## Pastor's Pen

## Love Actually

Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.... And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three, and the greatest of these is love.

I Corinthians 13, NRSV

So chosen by God for this new life of love, dress in the wardrobe God picked out for you: compassion, kindness, humility, quiet strength, discipline. Be even-tempered, content with second place, quick to forgive an offense. Forgive as quickly and completely as the Master forgave you. And regardless of what else you put on, wear love. It's your basic all-purpose garment. Never be without it.

Colossians 3, The Message

February is a month when love is celebrated. Cards, chocolates, flowers, candlelight dinners are some of the ways people tell that special someone in their life just how much they mean to them. If that special person in your life is poetically inclined, they may pen a few well-chosen words in your honor.

The Apostle Paul wrote a fair amount, and wrote a fair amount about love. Passages from I Corinthians and Colossians, among others, are justly famous meditations on love. However, Paul did not write these words as a clergy person officiating at the wedding of his second cousin once removed. He wasn't writing for a wedding at all. Paul wrote his words about love to communities of people seeking to live the Jesus way. Paul was convinced that what should characterize these Jesus communities was love.

The kind of love Paul had in mind for these communities was not a warm feeling. It was a love that exhibited itself in patience, kindness, and gentleness. It is a love dressed as compassion, humility, quiet strength. It resists being envious, arrogant, rude, boastful. It is not irritable or resentful.

To live with such love is challenging, particularly when you consider that we don't get to choose all those with whom we are to have this loving relationship. That's right: in the Jesus community of the church, we are to love all those who come through our doors and pledge to live out their spiritual journey in our shared spiritual journey. God's Spirit brings the people (often through our invitation), and our task is to work together with them to build a loving community through which God will continue to love the world.

# CPS-3 meets, exceeds enrollment goal at 307,000

Remember hearing about Cancer Prevention Study 3? In December the study beat its national recruitment goal by enrolling more than 307,000 people – nearly 19,000 of those in its Midwest Division (MN, WI, IA, SD).

FUMC was involved in this project. Our Twin Ports CPS-3 enrolled 478 individuals.

Results from previous longterm follow-up studies have demonstrated the link between cigarette smoking and lung cancer and between cancer and physical inactivity, alcohol, nutrition, and medications like aspirin.

## Have a Health Happy Heart

**Blood Drive:** It's that time again! The Bloodmobile will be here February 18 for our next blood drive. The time has changed by a half-hour; it's now 3:30 to 6:30, so those of you who work later can now sign up for a 6:30 slot. They are especially looking for type O neg. so if you fit that category you are in demand! There will be a sign-up sheet in the church office and in the narthex after church.

Remember, one pint of blood can help to save three lives. Please consider donating, even if you have never done so. The 45-minute process runs smoothly and it's even quicker if you fill out your form on-line the day of your donation. A great perk after donating is that you can eat as many cookies and drink as much juice as you want.

As we all know **February** is heart month, but it's not just about Valentines. About 25% of the U.S. population has some form of cardiovascular disease. One in 6 men and one in 8 women age 45+ have had a heart attack or stroke.

Let's talk about sodium. As you know too much sodium can lead to high blood pressure, which could lead to heart attack and stroke. We Americans consume three to five times the recommended amount of sodium per day. The American Heart Association recommends 1,500 mg/day. Even one piece of bread can have 230 mg. of sodium per slice.

Most of our sodium comes from processed foods and restaurant food. Cold cuts and deli meats can have upwards of 1,000 mg of sodium. Those chicken nuggets also contain a lot of sodium, as do those pizzas that we love. Always remember to check labels and choose the lower sodium foods, and when we do eat these foods, eat in moderation. Put veggies on your pizzas instead of pepperoni!

Oh, let's mention sea salt, too. We see more and more products made with sea salt. It may have much less processing than our regular table salt, but it has just as much sodium. So sea salt is no substitute for regular table salt if you want to cut down your sodium intake.

Have a nice Valentine's Day, everyone, and may you be blessed with God's heart-healing peace. "A heart at peace gives life to the body" (Proverbs 14:30).
