Pumpkin to pie like straw into gold: The October 2 pumpkin pie for CHUM project was a great team effort. All 135 pies were sold before 5pm when I took \$1375 to CHUM for the food shelf. Wow! Your hard work is appreciated by lots of people. *—LeAnn House*

RB Dinner another wow: 140 volunteers worked over three days to prepare and dish up 520 pounds of beef, 130 apple pies, and more for our second annual Fall Roast Beef Dinner. Seven hundred meals were served—that's 200 more than last fall! Net income was \$4,662.26.

That's a little less than last spring's dinner, when 600 meals were sold, due in part to a onetime investment in new equipment and kitchenware to help with smoother operations. Food costs were also higher: the 520 pounds of beef (70 pounds more than last spring) cost 60¢ more per pound.

Bottom line, though, is over \$4,500 extra for the work of our church. Thank you for your part in making this possible.

Giving Thanks

Putting things on paper for this newsletter is making me think about how quickly this fall is rushing past. I am typing information about Christmas Eve services already!

One of the things the rush of time tends to push aside is giving thanks. I have some friends for whom Thanksgiving is not much of a holiday to be celebrated. For them it evokes painful images of mistreatment of native peoples. For them, it is a holiday about excess – we eat too much, we watch too much football.

While I understand where they are coming from, Thanksgiving has become an important holiday and time for me personally. It marks a nice break in what has for many years been a busy time. When I was a district superintendent I traveled a lot in the fall presiding at church conferences. As your pastor, fall is always a busy time getting programs going again, taking care of committees and commitments. On Thanksgiving Day, I get to be home with my family. I slow down and remember how much I have to be thankful for, including the grace of God which I see woven into every other good gift of life.

In the spirit of an early Thanksgiving, let me say how grateful I am to be here as your pastor. I am grateful to each of you and all of you for what you give to our church in your time, talent, energy, enthusiasm, and financial contributions. With the Roast Beef Dinner, Ruby's Pantry, mentoring, the Coppertop Craft and Bake Sale, Sunday School, music programs, and many other things, we are all busy here at First UMC in the fall. Thanks for your part in all of this.

Even more than being grateful for all that you give and do, I am simply grateful for who you are as followers of Jesus Christ, and grateful for who we are together as a congregation on the journey with Jesus. We continue to grow together in faith, hope, and love, in laughter and joy, in concern for those who are poor and marginalized. Our music is richer, our prayers are more resonant, because we continue to deepen in our relationship with the God of Jesus Christ and with each other.

We are not perfect. There is always room for growth. The philosopher Alfred North Whitehead once wrote, "There is no true stability... What looks like stability is a relatively slow process of atrophied decay." It is a more sophisticated way of saying that if we aren't moving forward on the journey, we are falling further behind. I am grateful that we continue to seek inner growth and I believe that the corollary to inner growth is growth in mission, ministry, and numbers.

FUMC hosts supervised visits Keeping families together

Sadly, it is too often the case that some parents encounter difficulties caring for their children and society must step in through the legal justice system to provide safe environments for children away from their biological parents. It is the intent that these biological parents will, some day, correct the problems and learn parenting skills that will enable them to once more take responsibility for and provide care for their children.

Two of the agencies that participate in this process are St. Louis County Social Services and Lutheran Social Services. For several years FUMC has been providing both agencies with access to our nursery to host court ordered non-custodial parental visits.

An agency social worker supervises the visits and works with the parent(s) on childcare skills and social interaction. Typically a family will come for 4-6 visits over a month to a month and a half. Laura Stahl, our Director of Children's and Family Ministries, has assembled a toy box that can be used by the families with toddlers and older children.

Our best estimate is that approximately 30 family units per year use our facilities for non-custodial parental visits. This is just one example of the \$40,000 to \$50,000 First UMC donates every year in waived rental fees to non-profits.

In addition to providing space for relationships to grow, we can support participating families with our gifts.
