

I have several random thoughts floating through my mind and decided I will share them for this start-of-the-year pastor's column. Maybe one or more of them will speak to your heart.

- 1. My dad had a birthday last month. A church member dropped off a card and cupcakes for him. That delighted me and brought joy to my spirit. Doesn't it feel amazing when someone does something good (or says something affirming) for your child or parent or someone you love? For me, I feel more blessed when someone does something kind and loving for a loved one than when they do it for me. When we want to show love and bless someone, sometimes the best thing we can do is think about who/what they love and bless that person or organization. Perhaps it works the same in showing God's love—loving and caring for the people and things God loves is the best way to worship and honor God.
- 2. I was shopping at Kohl's. The lines were long. A gentleman at the register was very slowly writing out a check for his purchases. The young woman behind him was obviously getting frustrated with the time he was taking. Her mother calmly said to her, "Honey, pretend he is your granddad. Would you want someone getting frustrated with him if he was slow?" And I watched how that changed the young woman's attitude and level of patience. When we get frustrated with someone in line going slowly, or driving slowly—when we find ourselves getting irritated with a noisy or misbehaving child—let's think of how we would want a loved one in the same situation treated. It changes everything when we think that way, doesn't it?
- 3. In December Mark Whitlock asked me to be the narrator for the Twin Ports Brass Orchestra Holiday Concert. I thought that meant reading something before or after a song or two, so I agreed to do so. Then he sent me an email with pages of music, and it became clear to me that I would be narrating while the music was being

played. A sense of panic filled me. I barely read music and wasn't sure how I would pull this off. I talked with my Nicole, and she said to find the songs on YouTube and listen to them. That helped. Then I talked with Mark. He told me that I would be standing near him and he would direct me, pointing to me each time I was to read. We had a couple of practices. I have never watched anyone more intently than I did Mark during that concert. I was totally dependent upon him for cues as to when to read. It worked well and it was exhilarating. It was so fun! It was something I hadn't done before, and doing this new thing brought fun and joy to my soul. I was reminded in this experience of the importance of taking risks and trying new things. I also learned how important it is to lean on others and trust them to help and guide. I hope you try new things in this coming year, and trust God and others to help and guide you.

4. Finally, I had a beautiful and lifegiving visit with a friend last month. She shared this poem with me, by Mary Oliver, and it touched me. I thought it might also bless you.

"The Gift" by Mary Oliver Be still, my soul, and steadfast. Earth and heaven both are still watching.

Though time is draining from the clock And your walk, that was confident and quick, has become slow.

So, be slow if you must, but let the heart still play its true part. Love still as once you loved, deeply and without patience.

Refugee For 50 Minutes

On Sunday, January 16 at 11:15am in the East Lounge, Khalil (Haji) Dokhanchi, UWS Professor, will present an interactive exhibit *Refugee for 50 Minutes: From Afghanistan to Germany.* The exhibit was originally designed and presented by Haji's Political Science students to teach the UWS students and their community about:

- LEGAL DEFINITION OF REFUGEES: How does international law define refugees?
- REFUGEE LEGAL PROTECTIONS: What kind of rights are we legally obligated to offer to refugees?
- PUSH FACTORS: Why do refugees leave?
- PULL FACTORS: Why do certain countries look more attractive than others to refugees?
- REFUGEE EXPERIENCE: How do refugees travel thousands of miles (opportunities and threats)?
- REFUGEE STATUS DETERMINATION: How are refugees recognized as refugees?
- REFUGEE RESETTLEMENT: What types of problems and prospects do refugees face when they try to resettle?

From Our Faith Community Nurse

Greetings Everyone,

It is my hope that all had a safe, peaceful, and blessed Christmas. At this time, I am reminded of the incredible star that the wise men followed from their eastern homeland to Jerusalem and on to Bethlehem. I can't help but wonder what exactly did they see; for I believe that they were led by some phenomenon in the sky. In



remembering the star, keep that bright light within you and share outwardly as we continue to help each other during these trying times.

Here is one way that you can help: begin collecting unused,

unopened medical supplies. These supplies will be transported to the Philippines by Gina Diaz and St. Scholastica's nursing students for use at the Methodist-run Mary Johnston Hospital. They will also be used by the Methodist Global Health Ministries in the US and other parts of the world. If you or family members or friends no longer have a need for some of these supplies, bring them to church and place them in the labeled box by the office.

Supplies needed by Methodist Global Health Ministries and the Philippine Project:

- Personal Protective Equipment—gloves (not latex), especially in sizes M, L, and XL; eye protection; face shields; surgical and cloth masks
- Surgical gloves, sizes 6.5 to 8
- Syringes, 5 and 10 ml.
- Dressings and gauze, surgical sponges, Q-tip applicators
- Lubricating jelly
- Disinfectant sponges, swabs
- Cotton twin or hospital size flat bed sheets, cotton bed protectors
- Transfer belts
- Ace[™] bandages, BandAids[™], 4x4's, butterfly closures, other dressings
- Suction or urinary catheters
- Nasal oxygen cannulas or masks
- Braces, slings, supports
- Wheelchairs, walkers, crutches
- Scrub/prep sponges, brushes, iodine
- Surgical tape of any type
- Stethoscopes, blood pressure cuffs

CHUM Warming Center

CHUM is experiencing a surge of unsheltered community members at the Warming Center located at Rainbow Center, 211 N 3rd Ave E. They are at capacity, and you can help! Volunteers and donations of basic necessities are especially needed to support their guests.

Volunteers: At least two volunteers are needed every evening and every morning to help CHUM staff clean up, set up, serve coffee, and distribute clothing and hygiene supplies. Volunteer shifts are generally 2–2.5 hours.

Many of CHUM's guests live with high barriers to housing and shelter, including untreated mental illness and substance use disorder. Volunteers should come to the Warming Center with compassion, healthy boundaries, and an ability to adapt to changing needs. CHUM staff will always be present when volunteers are on-site.

Volunteer requirements:

- Must be over 18
- Must be fully vaccinated against COVID-19 and wear a mask when at the Warming Center
- Must take part in a volunteer orientation
- Weekly commitment preferred
