Worship In November

Out of an abundance of caution and care and wanting to do no harm, we will not return to in-person worship until we feel it would be safe and healthy to do so. Thanks for being flexible and keeping worship a priority.

During November we will continue to worship online on YouTube every Sunday morning at 10am. The service can be watched any time after 10am Sunday morning, but we encourage as many of us as possible to watch together at 10am as a community of faith. Please make worship a soul destination.

- Sunday, November 1: All Saints Sunday. We will name, light a candle, and ring a bell for those from our congregation who have died this past year. We will celebrate Holy Communion and will finish our "Reclaiming Christ" sermon series by reflecting on "The Discipleship Question."
- **Sunday, November 8: Consecration Sunday.** You will be asked to make estimates of your financial giving to the ministry and mission of our church for 2021. We will share a slideshow of our past year and will start a sermon series on "The Methodist Way–Do No Harm."

Church and worship are different with our services not in-person, but our church is still fully involved in ministry. Be watching for a special Sunday School Christmas Program, the community participating in the candle lighting for Silent Night at the end of our Christmas Eve worship video, and our Advent/Christmas Mission Project.

Sunday, November 8 is Consecration Sunday. In our 10am worship service, we will each be asked to make an estimate of our financial gifts to the ministry and mission of our church for 2021. Please be prayerfully thinking about what God is calling you to give, and make sure to be online for worship that Sunday. From Our Faith Community Nurse

Now that winter seems to be here, I think about those people who have already been sequestered in their homes or are homeless; people who have suffered losses of family and friends, jobs, and hugs due to COVID-19; those who are on the front lines caring for the sick; and those who suffer from mental illness. Winter and the holidays will bring other hurdles to deal with.

People of all walks of life are hurting in body, mind, and spirit. Christ's ministry involved the entire person, and John Wesley saw himself as a physician of body as well as soul. People who are suffering from mental incapacities have a difficult time finding care, and some cannot get care due to no insurance. In order to help suffering people, a health system that provides care to people without them having to declare bankruptcy is needed. Medical bills are the leading cause of poverty in the U.S., which leads to anguish and more despair.

According to National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI), one in four Americans will have a diagnosable mental disorder at some point in life. Many suffer in silence. As Rosalynn Carter has said, people with mental problems are our neighbors. They are members of our families, our communities, our congregations. By ignoring their cries for help, we continue to participate in the anguish from which those cries for help come. A problem of this magnitude will not go away—we are compelled to take action.

Knowing how to help someone having emotional distress is just as important as CPR. Mental health first-aid is a way to help. Core mental health first-aid skills are communication and effective listening—the person needs to feel accepted and respected, so don't interupt. Listening involves all of your person, not just your ears. Please listen without judging, give reassurance, encourage professional help, and give information and support.

Depression is a common but serious medical illness, and needs treatment. Some signs of depression are apathy, hopelessness, fatigue, lack of energy, inability to get out of bed, irritability, excessive eating, a lack of appetite, loss of control, not remembering, and/or overwhelming sadness. Call your health care provider if you are experiencing some of these symptoms and get help. You will be helping yourself, friends, and family. Untreated depression is the number one cause of suicide. If a person talks about suicide, it must be taken seriously. Never leave a person expressing a suicidal desire alone. Call for help: the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline is 24/7, call 800-273-8255

Regathering Plan Moves to Orange



On October 27, Bishop Bruce Ough sent a letter notifying us that we were moving into the Orange Phase. What does that mean for us?

We will continue:

- Worshiping online and through drive-up services
- Having groups gather outside or inside with ten or fewer people—ensuring that social distancing (six feet on each side of each person) is maintained, and attendees wear masks.
- Having a sanitizing station available at main entrance



Any woman who commits herself to the PURPOSE of UMW can join this group which is celebrated as the women's ministry of the United Methodist Church, and all are welcome.



FUMC also has great UMW history, including wonderful Fall Bazaars every year since the opening of our new building on the hill.

What Does That Logo Mean?

The other day a package arrived in a cardboard box. I noticed logos on the box that were vaguely familiar. I knew they were somehow "good," but it was time for a refresher course on exactly what the logos mean.

FSC stands for Forest Stewardship Council. You might see their



label on cardboard boxes, packaging for toilet paper, or lumber and products from a forest, including furniture. FSC stands not just for the forest, but also for the working conditions of employees and rights of the people who live near the forests.

Another logo I've seen on paper bags and chocolate candy bars is the Rainforest Alliance. This seal may be on agricultural products, forestry products, and tourism businesses. Their website states: "Our seal is awarded to farms, forests, and businesses that meet rigorous environmental and social standards."



Besides icons suggesting you recycle their bottles, manufacturers and marketers of soaps and health and beauty products may place symbols or logos on their products to show that they do not test on animals or use animal products.

The bunny logo with the large ears is sponsored by People for the



Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA). Manufacturers of personal-care products and household cleaners must answer PETA's questions and sign a statement of assurance verifying that they do not conduct, commission, or pay for any tests

on animals for ingredients, formulations or finished products anywhere in the world.

The leaping bunny is an internationally-recognized certification

program. Several national animal protection groups, including the American Anti-Vivisection Society, the Doris Day Animal League, and the Humane Society of the United States, banded together to form the Coalition for Consumer Information on



Cosmetics (CCIC). The CCIC promotes a single comprehensive standard. Vivisection is a catch-all word encompassing all experimention on live animals.

The October 7 Duluth News Tribune article "Nature Conservancy buys land in Superior National Forest" spotlights Freed's tremendous act of stewardship for the Earth. In 1994 Freed purchased 2,110 acres of private land, once marketed as prime cabin sites, in the Temperance River watershed. After more than 25 years of caring for the land, Freed recently sold it below market value to the Nature Conservancy, keeping it in conservation ownership. Research shows Minnesota's wild areas are key to climate resilience, and this little slice of undeveloped forest gives access to species moving north in the midst of climate change: moose and lynx, trout and grouse, and scores of plants. By filling a gap in Superior National Forest near the Boundary Waters, Professor Freed's loving gift provides safe space for diverse animal and plant species to thrive in the face of growing climate threats.

Lennon-Berini Scholarship Applications Now Being Accepted

In the 1950s, two young men, John Lennon and Joe Berini, served as First Methodist staff members who worked with Duluth youth, particularly in the Central Hillside area. To commemorate their work, a scholarship fund was developed in 1985. Subsequent contributions have helped to sustain the fund and have allowed for the presentation of 91 scholarships totaling \$95,190. The Lennon-Berini Scholarships for 2020 will be \$1,500 each. The criteria for qualifying as an applicant are:

- Be a member of Duluth's First United Methodist Church
- Have completed at least two years of college
- Be pursuing a people-centered career Application forms will be available on the <u>church's website</u> November 1, 2020. They will need to be fully completed and turned in by 4pm on Friday, November 20.
