Where does one begin with thanks when you have done so much for so long? At every step of Kevin's long illness you were there, as individuals and as a congregation. With prayers and encouragement, hospital visits, gift cards, food, and a prayer shawl—in rhubarb colors! We were surrounded and upheld with your love and concern. You pretty much prayed up a miracle so that we could make it to our son's May wedding, between hospitalizations. And two months later, when we got stranded in Maine with the wrong oxygen tanks, twenty-eight of you volunteered to transport us from the MSP airport to Duluth. Twenty-eight!! There were many people with no church affiliation that attended Kevin's Celebration of Life services. You showed them what a faith community can be. And do. Pulling two beautiful services together on short notice, hanging up t-shirts, providing just the right music, donating socks for CHUM, serving refreshments, transporting food for a family gathering, digging up an old VHS tape of *Jesus Christ* SuperStar. 

United Methodist Church Readies for 2020 General Conference

The theme selected for the 2020 General Conference will be "... and know that I am God," based on Psalm 46:10. A logo to accompany the theme is being designed by United Methodist Communications. The Dakotas-Minnesota Area host team reported that a website with volunteer opportunities and information about the local area has been created at *gc2020welcome.org*. To show hospitality, the local host committee intends to greet every delegate, invited guest, bishop, and spouse with a handmade purple scarf. United Methodists in Minnesota and the Dakotas were invited to help knit or crochet the scarves. Support for the project far exceeded the goal, with between 13,000 and 14,000 scarves made for the occasion.

The program committee wrapped up their work on the schedule for the 2020 General Conference, which begins at 2pm on Tuesday, May 5. Each day will begin with worship and will adjourn by 6:30pm, with the exception of Saturday, May 9, when legislative committees may meet until 9:30pm. Highlights of the schedule include the Episcopal Address and the Young People's Address on May 6, and the Laity Address on May 7.

About General Conference

General Conference is the top policy-making body of The United Methodist Church. The assembly meets at the beginning of each quadrennium to consider revisions to church law, as well as to adopt resolutions on current moral, social, public policy, and economic issues. It also approves plans and budgets for church-wide programs for the next four years. General Conference 2020 will take place May 5-15, 2020, at the Minneapolis Convention Center in Minneapolis, MN.

Minnesota and Dakotas United Methodists to Host General Conference

If you are looking to help at General Conference in May, the Minnesota and Dakotas United Methodists have created a website, *gc2020welcome.org*, to welcome all delegates and to organize hundreds of volunteers. To show hospitality, the local host committee intends to greet every delegate, invited guests, and bishops and spouses with handmade purple scarves. The website

has this to say about volunteering opportunities:

Volunteer Opportunities— 2020 General Conference, Minneapolis, MN

Volunteering at General Conference 2020 (May 5-15) will provide a tremendous opportunity to see the United Methodist connection upclose and extend hospitality to siblings in Christ from around the world. The Dakotas-Minnesota host team is looking for volunteers of all ages, interests, and abilities. The team's primary goal is to extend radical hospitality to guests so that they feel welcomed and safe, and can focus their full attention on participating in the gathering and discerning God's vision and direction for our denomination.

You can now indicate interest in volunteering with the Dakotas-Minnesota host team. Most host team volunteers will select three-hour shifts during the ten days of General Conference. There will also be opportunities to help with General Conference preparation and training prior to the event itself.

Here are some of the volunteer positions needed:

Airport

Greeters: Greeting visitors in the baggage claim area, helping them gather their luggage, bringing them to a hospitality station, and escorting them to their transportation pick-up point.

Drivers: Driving a circulator van or bus from the airport to downtown Minneapolis hotels and the Convention Center and/or assisting guests using this transportation.

Hotels

Greeters: Greeting guests, answering questions, providing directions, and helping them get acclimated—particularly during the peak arrival and departure dates—at several key downtown Minneapolis hotels.

Convention Center

Greeters: Helping guests find their way around, answering questions, and assisting registration volunteers in providing credentials.

Prayer room hosts: Praying with and/or assisting guests who stop by a designated prayer room.

Technology specialists: Helping to install and maintain computers and other electronic equipment used throughout the event.

Other

Skyway guide: Greeting and answering questions of those walking the skyways between buildings in downtown Minneapolis (General Conference attendees and general public).

Off-site venue hosts: Being on location for and assisting with group leisure or service project events organized for conference attendees.

Translators: Working with guests who speak other languages— particularly French—as they make their way around and get acclimated to the city.

Administrative support:

Assembling materials for guests in advance of their arrival.

Spiritual Composting

Gardeners can give you many good reasons to compost, but have you ever thought of composting as a spiritual practice? I am thankful on a daily basis that food scraps can be broken down and turned back into soil. I am filled with gratitude, not guilt, that forgotten leftover casseroles and expired cans of beans are not wasted, but returned to the Earth for enrichment. From Our Faith Community Nurse

The time is coming. Your time is coming. Everyone's time to die will come. Death is a part of life, a part of love, and a part of us all.



Many of us want to hide from the inevitable, but alas, we should prepare. Thus, Advance Care Planning (ACP) is an important part of life. It is an ongoing process which

should ideally begin at the age of 18 and be revised throughout one's life. 82% of people say it's important to put their wishes in writing, but only 23% have actually done it.

Two sessions on ACP will be held, on October 13 and on October 20, in the East Lounge, from 11:20am to 12:30pm. These sessions will introduce you to an advance directive, why you should have one, who should be your proxy, what matters to you, and (the most important aspect of this document) the conversations you have with your family, loved ones, and your healthcare provider. The goal of these conversations is to have everyone on the same page regarding your wishes, should your ability to communicate become impaired.

We will discuss how to start these conversations, knowing that what is communicated via stories and wants and needs is a gift. Sarah Key writes, "When I hear other people's stories, I like to believe they contribute to my 'Encyclopedia of Human Experience.' The stories I hear help me to expand my definition of what love is, what pain feels like, what sacrifice means, and what laughter can do." When sharing laughter occurs, we know that it affects the body—even the anticipation of laughter shifts our internal chemistry, reducing stress hormones and increasing T cells that help fight diseases. Endorphins are released which lessen distress. It is very true that laughter is good medicine.

I hope you can join the discussion and attend one of the sessions. Follow-up times can be decided at the end of the above sessions to meet in a group setting or individually.

To be sustainable you must think ahead: Let's think Halloween

Last newsletter I wrote about avoiding single-use plastic, especially during eating events and grocery shopping. Have you become more cognizant of the single-use plastic you use? Becoming aware is the first step. Another critical step is to be organized and think ahead. A person is more likely not to follow their values when they are hungry, crunched for time, or stressed.

So let's think ahead to Halloween. Will you decorate, wear a costume, or somehow celebrate? In the past few years, more and more plastic inflatable ghosts, ghouls, and giant pumpkins have popped up in neighbors' yards. But where does that vinyl or plastic go when it's no longer needed? What about the energy it takes to keep the giant pumpkin or ghoul pumped up?


Making ghosts made from old sheets, with a ball for a head and twine around the base of the head, is a more sustainable way to decorate a porch or a tree. Kids can use pillowcases for trick-or-treating.


"Although they are tempting, avoid the pull of cheap plastic decorative items," say the writers of *ExistGreen.com.* "There are plenty of natural materials to use for decor. Examples include sticks, dried corn on the cob, gourds, even dryer lint! Avoid painted pumpkins—you don't want those nasty chemicals mixed in with your compost."

A real bale of hay, corn stalks, and homemade scarecrows or monsters can all go back to the earth as compost.
