On the Journey With You

What a challenging 20 months we have been through as a world, nation, community, and church, and as families and individuals. I remember at the end of March, 2020, I sent the staff home because of the COVID pandemic, certain that this would only be a temporary situation and that we would be back working in the office within the next couple of weeks. It ended up being over a year of primarily working from home, and even now we are not fully back in the office as we have many meetings over Zoom (I didn't even know what Zoom was before the pandemic—teleconferencing through computers for meetings and gatherings).

That same week we recorded worship to play in people's homes rather than gathering for worship in our Sanctuary. I was certain that we would be back in our Sanctuary for Easter. As it turns out, we weren't back in the Sanctuary even the following Easter. And now many of us are back, but we socially distance and wear masks. Many continue worshipping online on Sunday mornings at 10am, and others worship online some other time during the week.

We are still in the midst of a pandemic. At the start of the pandemic, the church council determined that we had but one goal—to keep people alive, physically, spiritually, and emotionally, and we have made decisions using that as our guide. You have been willing to do what it takes to make people feel both physically and emotionally safe. And in so doing, you have proclaimed your growing faith loudly.

Our congregation has been so resilient, so cooperative, so willing to make sacrifices for the common good, so encouraging, and so thankful. You have worshipped online, worshipped outside, had fellowship times and even funeral receptions outside, gathered outside for concerts, had drive-in worship, attended drive-in movies, participated in food drives and a huge project at Christmas to help CHUM (Churches United in Ministry - our local social service

agency), participated in a variety of recycling initiatives, gave special offerings to support people of color in the midst of racial tensions, called and checked in on people, gave gift cards, helped with food needs, stayed connected by participating in online worship, made Ruby's Pantry happen in new ways, and gifted the community with a COVID-safe rummage sale, a drive-through roast beef dinner, and so much more. I am so proud of you... so proud of our congregation! We have been every bit as much a church during the pandemic as before. We have clung to what really matters.

Throughout the pandemic, including now, our financial giving has remained strong and generous. We have been able to meet our ministry, mission, and building needs. Thank you so much! I know many of you have given extra, knowing that others were less able to give. You make a difference! You enabled us to move forward, including adding a whole new online ministry in the midst of a pandemic.

Each year at this time, we ask and invite you to think about what your financial giving for the upcoming year will be. We do this so we can create our budget for the upcoming year and to give you the opportunity to engage in the spiritual discipline of considering what God is calling you to give financially. This year you will be asked to make your estimate of giving for 2022 on Consecration Sunday, November 14.

Twenty-five people from our congregation have been recorded on video talking about what our

church means to them and why it is important that our congregation is here. You heard some of them on October 24 and will hear others on November 7 and 14. On October 31, you heard from our children. It does matter that we are here. We are blessed to be a part of this community, and we bless others because we are here.

The week of November 7, you will receive a letter from me with your estimate of giving card and a survey letting us know how you have been connecting with the church, your upcoming plans for connection, and needs/hopes you have. We will ask you to prayerfully fill them out and return them to church. Those worshipping in person will bring them to church on Consecration Sunday, **November 14** and place them in the offering plate. On that Sunday, as a way to celebrate our giving and our life together, Paul Sapyta will have made two kinds of soup, and every person will leave with a bowl of soup (in a compostable container) to eat at home. For those worshipping online, you will be invited to drive by church on Sunday, November 14 from 11:15am-12:30pm to drop off your estimate of giving card and participation survey and to get your soup. I will personally greet each car and will be so happy to see you.

Please be prayerfully thinking of what this congregation means to you and others... and what God is leading you to give financially in the coming year. Be blessed... and be a blessing!

Worship in November

We continue to worship in person in our Sanctuary every Sunday at 10am AND online on YouTube every Sunday morning beginning at 9:55am. The service can also be watched anytime after 10am Sunday morning. The service on YouTube is a livestream of the service happening in the Sanctuary. At this time, due to the conference COVID plan as well as the county's request for masks indoors for all people regardless of vaccination status, we are asking everyone to wear masks at all times indoors. Weather permitting, we will have our fellowship time each Sunday outdoors, as we will not be eating or drinking indoors.

Sunday, November 7: All-Saints Sunday – we will name, light a candle, and ring a bell for those from our congregation who have died this past year. We will recognize Veterans Day and will celebrate Holy Communion. Remember that it is also daylight saving time, so set your clock **back** an hour.

Sunday, November 14: Consecration Sunday - you will be asked to make estimates of your financial giving to the ministry and mission of our church for 2022. You will receive a bowl of soup following worship to enjoy at home (see pastor's article for more information).

Sunday, November 21: Thanksgiving Sunday - we will unveil and kick off our Advent/Christmas mission project.

Sunday, November 28: - First Sunday in Advent - The Candle of Hope. The sermon is called, "O Little Inn of Bethlehem... and the Twin Ports."

Annual Fall Bazaar Again Canceled Due to COVID Pandemic.

For the second year in a row, the United Methodist Women (UMW) of FUMC have canceled the fall/Christmas Bazaar due to COVID concerns. The event, known as the Coppertop Craft, Bake, and Book Sale, was scheduled for November 6. This once again severely limits the extent to which they could make gifts to the various UMW outreach ministries and all the worthy local organizations who are supported financially with proceeds from the Bazaar each year. In past years, they have given over \$3,000 per year (all from Bazaar revenue) to local charities and programs.





Vaccines For COVID-19, Flu, and HPV

Greetings! Temperatures are beginning to fall, and we will say goodbye to summer and fall soon, which brings to mind that it is time for the FLU vaccine. With people now congregating indoors, it is important to get your flu inoculation. One good thing about the flu season is that we should still be wearing masks inside, and we have been practicing sanitizing our hands, which will help to slow down the flu.

On the COVID front, if you are eligible to receive a booster, please do so. It has been determined by the FDA that interchanging vaccines is



okay, but it is preferable to stick with the one you received first. Children ages 5 to 11 may be eligible by the beginning of November. More testing sites and times have also been added around the state and at the DECC. Check the <u>MDH (MN Dept. of Health)</u> for sites.

HPV (human papilloma virus) is a virus, but its vaccine can help prevent cancer. It is recommended to get this vaccine between the ages of 9 and 14. Generally it is given to 11–to 12–year–olds when children's bodies will have the strongest immune response and before they become sexually active. Two doses 6 to 12 months apart are given. A third dose is needed for people ages 15 to 26. This is not a vaccine only given to girls, as many people have believed. Boys should also be immunized, as they can be carriers of the virus and get the sexually-transmitted infection and cancers. It is known that 85% of people will be infected in their lifetimes, and while most can clear the virus, those that don't can get cervical, vulvar, vaginal, anal, penile, and throat cancers. The vaccine has been proven to be safe and effective and has decreased some kinds of cancer in teen girls and young adult women by 70–85%.

Blessings to you. I leave you with Psalm 54:4, "Behold, God is my helper and ally; the Lord is my upholder and is with them who uphold my life."

good, and love your neighbor, all in the name and spirit of Jesus.

Specifically I encourage you: If you have not been vaccinated and are eligible to receive a vaccine, do it. It is the single most important thing you can do to care for yourself and for others. The unvaccinated remain those most likely to be hospitalized and suffer severe illness or death because of COVID. They are also capable of spreading the disease for longer periods of time. Get vaccinated. Encourage your fellowchurch members to get vaccinated. If you are eligible for a booster, get your booster shot.

Due to our positivity rate, we remain in the <u>Yellow Phase of our</u> <u>Re-Gathering Plan</u>, which strongly encourages masking by everyone when meeting in-person and indoors. If you are in a high-risk area, consider mandating masks for indoor, in-person gatherings. After vaccinations, masks are the next best tool we have for slowing the spread of the coronavirus, and

EarthKeepers

Jesus said, "Let nothing be wasted." by Naomi Yaeger, EarthKeeper

The Environmental Institute at Fond du Lac Tribal and Community College studies and promotes sustainable agriculture and other topics through the use of a medicinal garden, beehives, and a greenhouse. I am fortunate to work for the Institute as a part-time student.

Recently we celebrated Sustainability Awareness Week. We kicked off with a feast of Indigenous foods: fried walleye, maple-roasted squash, manoomin (wild rice), cranberry bread, and Baby Cakes (cupcakes baked with wild rice flour and maple syrup, made by an Ojibwe mother/daughter team).

Before feasts, tobacco and prayers are offered. At one of our feasts, we all stood waiting patiently. I was anxious, however, as no one knew who was going to offer the prayer. One young woman was asked to give the prayer. She said she couldn't because she didn't know Ojibwe well enough. Someone replied, "If you didn't have a voice, do you think the Great Spirit wouldn't know when you were praying?" The answer is, "Of course, the Great Spirit would hear you!"

My role at the feast was to facilitate composting. I collaborated with other team members to make sure we had compostable dinnerware and contacted WLSSD to reserve a party kit (which included special bins, compostable liners, and signage) and transport it. At the college, I cheerfully informed people that their dinnerware and all food waste were compostable and showed them exactly where they could dispose of their waste. I've found that many people want to do the right thing but are confused. This is true at church. People are often unsure if what they need to dispose of is recyclable or compostable.

I suggest you think of God when you recycle or compost. Unlike humans, God doesn't waste anything. I think composting is actually a miracle. Make it into an act of conscious gratefulness to the Lord. (God will hear you if even you don't vocalize page 10 it.) Consider when Jesus fed the multitude with five loaves and two fish in John 6:12, "Gather the pieces that are left over. Let nothing be wasted."

slowing the spread also prevents the virus from developing into new variants. Together, masking and vaccinations will help us stem the rising tide of the coronavirus.

Finally, allow me to say a word about religious exemptions for vaccinations. The United Methodist tradition of the Christian faith does not provide much support for a religious exemption for vaccinations. John Wesley promoted the best cures and preventative measures of his day in his work *Primitive Physick*. Founding hospitals is a significant part of our history as Methodists. Our Social Principles assert that "health care is a basic human right." I have consistently encouraged Minnesota United Methodists to get vaccinated. It would be extraordinarily difficult to use our United Methodist tradition to substantiate a religious exemption claim for a COVID vaccination.

Friends, I continue to believe that by God's grace we can muster the resilience, the kindness, and the determination to do what needs to be done to get past this pandemic. As followers of Jesus, we can lead in promoting public health, furthering the common good, and caring for the well-being of others. When we act out of love for neighbors and care for our community, we offer a powerful witness to the grace of God in Jesus Christ.
