I am writing this on a gloomy, rainy day. An unusually warm February day has led to rain. Snow is melting, but I know that spring is weeks away. All the water dripping everywhere will freeze, and in the meantime it is slushy and gray.

That's just the weather sometimes. It is also our inner weather sometimes. There are times when we know gray, slush, drizzle in our hearts and souls.

Though we know such feelings as I've described, they are not the last word. Seamus Heaney's poem does not leave us hopeless, but moves from the cautionary tale of history to a word of hope. So hope for a great sea-change/On the far side of revenge. His poem ends with a feeling that there are times when "hope and history rhyme."

I think of the novel *The*Shipping News, the story of a
man named Quoyle whose very
name connotes a life tied up in
knots. It ends with hope, new
life, new vision – moments in all
colors, brilliancies, wonderful
sounds heard, sunsets seen.
What else might be possible?

That's the message at the heart of Easter: hope, possibility, new life, new vision, springtime for our souls, a little bit of springtime for the world. Because of the resurrection, there is always hope, even when life feels all drizzly and gray.

Because of the resurrection, we trust that one day, hope and history will rhyme perfectly, and until then, we work to help it rhyme sometimes. Because of the resurrection, hope is as lasting as faith and love.

Hope is at the heart of Easter. Who of us in our day and time can't use a little bit more hope?


Exploring monarchs

Health Notes: Weighty Thoughts

A 2007 report by the International Food Information Council indicates that 66% of Americans are concerned with their weight and that 56% are actively trying to lose weight. A government report from 2006 shows that 66% of adults in the US are either overweight or obese. Basically being overweight usually means that you are consuming more calories than you burn. Sure, genetics play a role as do medications, and the environment and culture, but more often than not it's self-control and overeating that cause the weight gain.

It's now March. Did you make a resolution to lose weight? Have you lost hope in your weight loss efforts? Do you lack self-control in your eating or are you an emotional eater? Did you start a new exercise program that you feel is not working for you and you are no longer doing the program? The power of positive thinking is enormous. If you have a defeatist attitude and you continue a negative attitude, your chances at being effective plummet.

Many people's eating habits and weight are related to how they handle stress and strong emotions. In fact, a 2006 survey conducted by the American Psychological Association showed that 31% of women and 19% of men are "comfort eaters." I'm in this category!

A passage in John says: I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry again. Whoever believes in me will never be thirsty. John 6:35

When we continue to turn to food to cope with stress and emotions it becomes a habit. When we're stressed or upset, God does not want us to go to the refrigerator! He wants us to go to Him to meet what really may be a spiritual or emotional need. When we need a place of security or safety He wants to be that place for us.

What do we do? Find a quiet spot, read, meditate, go for a walk outside and be awed by the beauty, get rid of sweet snacks and processed foods, call a friend and laugh together.

Stand in front of a mirror and say, "I like myself, and I can do this." Practice positive self talk—it will do your body good!
