This is an election month, and I hope you will get out and vote. It is our duty and privilege. And always, I hope your voting will be an expression of your faith values.


We all recognize that we are living in a contentious, polarizing political climate. Many politicians aren't working together for the greater good but are instead spreading falsehood and demonizing each other. We hear voices of extremists, which keep us from working together. As a result, we are stalled in coming up with ways to solve the gun violence problem... in working on abortion concerns... there has been great polarization around COVID protocols... it seems leadership is at opposing ends on so many issues where if there were compromise, truth-telling, and working together, we just might be able to make our nation and world better.

What's even more alarming and wearying is it is feeling like the divisive political climate is making its way everywhere. People don't just get upset and disappointed when there are differences or grievances, instead it is all too easy to demonize the one we disagree with or have an issue with. walking-around life—and place it before God as an offering. Embracing what God does for you is the best thing vou can do for God. Don't become so well-adjusted to your culture that you fit into it without even thinking. Instead, fix your attention on God. You'll be changed from the inside out. Readily recognize what God wants from you and quickly respond to it. Unlike the culture around you, always dragging you down to its level of immaturity, God brings the best out of you and develops well-formed maturity in vou."

May God develop well-formed maturity in us as we interact with each other and all the situations and issues surrounding us. May our inner values guide us. May our words and actions, especially in the midst of disagreement and grievances, be offerings to God.

Have you heard of a "Kindness Boomerang?" It is an expression of how an act of kindness goes from one individual to another until you reach the first one who made the good deed, in the same way that the boomerang returns to its point of origin. It is an attempt to remind us that change is possible, that kindness is possible and within our reach, starting with us.

May each of us individually start a "Kindness Boomerang." It will change us... and maybe even the world.

From Our Faith Community Nurse

Greetings everyone! Well, it's here: autumn—usually my favorite time of year, except this year... so far too cold, too fast with snow! Goodness, but the trees were exquisite.

Did You Know?

Asthma is the third most commonly diagnosed chronic disease in MN, following only hypertension and high cholesterol. Asthma is common in children as well as in middle-aged and senior adults. While asthma prevalence in MN has been and continues to be lower than the national average, the health disparities that exist in MN are among the worst in the nation. Low-income groups and communities of color experience higher levels of environmental exposures that widen the asthma disparity gap.

• In 2019, one in 20 children and one in 12 adults in MN reported that they currently had asthma.

• From 2012 data: the burden of uncontrolled asthma is \$6.7 billion, the average annual per-person health care spending on asthma was \$11,700. Indirect costs associated with asthma are less obvious: \$54.3 million in estimated cost of workdays lost.

• Asthma is the leading cause of school absenteeism. In Duluth it is the #1 reason kids miss school.

On the Minnesota Dept. of Health website under "asthma," there is a toolbox with helpful information and a checklist for plans.

It is important to get your flu vaccinations now. The medical community expects a surge in flu, so get protected. You know that it's ok to wear a mask, sanitize your hands, and keep distances from others—where have you heard this before?

Are You Up to Date?

Yes, I'm reminding you to get your bivalent boosters, which protect against both the original COVID virus and the Omicron variants BA.4 and BA.5.

Children's COVID-19 vaccine is based on age at the time of the dose. It is not based on weight. Children 6 mo. to 4 yrs, if getting Pfizer-BioNTech, receive 3 doses; the 2nd dose is 3 to 8 weeks after the first and the 3rd dose at least 8 weeks after the 2nd. No booster for this age group. 5 yr. olds can get a Pfizer-BioNtech booster at least 2 months after their 2nd dose.



Children 6 mo. to 4 yrs old getting Moderna receive a 2nd dose 4 to 8 weeks after the first. No third dose for Moderna.

For more information about children's vaccines, please check the CDC website and consult your health care provider.






All-Church Sew-In

EarthKeeper

by Naomi Yaeger What makes a litterbug?

As a child, whenever I saw litter by the road, I wondered who was throwing litter out the windows of their cars. A popular lyric rang through my head, "Litterbug, litterbug shame on you!" This was at the height of the "Keep America Beautiful" campaign and Lady Bird Johnson's beautification program.

Our church picks up litter along a specific two miles on Maple Grove Road. But the night before our scheduled pickup event, it snowed, and it was postponed. I chatted with our leader, Bill Alexander. He said that he rarely sees anyone throw trash out their vehicle window, yet every year there is lots of litter to pick up. How can that be? Who is dumping this litter, and why do they do it?

About 50% of litter comes from people driving vehicles. Most of it is cigarette butts purposely thrown out by people in those vehicles. Another group of litter is objects that fall out of the back of a truck or car. But according to O. Berk, a packaging manufacturer, most of the litter on the road is purposely thrown out. I've seen litter on the roads all my life. I thought my generation would be the generation to Keep America Beautiful and pass on that value. But, according to O.Berk, "Experts have also found that people under the age of 30 are more likely to litter than older people."

Fast facts

• Fast food packages, drink containers, plastic bags, and shredded tires are the most common litter along the roadways.

• The number of fast food restaurants has grown immensely since 1970.

- People used to eat fast food inside.
- "Litterbug" was coined by an advertising agency to make individuals feel guilty and to alleviate the packaging companies' responsibilities.

• According to AAA, road debris causes thousands of accidents each year.
