FUMC, UMW help to sponsor Human Trafficking Awareness Month

January is Human Trafficking Awareness Month in Duluth, with events being held to raise awareness about girls being sold for sex.

According to the Department of Justice, the average age of girls when they're first sold for sex is between 12 and 14.

Duluth law enforcement agencies and victim advocates have formed a task force to reframe the issue as violence against women, instead of prostitution, and to create a coordinated response to trafficking. Recent reports have identified Duluth as a hub for sex trafficking and prostitution in Minnesota.

The community is encouraged to read *Girls Like Us* by Rachel Lloyd. The author will speak at Mitchell Auditorium on the College of St. Scholastica campus on Tuesday, January 28 at 7pm.

Teatro Zuccone Theatre will show two films, *What I Have Been Through is Not Who I Am* on January 16 and *Sex and Money* on January 24. There will also be community discussions and panels at various locations.

Both First United Methodist Church and our FUMC UMW are helping to sponsor these events.

Help your kids eat their fruits and vegetables

Greetings to everyone! Here it is January already and time for New Year's Resolutions. If you are looking for one, why not try to help your family eat more fruits and vegetables? I know I am going to make a concerted effort to do this. If you have young children, eating fruits and vegetables at each meal will get them into a daily habit that will carry on through life.

All types of fruit and veggies count: fresh, frozen, and canned without added sugar or salt. We as parents and adults need to model healthy eating so that our future adults will lead a healthier lifestyle when they've grown up.

A few years back when I was preparing one of our Wednesday night meals, I was cooking with another woman who said sbe put vegetables into sauces, soups, and breads to increase the veggies the children would get in their meal. That's a great way to help picky eaters improve their nutrition.

As children's tastes develop, we can make the same food even better by grilling, baking, roasting, boiling, steaming, or serving them raw. Textures are important to children, so the way the veggies are prepared can influence how they decide whether they will like them. Even talking about how a veggie is grown and its feel, smell, and crunch can make a difference.

Another tip to eating more veggies is to pick a veggie a week and feature it in different ways during the week. It may take up to 10 times of trying a food before a child decides h = h

definitely if he or she likes or doesn't like it.

Keep prepared veggies and fruits in the refrigerator ready for hungry children after school.

Begin looking at catalogs that feature seeds and plan a small garden for next summer. That will get the children excited to try different foods and have fun watching them grow.

Try cooking together sometimes. Children can also plan the meal and help do the shopping. Keep trying new foods—you may even want to designate a night as a NFN night (new food night)

If you buy juice make sure it's 100% juice and not a juice drink.

I hope in the new year you and your family can eat healthier and have a healthy year.
