On the Journey With You

I want to give you a brief update on what is happening in the UMC following the divisive and painful General Conference activities.

Apportionments: Several people have been asking about how we will deal with apportionments (money our congregation gives to support the UMC in MN and globally) now that the vote excluding LGBTQ leadership and access to the full ministries of the church has taken place. There are two parts to our apportionments. Our local apportionment, which pays for the ministry in MN, is 77% of our giving. Our general church apportionment, which pays for the ministry of the broader global church and policies, is 23% of our giving. At the church council meeting on March 19, your church leaders voted unanimously to not send in the general church share of our apportionments and to escrow them until we know what is next for the Methodist church. If you have any questions, please talk with me, Rev. MaryAnne, council chairs Chuck Campbell and Scott Hedlund, or lay leaders Cindy Hedlund and Jim Wheeler.

The Future of the UMC: Many steps are underway to move us into a fully inclusive Methodist Movement. There is a lot of activity going on locally and beyond. I (Pastor Jeanine) will update the congregation in sermons and through emails and newsletters as the movement toward full inclusion progresses. Rev. MaryAnne and I will lead a Faith Forum at 9am on Sunday, May 26, and a repeat of that forum some time after that for those who cannot attend that day.

I want you to know that I am very hopeful for what will be! Congregations, conferences, and jurisdictions are coming together, wanting to make our Methodist Movement vital, loving, justice-seeking, and open to all. We will continue to be a place for all – no exceptions - and more and more Methodist churches are choosing the path of loving inclusion as well.

Sustainability News

Do You Know?

Why FUMC is practicing composting on Sunday mornings and in our kitchen?

Reasons to Compost

- It's good for the environment. Composting means less waste goes to the landfill, which extends the life of the landfill. Compost puts much-needed nutrients back into our depleted topsoil.
- It's good for our bodies. Food grown in compost tastes better and is more nutritious than food grown with synthetic chemical fertilizers.
- It's good for the air. When food is landfilled, it decomposes without air, creating methane, a greenhouse gas that is over 20 times more potent than carbon dioxide, which is detrimental to the ozone layer and contributes to climate change.
- It's good for water conservation. Compost assists in drought resistance and erosion control, as it is able to hold on to moisture and nutrients for plant use much longer than soil depleted of organic matter.

How to Compost at Home

- Find a suitable-sized container for your kitchen which has a large opening and lid, such as a large coffee can, ice cream pail, or one of the many choices available to purchase with or without carbon filters to control odors.
- Purchase the appropriate-sized BPI* compostable bags for your container. NEVER use plastic bags. (We hope to have compostable bags available for your purchase soon.)
- What is compostable? "Anything that is or was edible or ever breathed," coffee grounds and filters, tea bags, paper napkins without glitter, BPI-compostable dinnerware, glasses, and cups. Some may look like plastic but are made of plant materials.
- You can store your filled and tied bags in your freezer until it's convenient to drop them off at one of the free WLSSD drop-off sites listed below.

Mission and Social Justice

Churches United in Ministry (CHUM) Emergency Food Shelf

In 2018, the CHUM Emergency Food Shelf distributed over 300,000 pounds of food at three standing sites. The food shelf provides a five-day food supply for people without food or the resources to buy food, as well as advocacy services connecting people to community resources (e.g. shelter, medical care, children's services, employment, clothing, and emergency monies). Staff, along with approximately 100 volunteers, distribute this food to almost 600 households each month.

CHUM hopes to raise \$115,000 during Minnesota Foodshare March Campaign, which runs through Sunday, April 7. Through various purchase arrangements, CHUM can purchase \$7 worth of food for every \$1 contributed.

FUMC, as one of CHUM's 43 member congregations, is being asked to support this effort. Last year, the FUMC family contributed \$200, and a number of church members believe we can do better! \$800 has been pledged as a dollar-for-dollar match for contributions placed in church offerings designated for CHUM Emergency Food Shelf. Do the math: \$800 (x 2) becomes \$1600... and then leveraged by CHUM's purchase arrangements (x 7) becomes \$11,200 worth of food. Let's all participate in this ministry to bring about a modern "loaves and fishes" miracle of providing food to those who are in need!

Since 1922, the Union Gospel Mission has been providing food, shelter, and hope to Duluthians in need through a hot meal program, food shelf, transitional housing, providing hygiene products, church services, and support groups.

The Minnesota Annual Conference will be offering a training course for those interested in volunteering for disaster relief work through UMCOR. Becoming an Early Response Team (ERT) member gives you the credentials to enter disaster-torn areas. ERTs from Minnesota respond to various types of disasters such as flooding, tornados, and hurricanes. You must have completed this training and have a successful background check on file with UMCOR in order to volunteer.

In the days after a natural disaster, ERTs remove debris, clean out flood-damaged homes, and otherwise help to prevent further property damage while providing a caring Christian presence. As an ERT volunteer, you fill a special role; you are trained, have a security background check, are entirely self-sufficient, and demonstrate compassionate faith. The Minnesota ERT-trained volunteers have been active since 1997 working disasters in Minnesota and Wisconsin and elsewhere, including 8 teams deployed in 2018.
