On the Journey With You

Redefining what it means to be a United Methodist Christian

I am a United Methodist Christian.

When I say that I am a United Methodist Christian, I am saying that I believe God has Good News of love, salvation, and abundant life for ALL people, and I am called to share that Good News. I am not saying that I am called to convert other people or disrespect the honest faithful conviction of others where it differs from my own, but I am called to actively share about God's love.

When I say that I am a United Methodist Christian, I am saying that I believe that through the Holy Spirit I can have a connection with God, as I follow the path of Jesus Christ, that is real and alive and impacts my daily living. I am not saying that others who don't follow the path I take are excluded from a relationship with God, just that the path of Jesus Christ connects me to God in a powerful way that I want to invite others to experience.

When I say that I am a United Methodist Christian, I am saying that I believe that the way Jesus lived, died, and faced/overcame death's powers provides a way to the heart of God. I believe it is God's gift—God's work, that offers all people life here and life in the after. How God works in the hearts of other people isn't for me to judge. I'm only called to openly listen to (and celebrate) others' experiences, and share my own with passion.

When I say that I am a United Methodist Christian, I am saying that I need to be saved over and over and over again from my own prejudices, closed-mindedness, arrogance, insecurities, and self-focus.

When I say that I am a United Methodist Christian, I am saying that I believe with Jesus that all people are included, and welcome, in the circle of God's love and embrace. Where I see others trying to close

the circle to include only people who believe like them, or look, feel, and experience like them, I am called to open wide the circle of God's love, even if it requires risk and sacrifice.

When I say that I am a United Methodist Christian, I am saying that I love Scripture and believe the Bible is the living, breathing Word of God with the power to change and save lives. I am not saying that I read the Bible as the literal, inerrant words of God, but that it is the powerful Word of God, and I embrace it in its humanity and divinity, allowing it to change my heart and connect me with God and others.

When I say that I am a United Methodist Christian, I am saying that I am called to Biblical obedience. Whenever I am faced with injustice and oppression, I am called by God to stand against it in word and action, even when that injustice and oppression is done in the name of the church.

When I say that I am a United Methodist Christian, I am saying that I am striving to love God with my whole heart, soul, strength, and mind, and seeking to love others as I love myself. That means I must be open to the stories and experiences of people different from me, and not only open to their stories and experiences, but willing to allow their hearts to impact how I see, understand, and relate in the world, even when it isn't comfortable for me.

When I say that I am a United Methodist Christian, I am saying that I don't have all the answers, but I am willing and open to be taught by the Holy Spirit. Sometimes the Holy Spirit teaches me through Scripture, through the words and experiences of others, through my own experiences, and through prayer. Knowing that I don't have all the answers gives me a sense of humility in responding to others who are also seeking their best to know and do God's will.

When I say that I am a United Methodist Christian, I am saying that I am a beloved one created by God and unconditionally loved by the One who created me. All others are also beloved ones of God and are also unconditionally loved by God. That is how I am called to see and treat others.

When I say that I am a United Methodist Christian, I am saying that the door of my heart is open to you and hope that the door of your heart is open to me. And I pray that we can live together as a community of God's people, living humbly in relation to each other, doing justice together as we fight all forms of oppression, and offering each other mercy and grace as we experience God in richer ways together than we can alone.

From Our Faith Community Nurse

Greetings!

Time to get outside more and more now that summer is on its way. I have daffodils blooming in my yard, and the birds are migrating it's thrilling to see the pelicans again this year, find the robins' bright blue eggs in a nest, and hear the sound of thunder.

A book written by Richard Louv, *Last Child in the Woods*, published in 2006, outlined his thesis that boys and girls were living in a denatured environment. He called it a nature deficit disorder. Many children suffer from a disassociation from the natural world and need to be reintroduced to its restorative qualities. Thankfully there has been progress in children's environmental education. Many preschools now focus on outdoor education. Research has shown that walking and experiencing the woods through all of your senses has healthy benefits. In nature we can experience God's wisdom and love. "Be still and know that I am God," Psalm 46:10. Take pleasure and slow the pace through God's creativity.

Here are a few lines of a poem by Stacy Smith, "Less is Lord:"

Humble me, Lord, into the beauty of your creation, For you have created me for sabbath You who have fed the sparrows, You who have clothed the lilies, You have created the sweet breath of wind that Flows off the fields and causes me to sigh— You would give me the source of my breath, the space to breathe, Enable my still-ing, encourage my resting, and plant in my mind the seed of summer truth that less can be more, that less can be Lord

I'd also like to share my gratitude to our lay pastors, who visit in person or by phone or mail with many of our congregants, whether they be at home, in the hospital, or at an extended care facility.

Our lay pastors include Mike Donahue, Linda Harper, Sarah Maddy, Naomi Yeager, Linda Rau, Karen Alseth, Linda Peterson, Pamela Brown, and me. Each of these individuals sign up for a one-week term about every two months. During our visits we converse, and offer support and comfort as needed through active listening, reading, and prayer. In general, we provide a friendly visit and update them on church happenings.

Lay pastor qualities can include a person who can be comfortable to sit quietly, accept others as they are, one who values the faith community as necessary for spiritual growth, one who can keep confidentiality, and one who can pray for another's well-being.

The ministry of visitation is an important link to our members.

Update on the United Methodist Church

The denomination known as The United Methodist Church is evolving. May 1 saw the launch of the Global Methodist Church, a "theologically-conservative breakaway denomination" that is rallying around a conservative view of sexuality that does not affirm LGBTQIA+ full inclusion. First United Methodist Church, along with the Minnesota Annual Conference, continues to remain with The United Methodist Church and continues our long standing commitment to the full welcome and inclusion of all people.

In June 2019, the Minnesota Annual Conference of the UMC members voted 491-86 to adopt a vision for Minnesota that names a commitment to the full inclusion of LGBTQIA+ people in the life of the church. "As a diverse body of Christ, we are called to be faithful to the example of Jesus' ministry to and with all persons," the vision says. "Consequently, we are committed to inclusiveness in all aspects of the life of the Church, by embracing the richness of diversity found in sexual orientation, race, physical or mental ability, national origin, marital status, gender identity, ethnicity, economic status, and age."

COVID-19 Protocol Update

Dear Friends,

On Tuesday, May 17, your Church Council discussed where we are with COVID numbers and has decided to continue our current approach as we transition to an endemic way of being together. We continue doing this with real-time monitoring, so protocols are subject to change if data change. Here is the current plan:

• Masks are encouraged and available but not required on Sunday mornings except when singing (so please bring a mask). Note: On Sundays when we anticipate a larger attendance than usual, we may ask for people to wear masks on that Sunday.

• Coffee and donuts will be available following worship, outdoors when possible, or in Lakeviw Social Hall, when we can find people to do the setup and cleanup.

• Masks are optional in the church building, unless the group or group leader decides to make a different choice. Please honor your group/group leader if it is deemed best for masks to be worn.

• Please wear masks while visiting the church office, since it is a small space.

• Anytime there is singing, masks must be worn.

• We will allow lightly catered receptions (not full meals) in the Lakeviw Social Hall for funerals and other events, with capacity not exceeding 75 people.

In order to make this work and to continue keeping everyone safe, everyone is going to need to do good self-monitoring. If you are ill, please stay home and use online opportunities. Please feel comfortable worshipping on YouTube from your home and attending church meetings via Zoom if that is safest and best for you. Please get vaccinations if appropriate.

The overall health and well-being of the congregation has been, and will continue to be, our utmost priority. Remember, we are doing this with real-time monitoring, so protocols are subject to change if data change. We greatly appreciate your ongoing patience and adherence to our pandemic protocol in this most unusual time.

The Warming Center closed on April 1, and folks are again camping out while waiting for solutions to the housing crisis. Executive Director John Cole and CHUM Warming Center Coordinator Joel Kilgour have been meeting with city and county officials, service providers, business owners, and congregations to take the steps necessary to implement this five-year plan to make sure everyone in our community has a place to live.

Why Stepping On Up? Joel offers the following thoughts:

- "We believe everyone in our community should have access to housing and shelter that is safe and dignified, especially during Duluth's cold winters. Everyone who is experiencing homelessness is a child or parent or coworker or friend, and we should approach the issue like we would if it were our kin suffering."
- "There are real and serious public health and safety risks to people living outside in unsanctioned encampments or sleeping in skywalks and doorways. We are all committed to addressing this problem."

Duluth faces a critical shortage of shelter beds, affordable housing, and chemical and mental health treatment. Even when people reach out for help, there is often nowhere for them to go. The only long-term solution to the personal and societal consequences of homelessness is to work together to remedy their underlying causes.
