

On the Journey With You

What a difficult time this has been.

The Covid-19 spread is increasing, and there is polarization around gathering in groups and wearing masks. I urge you to stay safe for yourself and for others by limiting your in-person interactions and wearing masks when you are in close proximity to people. We live out our faith by caring for each other.

There was also the St. Louis County Commissioners' meeting where there was to be a vote on our openness to refugee resettlement. I feel convinced that our Biblical mandate is to welcome the stranger and to help those in desperate need. I was distressed by the negative way some of the speakers talked about refugees—the anger, misinformation, even hatred. I am glad that you, no matter what side you may take on a concern or vote, always seek to talk about, and treat, all people as equal human beings fully created in the image of God.

And then the tragic, brutal arrest of George Floyd, which ended in his death. The acts of the police officer who acted with violence, and the other officers who stood by and did nothing, must be condemned. The added pain to the black community must be acknowledged. The sin of racism must be named. Most of you know that I have strong family ties to the police—my dad is a retired Duluth police officer and my brother is the current chief of police in Superior, WI. I love and care about police and am so thankful for the service and protection they provide. The vast majority of police officers seek to serve all people and treat everyone with respect and dignity. The ones who abuse their sacred trust hurt everyone and damage society.

Our current action steps at FUMC:

- 1. We proclaim that the death of George Floyd was wrong, evil, and sinful, and that racism is antithetical to the Gospel, and that all people are equally created in the image of God and must be treated as such.
- 2. We pray for the family of George Floyd and the entire Black community as they grieve and feel outrage.
- 3. We offered a prayer vigil on May 28 on Zoom. The NAACP encouraged people all over Minnesota to light a candle at the time of George Floyd's death to stand in solidarity with his family and our Black community. Our Zoom vigil was hosted by JoJo Coffin-Langdon.
- 4. Your church is joining with the NAACP, who is donating masks to people who live on the margins. There are bins, marked NAACP, set outside the side doors of the parking lots. Approximately every two weeks, the NAACP is setting up stands around Duluth, passing out masks to people in need. If you have the ability to make or buy masks to be donated, put them in the bin! If you have the ability to put masks in $Ziplock^{TM}$ type bags, that will help us "quarantine" the masks before giving them away.
- 5. Educate ourselves so we do no harm and do good. Here are some educational resources and opportunities:
 - White Savior: Racism in the American Church (https://youtu.be/2FWenQCC4-s) Available free with Amazon Prime, or on DVD, this film explores the historic relationship between racism and American Christianity, the ongoing segregation of the church in the U.S., and the complexities of racial reconciliation. It is our plan to host future small-group discussions around this film
 - Imagining a Prophetic Ministry: How One American Church Shifted From "Do Good" Charity to "Justice Minded" Solidarity (https://rcc-mn.org/webinars) June 9, 2pm, online. This free webinar from the Ministry Lab will focus on thriving as a church, seeing inequity, and lifting up marginalized voices.
 - *Jim Crow of the North*, produced by Daniel Bergin, is available on YouTube. The roots of racial disparities are seen through a new lens in this film that explores the origins of housing segregation in the Minneapolis area.
 - Read the book, *Christ in Crisis Why We Need to Reclaim Jesus* by Jim Wallas.
 - June 15 marks the 100th anniversary of the Clayton Jackson McGhee lynchings here in Duluth. There was supposed to be a widespread commemoration of the event, but because of COVID, many of the events have been canceled or postponed. *Here's the website* to learn more: We will find ways to participate.
- 6. If there are other actions you would like our church to take, your pastor and church leadership want to support you in leading us. Please talk with me about your ideas so we can walk alongside you. I leave you with a video Pentecost prayer by two colleagues, Luke and Bethany Nelson: <u>Pentecost prayer</u>


Worship In June

Public School Challenges

Public schools have faced three distinct challenges since the coronavirus pandemic began scrambling to make sure that lowincome children don't go hungry, teaching students remotely who lack internet access, and bracing for dramatically smaller budgets. Congress tried to help in the \$2 trillion economic relief package known as the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act, by designating \$13.5 billion for public schools. The money was supposed to be distributed to school districts based on the number of low-income students they enroll.

A new directive from the U.S. Department of Education, however, tells districts to share far more of the money than expected with private and religious school students, even though fewer than 5% of those children are poor. *Read more*.

Bishop Bruce R. Ough disseminated the following message to all Minnesota United Methodist congregations on May 22. Grace and peace to you in the name of Jesus Christ, our risen Lord.

Across our nation, many states are allowing more businesses to open with strict guidelines to minimize the risk of the spread of COVID-19. In this extended pandemic season, we are now at a point where the responsibility has shifted from Gov. Walz mandating that we stay at home to each person and organization determining how to stay safe based on recommendations offered to us. Many congregations are already well on their way in developing plans to gradually return to inperson worship when it becomes safe to do so. It's clear that our new normal for the foreseeable future will involve wearing masks, staying six feet apart, frequently washing our hands, sanitizing common spaces, and assessing our personal risk and vulnerabilities as we engage in our daily activities.

What does all of this mean for our churches? Religious leaders in Minnesota, including myself, have been working with the governor's office to develop specific guidelines to reopen our houses of worship in smart and safe ways. In the meantime, the Minnesota Conference has developed a Phased Re-Gathering Plan for

While we have many months to go to get through this pandemic, we are impressed by and encouraged with all the ways that everyone has stepped up to help and support one another. We are remaining steady and strong during this time because of your hard work, and we give thanks and praise to God for you. Let us know how we can continue resourcing our local churches, as we are eager to partner with you always but especially during this challenging time.

Churches based on the best information we have right now. I want to remind you that currently, groups of only 10 people or fewer are permitted to gather if each person maintains the proper distance. Drive-in worship services at which people remain their vehicles are also an option.

I urge you to go slowly and keep your focus on the health and safety of your congregation and neighbors. I believe we will need to let go of trying to determine a precise date when we will be able fully return to public worship and recognize that we will instead need to be guided by a phased approach that unfolds over the course of the coming months as COVID-19 continues to impact our state and communities to varying degrees.

I know how painful this is when we need each other more than ever and we long to see one another face-to-face. But as leaders of the church, we are called to care for the most vulnerable in our midst—and there is no way we can gather indoors, for an extended period of time, without exposing people in our communities to significant risk. What we know is that the virus is spread through the air, and we are contagious before we show symptoms. Celebrations such as weddings, funerals, corporate worship, and singing are extremely high-risk activities. There have been several recent reports of congregations gathering for worship and then promptly closing after a coronavirus outbreak caused by an asymptomatic carrier. The stay-at-home order might have been lifted, but the virus is still very much with us.

Additionally, for most of our congregations, what you are able to offer online is of a higher quality than an inperson experience would be right now, given the physical distancing requirements, restrictions on singing, recommendation to wear masks, and need for careful cleaning between all activities. Imagine a sanctuary where every family is six feet apart. There is no congregational singing. There are no hugs or handshakes. There is no mingling or fellowship time. The very things that people are longing for in gathering are too risky at this time. Many of our congregants, particularly the elderly, will be unlikely to accept the risks associated with in-person gatherings week after week if what they can experience at home is closer to the worship service they know and love.

I have heard the concerns: What about the church down the road that is open when we are not? Why can people shop at Walmart and Home Depot but not come to church? Of course being the church matters. But we are called to act not out of fear or competition or economic uncertainties but out of love and care for the whole. There is nothing stopping us from being the church we are called to be right now, in this moment, and we can do it in a way that ensures the safety of our people.

So, my friends, I ask you to keep on keeping on. Continue to innovate and seek new methods to help your congregation grow as disciples and serve your community. Invest in online worship and plan to make it an extension of your church even after we can resume in-person gatherings. Take advantage of these summer months by having some 10-person gatherings outdoors while wearing masks and staying six feet apart, or by inviting people to drive-in worship. Plan to not return to in-person worship until the risk of infection is low and in adherence with all state guidelines. Keep developing and refining your congregation's plans for regathering based on our *Phased Re-Gathering Plan for Churches*. Continue to encourage and engage in extravagant generosity because we are open for business, and your support is essential to our mission of making disciples of Jesus for the transformation of the world.

Thank you for your leadership and the tremendous ways you are adapting in this most challenging time. I know how difficult and exhausting it is to live and lead in this time of uncertainty. And yet, we do not do this by our own strength. We are held up by the power of the Holy Spirit, and I have every confidence that God will continue to lead us forward into a future with hope.



Reopening In-Person Church Document

(Note: In-person worship will be the final step... not the next step)

Purpose: This document will serve as a place for formulating our process and plan to reopen for public worship at First UMC—The Coppertop. Each of the items is subject to change as more information becomes available and as discussion and discernment continues to take place.

Sunday Morning/Worship Thoughts:

- The church will first consider the advice of the governor's office and MN Bishop when determining the timeline of opening. If either recommends closure, we will do so.
- The church will consider the availability of sanitizing products (e.g. Lysol wipes, hand sanitizer, etc.). If there is still a shortage and we can't obtain ample supplies, we will remain closed.
- We will ensure that we are not exceeding the number of people allowed in an area as determined by the governor's office and MN Bishop.
- Upon initial reopening, the nursery will be unavailable.
- Upon initial reopening, we will not offer coffee and food fellowship
- Cloth masks need to be made available and worn. Exception is people leading worship who are 6 or more feet away from the closest person (see discussion below).
- Sunday School classes will not begin on the same week as public worship. An announcement will be made from the pulpit and social media the week before classes restart.
- Following each worship service, everyone will be encouraged to leave the building and commence their fellowship time outdoors, following social distancing.
- The office will be open only to essential staff (paid and volunteer).
- The pastor will not be greeting before or after worship.
- The offering will not be collected by the passing of plates. Sign-up sheets, pens, etc., will not be placed out. Sign-ups may take place by an individual approaching and collecting names, which they record, or by bulletin insert sign-ups people can place in bins.
- The service will continue to be made available

- online. A posting will be made to indicate that the service is being live streamed to reach beyond these walls.
- Pencils, envelopes, Bibles, and hymnals will be removed from the pews.
- A bulletin will be provided to pick up on a table but will not be handed to people. One per family.
- Every other pew will be cordoned off and family units should leave the center of pews empty to maintain at least six feet from the next family.
- Interior doors should be propped open as people are entering and exiting the church. Exterior doors should be cared for by one greeter per door (main entrance and both east and west doors).
- We will continue to encourage people 65 and older, and/or people with health vulnerabilities, to participate from home, and will continue offering worship and connection opportunities for them remotely.
- We require and request that people who have a fever or feel unwell in any way, please stay home.
- If someone knows they have been exposed to COVID-19, we require and request that they stay away from worship and any church activities for two weeks.

Congregational Care:

• In-person visits by the pastor/parish nurse/lay pastors/staff will be unavailable until nursing homes open for visitations.

Other Things to Consider:

- We will send out a letter and/or email/social media to let everyone know when we are reopening and how that will look.
- Masks will be a requirement as we reenter the worship space and in the building at all times whenever more than one person is present. We will have a supply of masks on hand.
 - Worship leaders do not need to wear masks when leading worship as long as they maintain 6 feet or more of distance from all others. Masks will be worn when that person(s) is not actively leading worship.
- We will need to sanitize and clean all publicly open spaces
 - Anne Gustafson will work with staff on how we will accomplish this. Volunteer involvement may be needed.

- Communion elements will temporarily be given in sealed, individualized packets to maximize safety. The congregation will take them with them when they leave.
- Baptism will be accomplished by the parents/ sponsors putting the water on their child while the pastor extends hands in blessing and says the baptismal words. The same will be true for confirmation.
- Singing will not take place. Instead we will hum with, or listen to, song leaders.
- We will have some kind of collection box for offerings at the front and back of the sanctuary, as the plates won't be passed.
- Outdoor worship opportunities may happen, during which we will follow physical distancing rules.
- Weddings and Funeral policy will first consider the advice of the governor's office and MN Bishop when determining availability. Policy will be similar to worship policy.
- Our own groups using the building must follow policy at the time (no meetings while the church is closed and then follow guidelines as we slowly reopen). Before an individual or group is present in the building, they must have an orientation to our policies and procedures by Anne Gustafson, director of operations, or a designee.
- Outside group use/rental at this point will not happen. When our policies allow for small group gatherings, they must follow our guidelines. Before an individual or group is present in the building, they must have an orientation to our policies and procedures by Anne Gustafson, director of operations, or a designee.
- Outreach events, such as Ruby's Pantry, will need prior approval of our leadership core team (council chairs, lay leaders, pastors, and director of operations) and must have a plan for safety and to follow social distancing policy.
- In-person worship will be the final step, not the next step. As restrictions lessen, we will find inperson, small-group ways for prayer and connection (e.g., hours the Sanctuary is open for prayer, small-group worship, drive-by blessings, small group outdoor worship).

Two Movies to Add to Your Bingeing List

Two new movies premiered in on Earth Day, April 22. One was *The Story of Plastic*, which is now showing on the Discovery Network. The other film released on YouTube is *Planet of the Humans*.

My daughter, Rebecca Bischoff, made arrangements for members of the Coppertop to see a screening of *The Story of Plastic*. I sent a link out to about 35 people. One person replied, "I've already seen this, and I'm cutting back on my use of plastics."

The point of the movie wasn't that you, the individual, need to quit using plastic, as much as it is about the plastics industry's plans to ramp up their production of plastic. It's touted as the movie "Big Plastic hopes you won't see." They'd rather blame you as a litterbug than take responsibility for producing even more plastic and selling it to other industries as the container of choice.

The other film, *Planet of the Humans*, is free on YouTube. I found it very depressing, so make sure you have something uplifting to do after the movie. To me, the only answer to save our planet after watching this was to severely curtail our population; or our standard of living; or how we make, buy, and package things.

Also, on March 18, 2020, right as many were being urged to stay at home, Big Plastics wrote to Alex Azar of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, encouraging them to tout the glories of single-use plastic. (And there is a peer-reviewed study that says plastic isn't any safer.)

I know you've been watching a lot of TV or bingewatching, so I'm adding these two movies to your list:
