# Get behind the wheel

Do you remember the first time you were allowed to drive the family car on a trip? Alone? Were you scared? Did you know the way? *"But Mom,"* you say, *"I don't think I know the way!"* 

"Don't be silly," your mom says. "We've been going to Grandma's house for years. You know the way."

And so, you get in the car and you drive away. This is your first official trip in the family car ... solo ... alone ... all by yourself alone. You recognize some parts of the road, but not others. Has that building always been there? Where did this bridge come from? Is this the gas station where I turn? You keep thinking to yourself, *"Boy, I wish I'd paid more attention when Mom and Dad were driving."* 

There is a big difference between just sitting in the car listening to your MP3 player while someone else is doing the driving and driving yourself. The driver makes all the decisions. You just sit there.

Early in his ministry, Jesus did most of the driving or work. His disciples were like passengers in a car. They didn't have to pay attention to Jesus. Jesus made all the decisions. He handled all the questions. He made the speeches and taught the lessons. He steered them through the towns and villages and took all the grief and criticism.

His followers were following, but not practicing. They were watching him, but not participating. They were just along for the ride.

One day, Jesus did something new. He looked out at the crowd of people and he had compassion on them. He saw many sick people, confused people, lost people, lonely people and outcasts of every kind. He knew that he could never reach out to all the people who needed help and so he turned to his disciples or his followers and he said, "*The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few*" (Matthew 9:37).

I think Jesus was saying, "it's your turn now. I need your help. Please, get behind the wheel and help me. Be my followers!"

about a young woman who wanted to go to college. As she was filling out the application, she ran into a question that asked, "*Are you a leader?*" Her heart sank. She really wanted to attend that college, but she knew she was not a leader.

And so, this young lady, being an honest young lady, wrote, "*No*," and turned in the application, expecting the worst.

A week later, she received a letter from the college. The letter said, "Dear Applicant: According to all the other applications we have received, our college will have 1,452 new leaders on campus this fall. We are accepting you because we feel it's imperative that they have at least one follower!"

In other words, not everyone is or can be or should be a leader. Followers are also needed! Just ask Jesus!

Any group of people can get together to worship God, study the Bible, pray and sing songs. This is the easy part of being a follower. The harder part is when we take our time and our talents and our money out into our streets and neighborhoods, schools and work places and do what Jesus would do.

Yet, it is our turn today. We have people in this world, in this country, in this community and even in our churches who need what we have to offer. They need us to be followers of Jesus Christ in both word and in deed. Are you ready – to follow?

# Preserving clean water

Greetings to you and to spring. As I write this, Earth Day is to be celebrated tomorrow and the weather is glorious! How I relish spring! How I want others after me to be able to relish all of nature.

God's living, breathing gift to us is the earth. Go out and enjoy, and be observant. Smell the pine, be quiet, hear the birds, relish the warmth of the sun, and breathe in the fresh air and now thank God for what you just did, and for laws that help protect what we can enjoy.

Just seeing Lake Superior reminds me of what I shared with third and fourth graders at the Medical Alliance's health fair this year. I told them that WATER is LIFE and we must protect it for our health and the health of animals and the health of the earth. We talked about how the Great Lakes Basin contains 20% of the world's fresh water supply and that less than 2% of all the world's water supply is fresh. We talked about the water cycle---that we can't create more clean water, and we pollute and use it faster than it can be replenished. We talked about how many people in the world drink unclean water and they get sick and can't go to school, and young children die because they have no source of clean water.

Look what has happened in Flint, Michigan. Many children now have high lead levels, which will have an effect on their health. Even low lead levels in children can lead to irreversible brain effects.

Do you know that the Flint water municipality kept charging the people high prices for water even when they were finally told they couldn't use it! Rather than having jugs of water or tanker trucks available for distribution of water, individual bottles of water were and still are being made available to do the cooking, bathing, and drinking. Do we see the problem with this?

The irony in this too is that in 2001 and 2002, the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality issued permits to Nestlé, the largest water bottling company in the world, to pump up to 400 gallons of water per minute from aquifers that feed Lake Michigan. And now they want to extract almost twice that amount. A small permitting fee to the state and the cost of leases to a private landowner was what Nestle had to pay. In fact, the company received \$13 million in tax breaks from the state to locate the plant in Michigan. Nestle is not the only company taking the water from Michigan, and essentially the Great Lakes Basin.

We have not been good stewards, and we must wake up now and each do our part. What is it that will get our attention? How do we reconcile with creation? How can we change the systems to not benefit a few at the expense of the rest? What do we do? Educate ourselves and become more proactive. A good book to read is Maude Barlow's book *Blue Covenant: The Global Water Crisis and the Coming Battle for the Right to Water*.
