Roast Beef Dinner Summary

The 2018 fall Roast Beef Dinner's profit was \$4,196.63. This is a little higher than the fall of 2017 (\$4071.23) but less than last spring, which was the day of the Husky Refinery explosion, allowing us to do a lot of mission work. Good job!

We served 70 fewer paid dinners this fall compared to last fall. Our expenses were good this year: beef was \$3.98/lb compared to last fall at \$5.83/lb; we then increased the price of the dinner to \$13.00 for the spring 2018. We lowered it back to \$12.00 per dinner for this fall. This year was one of the chilliest nights we have had for the dinner. We appreciate the outdoor crew and hope they have warmed up!

Guests remarked that the apple crisp, coleslaw, and beef were the best yet!

As many say, the dinner runs like a well oiled machine. We would not be able to accomplish this without doing what we like to do: to serve others!

Scouting for Food Is Another Huge Success for CHUM

Hundreds of Boy Scouts, drivers, food sorters, and area grocery stores teamed up for another successful Scouting for Food drive. Thanks to these volunteers and all our generous neighbors and friends, the CHUM Food Shelf took in 6,184 pounds of food and over \$1000 in cash on a single day!

These donations will be put on the shelf immediately, as supplies were running low, and will be utilized by our neighbors in need this holiday season.

Stretching Food Stamps During the Holidays

As holidays approach, the CHUM Food Shelf reminds us how tight life is on food stamps. 76% of food stamps are used by households with children, 11.9% by households with a disabled family member, and 10% by households with senior citizens, according to SNAP to Health (a virtual town hall where all members of the community can convene to discuss the current state of nutrition and health in the United States). The holidays are an uneasy time, stretching already limited resources.

"The reality is," says Scott Van Daele, CHUM's Director of Distributive Services, "that benefits are enough to last to about midmonth. Those depending on food stamps have to plan well and cobble together resources to complete the holiday table for their families." One 65-year-old semiretired matriarch, who started using SNAP benefits when her husband passed away, offered her tips: "You have to balance what you would have to use," she said. "You say, 'Well I've got this big occasion coming up so now I have to factor in a turkey, which may be \$20, and then you have to have all the trimmings." She also seeks out food shelf distributions to complete her holiday table.

According to reports, food stamp distributions are based on a barebones household budget developed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. "It currently determines that a man between the ages of 19 and 50 would spend \$42.80 on food weekly. A woman in the same range would spend \$37.90, and a family of four with two preschool-aged children would spend \$129.40."

Van Daele noted that the food pantries and soup kitchens have to be ready when holidays like Thanksgiving approach. Items like fresh or canned fruits and vegetables are always in high demand, and the holiday season is no different.

From Our Faith Community Nurse

The holiday season is supposed to be a time full of joy, parties, and gatherings with friends and families. But the holidays can be a difficult time for many people dealing with grief, loneliness, illnesses of all kinds, economic concerns, mental health issues, separation from family members, and relationship issues like separation or divorce.

The holidays are a time of bringing people together in community. We know that one in four families sitting in the pews is living with someone who has a mental illness. Many are suffering in silence and are afraid to share their pain with others. While some people experience temporary periods of depression like the "holiday blues" or Seasonal Affective Disorder, many live with mental illness every day.

Prior to a large gathering of family and friends, plan ahead by letting any potentially sensitive people know what the situation is. This is a wonderful opportunity to help erase the stigma and shame too often associated with mental illness. You can help people find ways to be relaxed yet respectful of any special needs. Someone living with a mental illness can feel further disconnected from others if people ignore or avoid them.

Set realistic goals and be flexible. The holidays are about love and caring for one another. We would all do better to let go of the image of the "perfect" holiday and focus on accepting ourselves and our loved ones without judging, criticizing, or advising.

For anyone who is struggling, hearing the familiar stories of our faith, singing familiar hymns, and participating in religious rituals can bring comfort. It can be a time of reconnecting with our faith and spirituality. A special effort to encourage families to invite their loved ones to be part of special services can be very helpful.
