## **Ruminations**

Be inventive in hospitality.... Discover beauty in everyone. From Romans 12, The Message

Woody Allen, in the movie Annie Hall, tells a joke about two older women at a Catskill resort. One morning, at breakfast, one woman turns to the other and says, "The food here isn't very good, is it?" And the other woman replies, "I know, and such small portions!" Our summer weather has not given us much to brag about this year, and now summer is ending all too soon.

Church staff, Church Council members, Church committees, and many others at First UMC have been working diligently in recent days to get fall programming in place as people return from their summer schedules and we move into a busier time here in the church.

One important marker for a change in our church schedule will be Sunday, September 14. We are calling it Celebration of Welcome Sunday. I thought it had a nice ring to it, but as our staff has been working with the day, we couldn't help but notice that the first letters in the phrase spell a word – CoW. We've been affectionately referring to this day as "Cow Sunday." Maybe we have all been working a little too hard getting ready for the fall.

And maybe it is my inner Sigmund Freud, but I figure we should never let a good free association go to waste. CoW Sunday, a celebration of welcome. I thought of the phrase, "till the cows come home."

The phrase generally has to do with something lasting a long time. In Scotland, where the phrase may have originated, cows are put out on grazing lands for the summer, but they return home in autumn when the grass becomes scarcer in the highlands.

It strikes me, though, that there are also echoes of reliability and of home. The cows return, slowly but with regularity. The cows have a place to which they can return.

God's love for us and grace toward us, as we know that in Jesus, is as certain as the cows coming home, either in the morning for milking or in the autumn when the summer grasses have dwindled.
