

On the Journey With You

I was on a walk with a friend who is much younger than me, in excellent shape and very athletic. After walking for a while, I told her that she needed to slow down because I couldn't keep up with the pace. She said to me, "You're the one who has been setting the pace."

So often in life we find ourselves overwhelmed and overextended, and we want to tell others and the world to slow down, when the truth is that often we are the ones who are actually setting the pace. When we realize that, then we also begin to see that we have the power to make the healthy pace changes we need.

Even Jesus sometimes had trouble with managing the pace of life. Once he went away from all the others, in a time of great need, to rest and pray. Jesus slowed down the pace:

- **To prepare for ministry/work** He spent 40 days praying in the wilderness after his baptism and before he began his public ministry.
- **To recharge** Jesus sent the 12 disciples out to do ministry. When they returned, he encouraged them to take time away and rest.
- To deal with difficult emotions After Jesus learned that his cousin, John the Baptist, had been beheaded, he went away by himself to grieve. Hours before Jesus was arrested, he went a short distance away from his disciples to pray.
- When making important decisions Early in his ministry, Jesus spent a night alone in prayer before he chose the 12 disciples.

Jesus set time apart to prepare, to recharge, to deal with emotions, to make decisions, even when there was much work and need that he put aside to do so... and so can we. Let's remember that we have the power to set the pace.

What are ways we are blessing our community and world? We continue to give to our missionaries, to the local food shelf (CHUM), and to prison ministry. We took a special offering for the work of racial justice and for the annual conference love offering. From Our Faith Community Nurse

It's That Time!

October is a very good time to get that flu vaccine, especially this year as we cope with COVID-19. If one gets the vaccine too early, the coverage may not last through the season (which can go as late as May). Ask your provider which flu vaccine would be the best for you and your children. Those of you over 65 should be getting the high-dose vaccine which is stronger. There are some



contraindications to taking this form, so ask your provider.

We must be even more diligent as we enter this winter's flu season. It's reported that 5-20% of

adults will contract the flu. So what can we do to help prevent the flu? It goes without saying: get rest. A cool bedroom is helpful because it can help to increase melatonin, which can induce sleep. During the day, the sun suppresses melatonin and increases cortisol, which helps to prevent inflammation. So get outside while you can. Continue to wear your masks! If you have a cloth mask, remember to wash them each day if you've been out shopping, working, etc.

Decreasing stress is also important, as the more stress you experience the less active your immune system is. Exercise, yoga, and meditation all are preventative measures you can take. The CDC website has information on exercises and other activities that would be beneficial. Pick up the phone or face chat with friends and family. It may be a good time, too, to reactivate letter writing or journaling.

Humidification in your house, schools, or places of work will help the airborne viruses "go to ground" as the viruses join the droplets of water in the air, and therefore will decrease the risk of contracting flu. However, you must remember that flu can live up to eight hours on surfaces, which means hand washing for at least 20 seconds is very important. Washing the fronts and backs of your hands as well as your fingernails is equally important. Do not touch your face. If you can't wash, use that sanitizer that you keep in your car, your purse, or your backpack. It's very important to sanitize what you touch.

If you feel sick, stay home. Flu is contagious from the day before symptoms appear up to ten days post symptoms. Flu symptoms

can include severe headaches, aches and pains (enough that you don't want to get out of bed), fatigue, cough, fever, and sore throat. These symptoms can also be indicative of COVID-19, so it's important to contact your provider and discuss your symptoms, as you may need a test to see what you have contracted.

Just remember to take time for yourselves, practice distancing, wear your masks, wash your hands, and practice prayer and meditation —all can help us get through this time.

COVID-19 Update

CASPER surveying has begun in Minnesota and specifically in St. Louis County. CASPER stands for Community Assessment for Public Health Emergency Response, and this survey is being used for COVID. It gives public health officials information about what is happening in a specific area or region. People from the MN Department of Health will be going door-to-door asking a variety of questions and offering to do COVID tests. Participation is optional. Trying to get a better handle on those who have no symptoms will be very helpful in planning preventive strategies. First Methodist Church During Our First Pandemic in 1918

THANKSGIVING IN DULUTH APPEALS MORE THAN EVER

Observance of Day Is General, While Crowds Flock Into Churches for Prayer.

That Duluthians felt they had many reasons to give thanks yesterday was indicated by attendance at church and special services. Churches, which were open for the first time in seven weeks, and were filled to the doors. The victory sing at the Orpheum theater held at the close of the regular matinee under the direction of J. R. Batchelor, city recreational director in which the Victory chorus made its first ap-pearance, was also well attended. Theaters and movie houses drew

good crowds at two matinees and regular evening performances. The regular evening performances. The New Grand and Orpheum vaudeville bills brought many patrons. "Sis Hopkins" at the Lyceum also proved a drawing card. Special Thanksgiving music was given at the Rex. Zelda. Lyric and Strand theaters. The Victory matines at the First

Methodist church of the famous Russian Symphony orchestra which both patriotic and opera num-bers were given was attended by Duluth's music loving patrons. Emplusis on Significance.

At the churches, special emphasis was laid on the fact that thanks was due the Creator for the ending of the war, the return soon of the soldiers and sallors, the successful passing of the influenza epidemic and the harvest of 1918.

All city and county offices, with the exception of the health department which was open until noon, remained closed yesterday to allow the employes to observe Thanksgiv-ing. Banks mercantile houses and all stores with exception of cigar and fruit stores were also closed.

SUNDAY OF

Clergymen Report Diservance of Request for Prayer Season Among Families.

The third Sabbath on which the churches of Duluth have been closed owing to the influenza epidemic, was quietly observed 'yesterday by family worship in many homes of Duluth.

Ministers of all denominations united in recommending that mem-bers of their flocks and people should spend at least a portion of the day in prayer, meditation and scripture reading. In addition to the general notice given through the newspapers many pastors sent personal letters to members of their congregations, urging the observance of the day and counseling the offering of prayers especially apropriate to the present conditions which confront the state and nation.

A number of the clergy last night stated that they believed most of their congregations had devoted a part of the day to family worship. Clergy Hold Chapel.

Bishop J. D. Morrison said the Episcopal clergy of the city gathered at the bishop's chapel and celebrated Holy Communion, this being, as far as he knew the only gathering held in Episcopal churches but he believed that family worship. had been generally carried on by the membership.

Rev. W. W. Lawrence, pastor of Glen Avon Presbyterian church, said that the people of his congregation. had practically all complied with the recommendations of the ministers of

the city in practicing family worship in place of the usual church services. Rev. C. N. Pace, pastor of First Methodist church, said that family worship had been held in most of the homes of his congregation. Dur-ing the week, he sent personal letters to the different families calling attention to the need of appropriate ob-servance of the day and many had signified their intention to spend the day as recommended.

During the Pandemic of 1918, First Methodist Church went through many of the same issues that we experience today. Thanks to Linda Rau, we were able to obtain a few newspaper clippings from the Duluth News Tribune. The remainder of the second article can be found on the back page.

INFLUENZA GAINS IN DULUTH; 25 **CASES RECORDED**

While Quarantine Is Ordered by Health Department, Closing Is Not Deemed Wise,

Seventeen new cases of Spanish influenza were reported to Secretary M. P. Orchard of the Duluth health department yesterday. These cases were not confined to any one section of the city but were reported from Gary to Woodland. This makes a total of 25 cases in Duluth.

Inspectors of the health departs

Inspectors of the health department found two families in Gary in which two children were ill with the influenza. Physicians have been notified to report all suspected cases as well as those which have been diagnosed as the influenza. It is definitely know that those reported yesterray have the disease, Secretary Orchard stated.

chard stated.

Quarantine signs were placed on all the homes throughout the city in which the disease was known to exist. The regulations that govern diphtheria quarantine will apply in this instance. Persons are forbidden from entering or leaving the homes and tradesmen are forbidden to handle dishes or containers from the homes or to receive cash in hand for products purchased by those in quarantine. quarantine.

for products purchased by those in quarantine.

Many applications for permission to visit hospitals were refused by the health department. Only persons who have relatives seriously ill will be allowed to visit the hospitals.

No Closing Now.

Commissioner of Public Safety B. Silberstein reported that he had conferred with officials of the state board of health and that it was not deemed advisable at this time to order the theaters, churches or schools closed. The situation will be watched, Commissioner Silberstein stated, and if the disease shows signs of spreading, the ban will be put on public meetings.

"The majority of the cases reported were from persons who had brought the disease in," he said yesterday. "Several have just returned from other sections of the country where the disease has a hold, or else relatives brought the disease home, Only a few of the patients have caught it locally, as far as I can learn."

Lennon-Berini Scholarship 2020

In the 1950s, two young men, John Lennon and Joe Berini, served as First Methodist staff members who worked with Duluth youth, particularly in the Central Hillside area. To commemorate their work, a scholarship fund was developed in 1985. Subsequent contributions have helped to sustain the fund and have allowed for the presentation of 91 scholarships totaling \$95,190. The Lennon-Berini Scholarships for 2020 will be \$1,500 each.

The criteria for qualifying as an applicant are:

- Be a member of Duluth's First United Methodist Church
- Have completed at least two years of college
- Be pursuing a people-centered career

Application forms will be available on the church's website November 1, 2020. They will need to be fully completed and turned in by 4pm on Friday, November 20.

Applicants have two options for submitting materials: 1) print all materials and submit in hard-copy form to Committee Chair Terry Wallin, 29 East Toledo Street, Duluth, MN 55811; or 2) compile all materials (including completed application form, transcripts, recommendations, and candidate statements) into a **single electronic file** and send it to Selection Committee Chair Terry Wallin (teto62@charter.net).

Incomplete applications will not be considered. The Scholarships will be awarded during the worship service on December 27, 2020.

Fast Fashion Equals Pollution

This month I'm writing about a subject that causes me to be conflicted. It's "fast fashion." Last month I thought about plugging "Second-Hand September." That's a pledge that you won't purchase anything new in September. I used to pride myself on putting together outfits I bought at upscale second-hand boutiques. But how could I do that when my employer is pushing a style event that same month?

Fast fashion is low-priced clothing that is brought to market quickly. It's often made offshore and sells out fast. If you don't purchase an item you see, it most likely will not be available later. Men, this applies to you, too. How much did that \$5 T-shirt really cost?

Maybe you're not interested in fashion, but everyone must wear something. No matter what your style, do you know who made your clothing? Were they paid a living wage? Most clothing contains synthetics. When we wash clothes, pieces of polyester (plastic) enter our water system. Further, if we lived near fabric factories, we would know the color being produced because dye runoff would pollute the rivers.

Sewing clothes used to save money. Now it's often an expensive hobby. Most buy clothes today, but the average American is now purchasing 60 percent more clothing items every year and keeps them for about half as long as 15 years ago, generating massive amounts of waste. Don't get me wrong—I love a good deal. I just want you to think about what you are wearing, who made it, where it was produced and how much waste was incurred making it.

Most manufacturers have websites with contact information. Contact your favorite retailers and let them know you're concerned about the effects of the manufacturing process and the disposal of the clothing you purchase from them.



Conference Backs Replacing Cross and Flame Insignia



"Here are some things about me: I am a second grade teacher and I love my job! I enjoy learning new things with my students every day. My cat Henry also attends virtual read-alouds with the class. My hobbies include drawing and oil painting. I also enjoy being outdoors and gardening."

What was the first school started by Methodists?

Wesley believed everyone should have access to education regardless of gender or class. In 1748 he enlarged a school he had opened for the children of coal miners near Bristol and named it the *Kingswood School*. His goal for the school was to give young people a high quality education so they could aspire to Cambridge or Oxford and to the professions. He championed education as a way to assure

that leaders would act ethically and responsibly.

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
