Sustainability

Do You Know?

What we plant in our containers, gardens, and lawns to aid our ***pollinators*** helps us and our planet!

What are pollinators?

- Pollinators are a diverse and fascinating group of animals: bees, butterflies, moths, some bats, and birds.
- Native bees are the most efficient group of pollinators.

Why should we care about pollinators?

- In addition to their beauty, pollinators provide an important link in our environment by moving pollen between flowers and ensuring the growth of seeds and fruits.
- Nearly 90% of all flowering plants depend on these animals to propagate.
- Over 1,000 varieties of plants, which we depend on for food and medicine, need pollinators to reproduce. Without pollinators, these plants would disappear.
- More than a quarter of North America's 47 bumblebee species are at risk. In 2018 the rusty patched bumblebee was the first bee to be designated as endangered.
- It's estimated that between 2008 and 2013, the abundance of wild bees dropped across 23% of the U.S.

Why are pollinators declining?

There are many reasons, including climate change, diseases, and pesticides. Yet most experts say the single biggest threat is habitat loss, and that is where we can make a difference.

How to develop "Pollinator-Friendly Spaces"

- Use local native plants, which are much more attractive to native bees than exotics. Heirloom varieties of herbs and perennials can also provide good foraging.
- Choose several colors of flowers: blue, purple, violet, white, and yellow particularly attract native bees.
- Plant flowers in clumps rather than individually.
- Include flowers of different shapes. Pollinators have different tongue lengths and will feed on different-shaped flowers.
- Have a diversity of flowering plants (annuals, perennials, flowering bulbs, herbs, vines, trees, and shrubs), blooming throughout the growing season of spring, summer, and fall.
- Supply nesting sites. Unlike honey bees, most native bees nest alone in holes in the ground or in brush piles, tree snags, logs, or twigs.
- Reduce pesticides. Avoid insecticides and herbicides. In particular, steer clear of systemic insecticides, such as

neonicotinoids (neonics), that can stay in the soil and in all parts of the plant for months to years, and are toxic to pollinators.

Questions to ask your plant supplier or nursery before buying to ensure your bee-friendly flowers aren't killing pollinators:

- Are these plants or seeds treated with neonicotinoids?
- Do you know if your plant suppliers use them?

Onward with "Pollinator Proliferation"

From Our Faith Community Nurse

Spring is coming! I had the opportunity to attend the St. Louis County Extension Spring Gardening session at our church on April 13, and a session on *Gardening for a Healthier Life* presented by Robert Olen.

Many of us know that when we get in touch with Nature and get our hands dirty, there is a benefit of connection. There is increasing evidence that gardening can benefit both our physical and mental health, such as reductions in depression, anxiety, and body mass index, as well as increases in satisfaction, quality of life, and sense of community.

To help you garden, there are a few exercises that you can perform to especially help your backs:

- Stand with your hands on your back and bend backward 10 times.
- Stand with your back against a stationary object like a kitchen counter and bend backwards.
- Lay prone on your stomach on a solid, hard surface for two to three minutes, then prop yourself up on your elbows and do the same.
- Sit in a chair and stand up five to seven times, as fast as you can
- Take five deep breaths and let out your air slowly.
- Wear knee pads when working on your knees.

We all know that we need to eat a variety of fruits and vegetables each day. We should also pay attention to the DIRTY DOZEN; buy these organic if you don't grow these yourself!

An environmental working group (EWG) simulation of thousands of consumers eating high and low pesticide diets showed that people can lower their pesticide exposure by almost 90% by avoiding the top 12 most contaminated fruits and vegetables and eating the least contaminated instead.

When growing your own vegetables or fruit, use compost and avoid commercial pesticides, especially neonicotinoids.

Let us remember that as we take in the wonders of the Earth, we must be stewards. We need to take responsibility for our conscious choices on how we treat this gift. Security for the Earth and us means cooperation, community, action, and being aware of the science that demonstrates that our climate is changing and will have drastic implications in the coming years and even now.



Genesis 2, 4-17 "The Lord God took the person and put him in the Garden of

Eden to till it and keep it." We are part of this Earth—let us experience it by relishing new life. The smell of spring's first flowers, the sun and wind on your face, a walk in the forest, the sound of rushing water and the birds singing. God gives us all the courage and knowledge we need to help ourselves and our precious Earth gift.

Capital Campaign Final Report

Purpose, Place, People, Promise for the Future

This final Capital Campaign report is presented with deep gratitude to everyone who has contributed to the Capital Campaign through their prayers, their financial gifts, their labor, and for listening with open hearts. We also acknowledge with great appreciation the ultimate gifts from Chester Park UMC and Lester Park UMC. The legacy of Hope and Healing on the Skyline continues.

The planning for this Capital Campaign began over four years ago as the Trustees developed a prioritized list of needed projects. To this original list, another critical project was added—**the caulking of the vertical sanctuary windows and the front entry granite**. The caulking was completed last fall.

This construction season you should see the completion of the parking lot improvements and the restroom updates. On April 4 the Trustees approved the bid for the parking lot improvements. At that same meeting the Trustees also approved funds for the restroom updates. The updates include automatic toilets and faucets for four restrooms. The costs for the parking lot and restroom updates are much higher than the original project estimates. The organ repairs and the Trustees Building Endowment will receive their full portion of the Campaign funds.

Due to the increased costs for the parking lot restoration, the upper Sanctuary windows project (considered a cosmetic issue), has been deferred by the Trustees for the foreseeable future.

Early Response Basic Training and Recertification Course—St. Cloud

The Minnesota Annual Conference will be offering a training course for those interested in volunteering for disaster relief work through UMCOR. Becoming an Early Response Team (ERT) member gives you the credentials to enter disaster-torn areas. ERTs from Minnesota respond to various types of disasters, such as flooding, tornados, and hurricanes. You must have completed this training and have a successful background check on file with UMCOR in order to volunteer.

ERTs fill a specific need in the days soon after a natural disaster. ERTs remove debris, clean out flood-damaged homes, and otherwise help to prevent further property damage while providing a caring Christian presence. ERT volunteers are different from general volunteers because they are trained, have security background checks, and are entirely self-sufficient. The Minnesota ERT-trained volunteers have been active since 1997, working disasters in Minnesota and Wisconsin within the North Central Jurisdiction, and also serving in other states when major disasters have hit. In 2018 alone, the team deployed eight teams to help with flooding in southern Minnesota, flooding in southwest Wisconsin, and the tornado outbreak in southern Minnesota.

The course, taught by UMCOR-certified instructors, provides the basic skills for you to become a member of the Early Response Team.
