Here is the plan for the start of the year:



Sustainability

Sustainability Group to Meet September 15

The FUMC Sustainability Group will meet in the library right after the service on Sunday September 15. Short meetings (less than one hour) are held on the second Sunday of each month, right after the service.

All are welcome to this enthusiastic group that works (and plays) towards making our church more sustainable and responsible in terms of care for the environment. Accomplishments over the past year include switching to china or compostable dinnerware, reducing or eliminating the use of polystyrene and plastic, composting food waste and other organic materials, and changing from plastic to fabric or oil cloth tablecloths. We also now ask outside groups that use our church facilities to follow these same practices.

Together we try to respond to the call to care for all of God's creation. Come listen and share ideas on Sunday, September 15.

Say "NO!" to Single-Use Plastic

Last month I took the Plastic-Free-July challenge. It was a global challenge asking individuals to refuse singleuse plastic. The hashtag *#PlasticfreeJuly* signified the challenge on social media, which included signing my name on *www.plasticfreejuly.org*

A challenge to refuse single-use plastic means planning ahead. I packed my lunch the night before work. One night I thought about packing yogurt, but that was in a single-use plastic container, so I didn't. I did use plastic. I used Rubbermaid containers for my sandwich and sliced apples. Also, I packed silverware in a smaller cloth bag. I made sure to pack a water bottle and a traveling coffee mug, as sometimes I like to treat myself at Caribou Coffee. My husband, Terry, usually does the grocery shopping. He is on board with using cloth and canvas bags. He's not on board with everything I do, but he knows that single-use plastic is a waste which will be around for years and years. He prefers the cloth bags to paper or plastic.

We took a trip to St. Paul and packed coffee mugs and water bottles. Terry wanted to get an ice cream treat at Cossetta's in downtown St. Paul. I saw that it was served in a paper container and wanted to be a good companion, so I said yes to the treat. But I was soon disappointed when I was handed a little plastic spoon. The damage had been done—they had given it to me. So I learned my lesson: I need to tell the workers ahead of time that I don't want a plastic spoon and keep my spork packed in my purse.

This month, think about where you eat and how they serve the food. Is there a less wasteful option?

Two Bishops Offer Plan for Denomination's Future

Two bishops propose turning The United Methodist Church into an umbrella organization for new, selfgoverning church groups that would offer different approaches on ordination of gay clergy and same-sex unions. Michigan Conference Bishop David Bard and Texas Conference Bishop Scott Jones began collaborating on a plan after the rancorous 2019 General Conference and shared it with United Methodist News in July. "We both envision a future where the church will focus on its mission of making disciples and spend less time and energy debating issues of human sexuality, which means we need to bless different parts of The United Methodist Church to be about the mission in their own ways," Jones said.

homosexuality. The 2019 General Conference, held Feb. 23-26 in St. Louis [MO] reinforced restrictions on LGBTQ ordination and samesex unions, but also led to protests and resistance by many churches across the U.S."

Under the Bard-Jones plan, titled "A New Form of Unity: A Way Forward Strategy 2019-2022," a conference would choose to join one of three groups the bishops are tentatively calling the Traditional Methodist Church, the Open Methodist Church, and the Progressive Methodist Church.

The Traditional Methodist Church would begin with a Book of Discipline that includes the Traditional Plan, which passed by a vote of 438 to 384 at the 2019 General Conference and strengthened enforcement of restrictions on LGBTQ ordination and same-sex unions.

The Open Methodist Church and Progressive Methodist Church would begin with a Book of Discipline modified to include the Simple Plan as presented in St. Louis. That plan called for eliminating restrictions on same-sex unions and on ordination of gay persons as clergy, as well as removing the church's official position that homosexuality is "incompatible with Christian teaching." Under the Bard-Jones proposal, the Progressive Methodist Church's Book of Discipline would be further modified to affirm clearly the full inclusion of LGBTQ persons in marriage and ordination candidacy.

The Open Methodist Church and Progressive Methodist Church might choose to be one group, the bishops say. The two or three churches would each decide on a name ("Methodist" isn't required to be part of it), and each would hold its own General Conferences, with complete freedom to revise its Book of Discipline.

The annual United Methidist Women (UMW) Coppertop Craft Sale is scheduled for Saturday,


November 9, 9am-2:30 pm. More than 50 area crafters will offer handmade
