Dear Members and Friends of First UMC in Duluth,

Blessing to you all in this Advent season. I was asked by the SPRC to provide an up-date on where we are in our appointment process for your next senior pastor. On November 28 and 29 the (Minnesota Annual Conference) cabinet met with 32 people who are considering appointments or appointment changes in the MN Annual Conference. We are seeing lots of very talented pastors and will be experiencing a great deal of movement in the conference this year. Earlier this fall the cabinet took time to begin vetting candidates for your next pastor and we already saw several exciting possibilities for your church. In January the cabinet will have two appointment retreats to begin our time of prayer and discernment about all of the known appointment changes. We may even be able to finalize a couple of appointments during the month of January. At some point after February 1 we will likely finalize our choice for your next senior pastor and then I can begin the introductory work with the SPRC. Do not become concerned if you do not hear immediately in February as we may know who we are going to appoint but we have to follow the chain of appointments and sequence the timing of the introductions.

Interim Pastor's Report, continued

We open our doors and host many community groups: Ruby's Pantry, the Hmong New Year Celebration, AA groups, exercise classes, CHUM meetings, and many more.

Our most important asset is our people. We are a friendly church, with a positive attitude, sitting in the heart of a beautiful city. Coppertop people know how to live, love, and serve. We are generous and care about our neighbors. We do our best to serve God by using the gifts and abilities God has given to us.

We do have some challenges. How can we maintain our current ministries while developing new ministries and programs to attract new people? How can we build on our current strengths and use those strengths to increase our worship attendance? How can we change with the changing cultures and still stay healthy and relevant in the years ahead?

Some of the challenges we face are these:

- Consider adding additional programs/groups for youth and children's ministries. We will need to wrestle with the question: What are young people looking for, and is it possible our church can provide it?
- Consider developing an effective visitation program. Studies have shown that first-time visitors need to receive a welcome gift and a visit by a layperson within the first 24 to 48 hours of their visit if they are expected to make a second visit.
- Consider setting aside "first-time visitor" parking spots in convenient places near church entrances.
- Consider studying and improving the signage in our building. Where are our classrooms? Bathrooms? We know, but can our visitors find the sanctuary or nearest bathroom without getting frustrated?
- On Sunday mornings, consider having volunteers behind our kiosk desk near the front entry to help answer questions and give directions. Perhaps add a second kiosk near the east entrance for the same purpose.
- There is an issue regarding the rental of the Coppertop. This is a busy building. Excluding the University Nursery School, there are many other groups that use our building throughout the year. There have been situations where renting the building to outside groups has caused conflicts with church-related activities. It also causes additional work for our staff especially the janitorial staff. Hiring another custodian or custodial service has been mentioned in response to this busy situation.
- Consider adding a second service. This is a delicate subject with both pros and cons. Would a second service provide a healthy option to the new people and families we are hoping to reach? How would a second service affect our current church family?
- Consider our system of governance at Coppertop. Churches across the country are transitioning into single governance systems where the pastor and staff are managing and operating the church

rather than numerous boards and committees. Again, there are pros and cons that need to addressed.

• The new pastor and staff will need to develop a common goal or vision for FUMC—a vision that will **unite** the staff and congregation and focus their efforts on achieving that vision.

Duluth First UMC has a rich and productive history. We have faithfully served this area for over 147 years. I believe we can add to our rich history in positive and meaningful ways as we face the future with boldness and faith.

The good and great news this: Jesus is with us and will help us march into our future.

Description for Lead Pastor

Bishop Bruce R. Ough and the Minnesota Annual Conference appointive cabinet seek to match clergy and congregations in order to fulfill the Gospel Imperatives - To Grow in Love of God and Neighbor, Reach New People and Heal a Broken World. As part of the consultation process in appointment-making, they invite clergy to indicate their interest in those churches known to be open as of December 5, 2016. The churches are listed on the Minnesota Annual Conference website with a description. This is the description FUMC submitted.

First UMC in Duluth is eager to welcome a new Lead Pastor in the spring of 2017. We are interested in an innovative leader who will serve to inspire our staff (two full-time and about 15 part-time) and congregation by helping us fulfill the Annual Conference's expectation to grow in love of God and neighbor, reach new people, and heal a broken world. This will require excellent skills in preaching and collaborative worship planning, a well-developed, clearly-articulated and progressive theology, openness and comfort with a congregation who has a wide variety of social and political views, and a willingness to engage in relationship-building, both within the congregation and throughout our community. First UMC is a reconciling congregation. Additionally, the Lead Pastor sets the tone for a positive and supportive work environment for both staff and volunteers, inviting and involving volunteers to participate in various church ministries. Ideally, this person will also have a proven track record in growing worship attendance, setting long- and short-term goals that inspire deep engagement, and encouraging congregation members to strengthen personal and communal practices of intentional discipleship. We are looking for a servant leader who will help us shine God's light into the world as a beacon of hope and healing from the Skyline.

Our new leader will follow an intentional interim pastor (appointed August 2016-July 2017) who replaced our former pastor who served here for 11 years before being elected bishop. Specific challenges include clarifying our sense of where God is calling us to grow, honoring the deep history of two congregations that have merged into one church in 2012, connecting with young adults and families with children in new and innovative ways, and helping us "think outside the box" as we forge a new identity as servants of Christ in a hurting world.

We are a congregation of about 640 members (average worship attendance 220) in beautiful northeastern Minnesota, on the shores of Lake Superior. Our 50-year-old Coppertop building is a local landmark and provides a fabulous facility for worship, ministry, and community gathering. Our annual church budget is about \$570,000. In 2018 we will complete a capital campaign which is on target to meet our goal of \$525,000; this will allow us to address a number of structural projects to ensure the viability of our building for the next 50 years, making ministry in the name of Jesus Christ possible.

Fun and Games at the Coppertop Friday, January 20



So, what is a deacon, and what does a deacon do?

This past June, my relationship with the Minnesota Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church changed at the moment Bishop Bruce Ough commissioned me into a new role as a Deacon.

Deacons are clergypersons called to word, service, justice, and compassion ministries; my calling as a hospital chaplain aligns well with these expectations. While my seminary work is complete, I am still finishing up my chaplaincy training program, which requires 1600 hours of supervised practice – I'm wrapping up those hours at St. Mary's Medical Center and will be finished in April of 2017. For the purposes of the Annual Conference, my work in the hospital is considered my primary appointment. In a situation such as this, deacons who are working outside of a church setting must also have a secondary appointment within a congregation, which may be a volunteer or paid position, depending on a mutual understanding between the deacon and the Staff Parish Relations Committee. Pending approval at our Charge Conference on January 15, my position will include a small salary. (Yes, I know, it's a lot of details, but I have come to appreciate the Methodist "methodology" and especially trust the folks in the MN Annual Conference Cabinet to enact it fairly and prayerfully.)

Every deacon's calling is unique, based on his or her setting. Starting in January, I will be working (very!) part-time here at the Coppertop, with office hours on Thursdays. My responsibilities will gradually take shape around a project that we're loosely calling Discipleship Ministries, finding old and new ways of how we are being God's people in the world and where our witness can be intentionally strengthened. The metaphor deacons often use when describing our work is one of a *bridge* – we encourage people to live their faith in their families, communities, and workplaces – *bridging* God's people between the church and the world.

I also intend to work with our SPRC throughout the winter and spring season as we prepare to welcome a new Lead Pastor this summer, providing transitional support as needed. As our new Pastor becomes acclimated to ministries at the Coppertop, and also as my days as a student chaplain come to an end and I seek employment in hospital chaplaincy, my FUMC role is likely to be adjusted. We have agreed to be flexible as conditions change.

God needs all of God's people to shine our light in the world, so that we can truly fulfill our calling to be hope and healing from the Skyline.

Visiting someone with dementia

About 5 million Americans now have Alzheimer's disease, the most common form of dementia. This number is 20 million globally. As you know this disease robs people of language, memory, and thought. Recently a report about a family in Colombia has shown that there is a gene responsible for this family contracting Alzheimer's at an early age.

Dr. Kenneth Kosik for more than 25 years has worked with Dr. Francisco Lopera of Medellín's University of Antioquia in studying the largest known family with inherited Alzheimer's disease. Its family tree goes back 300 years. Hundreds of individuals in this family are fated to get the disease. Their symptoms usually develop between the ages of 45 and 50.

Their research has found that the gene, called presenilin 1 (PSEN1), is responsible for this family's disease. Knowing the gene mutation means that they can now predict which family members will get Alzheimer's. Knowing whom the disease will strike, and when, offers a powerful basis for finding a treatment and determining if it is effective. The Colombian family is now part of a large prevention trial.

It's also been found that another large family nearby has another genetic mutation that causes early onset. Even though research on Alzheimer's has been going on for more than 100 years little is known.

Until more is known about causes and treatments, tips for caring for people with Alzheimer's will help you to decrease the stress experienced when visiting or caring for a loved one.

Tips for Visiting

Language may be affected at different intervals. Use complete sentences and avoid cliché's and/or abbreviated talk.

Conversation needs to be centered on the current time and activity. People with Alzheimer's may not even know what time of year it is or if you were there an hour ago.

Help to orient the person to the now: "it's snowing and cold today." "I'm Linda from church."

Be invitational—even simple decisions can be overwhelming. Say "I made this for you, now let's look at it together."

Be patient—go slow—don't fill in the gaps of conversation—don't rush the person.

Let us pray for all those afflicted with any type of dementia, their caregivers, and those who are doing the research to find the causes and treatments of this debilitating disease.
