On the Journey With You

I have good friends, Ken and Marion, who lived near me when I lived in Maple Grove, MN. They were in their mid 80s—several decades older than me, but we shared a special bond.

In addition to being their friend, I was also their pastor. One day many years ago, I went to visit Ken in the hospital. As the three of us were visiting, the doctor came into the room to talk about his condition. I was going to leave so they could have their privacy, but Ken and Marion encouraged me to stay.

The doctor told Ken that he was in almost complete heart failure. Ken asked what that meant, and the doctor told him that he might have a year of life left, but that his heart was so bad he could die at any moment and he needed to prepare. They talked a bit more, and then the doctor left.

I stood in that room trying to figure out what to say to offer comfort to these dear friends who had been married for more than 60 years. I was still trying to form words when Ken said, "Let's join hands in prayer and thank God for the wonderful life I've had, and give God thanks for whatever time I have left."

And we prayed together... and cried together... and in the midst of it, there was a deep spirit of thanksgiving to God. God was clearly present in that room. There was joy and peace in that room in a time which could have been filled only with grief and despair.

Ken knew what it meant to give thanks in all circumstances. And his attitude of gratitude brought him peace—that peace that Scripture promises which transcends all human understanding because it is not dependent upon our circumstances, but is a gift from God.

Ken's spirit was made well because of his thankful heart. He lived almost eight years after that day in the hospital room. I wonder if it was his thankful heart that kept his physical heart beating much longer than doctors thought possible.


Youth News

Put your money to work for justice. When you buy organic, you guarantee more farmers can grow healthy, safe food. When you buy fair trade, you provide living wages and fight poverty. When you buy from a business owned by women or people of color, you help build an inclusive economy. When you bank with a community bank or credit union, you are more likely not to be funding fossil fuel projects. umcreationjustice.org

Take this practical step toward understanding your energy usage and a more sustainable home. A Call to Grace

Delegates and church leaders urge The United Methodist Church to "A Call to Grace."

A wide coalition is urging The United Methodist Church to live out its values of grace and reconciliation by allowing congregations the option to exit the denomination nowsomething that can be achieved at the local level and is not dependent on General Conference legislation. "A Call to Grace," released Nov 1, 2021, includes signatures from a broad array of rank-and-file church members, General and Jurisdictional Conference delegates, denominational leaders, and many in the Reconciling movement.

The postponement of General Conference has been a disappointment for many, but a "love your neighbor" approach to COVID-19 safety remains a priority. While still undecided, the conference scheduled for August 2022 is at risk due to health concerns and world-wide travel restrictions. "A Call to Grace" offers an alternative option that overcomes the continued and unavoidable delays. <u>acalltograce.com/press-release</u>

It appears likely that the General Conference scheduled for August-September 2022 may be postponed again as COVID-19 continues to spread globally and many continue to suffer from inequitable distribution of vaccines.

Waiting on General Conference legislative solutions is no longer the only way forward. Continued delay in making decisions about the future of The United Methodist Church hurts our mission and is especially harmful to our LGBTQIA+ siblings who are caught up in this conflict.

Now is the time to focus on strategies for a gracious exit that can be enacted at the annual conference, central conference, and jurisdictional levels. We call on bishops, conference leaders, and all United Methodists to join us in this effort.

Sustainability Practice: Kitchen Composting

Composting Protects the Climate

Food scraps in landfills generate methane, a greenhouse gas with a global warming potential 84 times more potent than CO2 in the short term. But when converted into compost and applied to the land, compost sequesters carbon, strengthens soil, promotes healthy plant growth, and reduces the need for pesticides and synthetic fertilizers.

What is WLSSD Compostable?

All foods: cooked, raw, frozen, and spoiled

Bones: meat, fish, poultry Carcasses: turkey and chicken

Egg shells

Pits and peelings: vegetables and fruits All fats (only small amounts of grease)

Coffee grounds and filters

Tea bags

Flowers and plant cuttings
Paper napkins without glitter
Compostable dinnerware (*BPI)
Compostable glasses and cups (*BPI)

No liquids, please! *Biodegradable Products Institute certified

Line a container of your choice with a biodegradable kitchen compost bag to collect the above items for composting. FUMC has a large bin out back for our members marked "FOOD WASTE" in which you may drop off your bag(s). Public Drop Sites can be found at <u>wlssd.com</u>.

HINT: The bags can be stored in a freezer until a trip to a Drop Site is feasible.

How to Have a Green Christmas

Make Christmas sustainable by determining what is important to you. When I was a child, it was all about the special gifts we got. Also it was the anticipation and excitement. Mom said she didn't fancy herself a cook, but I remember all the special treats we had at Christmas. Of course we had to have a Christmas tree. Decorating it was fun. Decorating the house with Mom was fun. As a young mother active in a group of stay-at-home mothers, I learned that some mothers didn't like decorating. It stressed them. I suggest just placing a poinsettia on a table; you can call that good.

I must admit as a child it may have been the gifts. But now I think it's the special feelings. As a low-income woman, I cried on Christmas Day when I dropped and broke a Mr. Coffee maker that my teenage brother gave me. It was partly because we were so poor and partly because my teenage brother thought enough to figure out what I really wanted.

Here are some tips for a Green Christmas:

- Give experiences rather than things, like tickets to concerts or shows or museums
- Attending a candlelight service on Christmas Eve is an experience
- · Look for locally made gifts
- Choose gifts made from recycled sources
- Give "old" gold jewelry. The production of new gold involves the use of toxic chemicals.
- Used gifts used to be considered taboo. One woman gave a friend a pair of earrings that the friend admired. That way she knew her friend would like them.
- · Gifts of social service and animal welfare

The United Methodist arm of charitable giving to those in need is the General Board of Global Ministries (GBGM). There are several projects within the GBGM; each one is called an advance and has a number. You can do an internet search and pick a project that has special meaning to you. advance.umcmission.org

- Steer clear of items in glass jars, dry baking items, condiments, candy, potato chips, and snacks. These can be difficult to store and difficult to give away equitably.
- Food Shelf donations are accepted Monday-Friday mornings (8:30am to 12:30pm).
- Remember that food is great, but we can do so much more with cash—we can currently purchase \$7 worth of food for every \$1 donated.

Repurposing Medical Supplies

A new ministry opportunity is coming your way. Our church congregation is invited to collect and bring to church unused, unopened medical supplies to be repurposed for others in need. People who have had recent hospitalizations or have had a recent death in the family or a friend's family usually have supplies that are no longer useful to them. Through a relationship with Global Health Ministries in St. Paul, these supplies, which are listed below, will be used through that program or the College of St. Scholastica's nursing mission.

Gina Diaz, nursing faculty at the College of St. Scholastica, leads a group of nursing students each year to serve in Manila, the Philippines, to provide care at Mary Johnston Hospital, a Methodist affiliated hospital/clinic. Some collections will be used for their mission project, and the majority of supplies will be used to support the United Methodist's health programs throughout the world and in the United States. There are more than 300 United Methodist health facilities around the world which support programs targeting maternal child health, malaria, HIV/AIDS, disaster relief, and other health programs.

If you, or a friend of yours, no longer need medical supplies that you find on the list of acceptable items, please bring the articles to church to the collection box located outside the office. If the item has a shelf life, it is requested that at least one year remains until the expiration date. We will begin collecting in January. Allen Klingsporn, a Duluth resident who is on the Board of Global Health Ministries, will transport supplies to the collection location in St. Paul. These supplies will then be shipped to where they are needed.

List of supplies needed by Methodist Global Health Ministries and the Philippine Project are included here:

- PPE (Personal Protective Equipment)—gloves (not latex) especially in sizes M, L, and XL; eye protection; face shields; surgical and cloth masks; surgical gloves sizes 6.5 to 8.
- Syringes, 5 and 10 ml.
- Dressings and gauze, surgical sponges, and Q-tip applicators
- Lubricating ielly
- Disinfectant sponges and swabs
- Cotton twin, or hospital-size, flat sheets and cotton bed protectors
- Transfer belts
- Ace bandages, BandAids®, 4x4 butterfly closures, other dressings
- Suction or urinary catheters
- Nasal oxygen cannulas or masks
- Braces, slings, supports
- Wheelchairs, walkers, crutches
- •Scrub/prep sponges, brushes, iodine

- Surgical tape, any type
- Stethoscopes, blood pressure cuffs

This mission is an outgrowth of the Sustainability Group, in hopes that the supplies will benefit many others in their healing process and to minimize the number of articles tossed away and finding their way into landfills.

I hope that everyone has a safe holiday season. Please wear masks, get your boosters, get COVID tested if you are exposed, and just be diligent to protect yourself and others. By doing so, you will be giving a great gift this time of year. God poured out His love for us in giving us Jesus, so let's love and protect one another.
