 70 CE. The Temple was destroyed by Roman armies as part of their response to a Jewish rebellion against Rome that had begun in 66 CE.

Jesus was born into a difficult world. The Christmas stories were told in very difficult times. Hope, peace, joy, and love are always relevant, even when they are difficult. God is always at work for

peace and good will, for hope, joy, and love. The road is not always straight and the path not always smooth, but if we are to understand our lives in light of God's purpose in Jesus Christ, then we trust that in the end peace and good will prevail, and that our lives have meaning insofar as they are filled with hope, peace, joy and love and insofar as they contribute to increasing them in the world.

In John's Christmas story, there are no shepherds or wise men, no manger. He provides only an image. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. (John 1:4-5)

Our lives are difficult sometimes – disappointing, filled with pain or grief, confusing. Our world is difficult, often painfully so. We trust that God's life and light in Jesus Christ, that peace and good will, will not be overcome, but instead will shine on. And we can help peace and good will shine.
