
Faye Youngren

Have a Merry Little "Green" Christmas

Having a sustainable or earth-friendly Christmas doesn't mean taking the fun out of Christmas; it means planning purposefully. There are many ways to have a sustainable Christmas: Being mindful of gifts, parties, decorations, and using card exchanges can make a difference. Attending Christmas Eve services is the most fun part of Christmas for me... and it's sustainable.



The time between Halloween and the New Year is the most wasteful time of the year: 25 million tons of extra garbage are thrown out during this period. I try to prevent all that garbage by "pre-cycling." I avoid purchasing items that contain excess packaging or are "one-time-use." There is a big debate over which is more sustainable: an artificial tree or a real tree. I'll let you do your own research but I have an artificial tree purchased at a thrift shop and we've been using it for 25 years.

Twenty-three years ago, Rebecca and I had an "Old Fashioned Christmas," and now that I revisit that time, I realize how sustainable it was. We purchased gently-used gifts from a thrift store and wrapped them in brown paper grocery bags, which we decorated. To one of my friends, a birdwatcher, I gave a bird book (it turned out to be a sought-after birding book!). Know the persons you're gifting and how they might react to a thrift shop gift. Discover what your loved ones need for it to feel like Christmas. My father had to have lutefisk and oyster stew. My daughter loves the anticipation. She needs something in a stocking on Christmas morning.

Here's how I plan a sustainable Christmas:

- Set my intention
- Think about decorations
- Think ahead about food
- Plan how I will serve food
- Think ahead about low-waste gifts
- Plan how I will recycle or dispose of extra waste after Christmas
- Don't forget about composting

Beva Lee DeGriselles Wunderlich July 23, 1929–November 17, 2019

Beva Lee, daughter of Franklin Lee and Byrdella DeGriselles, was born and raised in Pipestone, Minnesota. Growing up on the

family farm, Beva Lee learned to drive before many of the boys in her grade in a non-synchronized manual transmission truck; therefore her father would give her the keys when she was to go on an outing or date, as he considered her to be the safest driver of her peers.

She attended Hamline College and graduated from the University of Minnesota, obtaining a masters degree in education. She married Robert (Bob) Milton Wunderlich in 1952 and is survived by one brother, five children, and nine grandchildren.

Beva Lee started married life as a Navy wife in New London, Connecticut, and after a year there, moved to Duluth, Minnesota. After a number of years raising children, she began a professional life, initially teaching at UMD and subsequently teaching family life education in the Duluth public school system for more than 25 years. During this time she took a leave of absence to serve in the Peace Corps in Botswana. After serving her two years, she was invited by the Ministry of Education in Botswana to remain an additional year and help organize educational programming for the Botswana government.

Beva Lee was involved in First United Methodist Church from 1954 up until her death. She and Bob, along with Diane and Bob Bean "and a few others," were intricately involved in the imagination and implementation that led to the construction of the Coppertop. Also of critical importance to her was the extensive community outreach in which First United Methodist has always been involved—early examples were Dr. E. Jerry Walker (FUMC) and Rev. Jim Price (Calvary Baptist Church) trading pulpits, and both churches having joint summer community picnics.

Beva Lee was an avid collector of knowledge, including first-hand experience and story-gathering which she practiced through world travel. She continued her travels through her entire life, some for leisure and some with organizations such as World Women in Agriculture, all while holding dear many friendships on many continents. She had plans to travel to the East Coast for the 2019 Christmas holiday.

As it turns out, we were happily able to celebrate Beva Lee and Diane's 90th birthdays together this past summer, which will be a precious memory.

There will be a celebration of life on the weekend of July 25-26, 2020, for both church and family.

United Methodists decry "red-tagging" of church council

United Methodists are defending The National Council of Churches in the Philippines after the organization was labeled as a "front organization of local communist terrorist groups" by the Department of National Defense of the Philippine Government.

The Philippine council was among 18 organizations "red-tagged" during a congressional briefing Nov. 5. The list was presented by Major General Ruben Basiao, deputy chief of staff for intelligence for the Armed Forces of the Philippines.

The National Council of Churches in the Philippines is an ecumenical fellowship of mainline Protestants, of which The United Methodist Church in the Philippines is a member. Its main mission is "to be a channel for united witness and common action by being in solidarity with the people in the struggle for justice, peace and integrity of creation." United Methodist Bishop Rodolfo A. Juan of the Davao Area, who currently serves as vice chair of the National Council of Churches, lamented the labeling. "I am bent on defending the council, which I believe is faithfully carrying out its prophetic role to proclaim the truth," he said. "On behalf of The United Methodist Church, I urge faithful disciples to stand firm during these trying times. We will continue to be a check and balance of the government."

The United Methodist Church in the Philippines has condemned extrajudicial killings and other human rights abuses in the country, as well as protesting the treatment of indigenous people. The church has worked both alone and through ecumenical groups like the National Council of Churches.

United Methodists joined thousands of interfaith participants rallying in February to call attention to human rights violations. A district superintendent and pastor said police intimidated and threatened them for offering sanctuary to human rights workers at Dangay 3000 United Methodist Church in Roxas, Philippines.

In addition, the church offered shelter to farmers in 2016 after Philippine government security forces fired on the farmers' peaceful demonstration for rice. Bishop Ciriaco Q. Francisco, who was at the time leader of the Davao Episcopal Area, opened the Spottswood Methodist Mission Center to the starving families. That action put him in danger, and he was threatened with arrest.

Last week the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the USA released a statement in support of the Philippines council. "We stand by our NCCP sisters and brothers, and pledge to remain vigilant on behalf of their safety and security and to raise our voices on their behalf."

The United Methodist Board of Global Ministries also released a statement standing in solidarity with the council, "as it withstands yet

another attempt to discredit its prophetic witness."

The statement noted that, "This tactic has been employed previously against persons and organizations that dare to protest the indiscriminate killings of thousands in President Rodrigo Duterte's 'war against drugs.' The goal is to discredit those who dare to uphold human rights and publicize unjust actions and abuse of power, causing untold suffering, especially among the poor and the powerless in Philippine society."

The Rev. Olav Fykse Tveit, top executive of the World Council of Churches, also expressed alarm and grave concern over the allegations.

"In the context of current Philippine politics, such 'red-tagging' gives a green light to harassment and deadly attacks against those listed," Tveit said. He appealed to the Philippine government, "to end the war on drugs, to take measures to hold accountable those who have carried out extra judicial killings, and to respect and protect the human rights and equal God-given dignity of all people in the Philippines."

From Our Faith Community Nurse

Faith Community Nursing in the Ukraine

Peace to all! Since the Ukraine is in the forefront these days, I thought I'd share some information about Faith Community Nursing (FCN) in the Ukraine from a recent article in the *Journal of Christian Nursing*, April/June 2019, written by Mary Martin and Pam D'Andre. Pam is an FCN coordinator to the Ukraine who moved to Kiev in 2001. She is there through an ongoing partnership between the Association for Christian Nurses and Volunteers Welfare Organization.

As we know Ukraine is a country in turmoil since they became an independent country after the fall of communism in 1991. This country has endured many invasions and war and corruption. The country was known as the Breadbasket of Europe and produced 25% of all agricultural output in the former Soviet Union. According to information from the 2009 *CIA Fact Book*, a rental room—not an apartment—rented for \$145 per month and a nurse's salary was \$177 per month. For years, money for health care was siphoned off to benefit corrupt intermediaries. Medical care was and continues to be in shambles. People have been killed and displaced due to ongoing war. But there is new hope in the election of a new leader to fight corruption and the invasion by Russia.

Functioning within this uncertain climate, Pam has managed, with the help of the aforementioned organizations and Archpriest Fr. Nicholas Ilnytsky, to train FCN and establish Bank of Hope ministries in several cities.

Pam's greatest joy is seeing teams of nurses and volunteers from different walks of life and different denominations discuss how better to serve and minister to so many marginalized people.

Hospice care is not widely accepted, as the people believe that the ill are not to be told of their illness or that they are dying. Now, through education, more and more people are accepting that dying is a part of life, and dying with dignity is to be striven for.

Upon caring for anyone, the salutations "peace to you" and "let's pray," have opened doors to help so many people in need. But there are still many who have been left behind, cast out by their families and society. Some people have not been responsive to their ministries, but through hands-on care, they continue to demonstrate how the love of Christ can provide help and serve their needs. FCN provide more hands-on care than we do in the United States. If they didn't provide that care, these people would receive no care at all.

As these nurses demonstrate, when we minister to others, we do so as if we are ministering to Jesus. As it says in Matthew 25:40, "And the King will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these, my brother, you did it to Me.'"

As we have entered Advent, let us take this to heart.
