I hope you are well in the midst of this wintery weather. I hope those who are able are assisting those needing extra help with the snow, and that those who need the extra

help are getting it and receiving it in a spirit of joy.

I had an especially hard time clearing my driveway after a recent storm. My snowblower was only partially working, which made the work significantly harder and take a much longer time (Note: Larry has since fixed my snowblower—very thankful for him). There were important lessons to be learned that day. When a task is before us that seems so huge that it is intimidating and

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overwhelming, a good course of action is to calmly go at it in a slow and steady manner. It works for clearing a driveway of mounds of snow, and it works for other tasks and relationships in life, too. As I was working fairly calmly in a slow and steady manner, I was reminded of these verses from Scripture:

- Isaiah 40:31 "But those who hope in the LORD will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary; they will walk and not be faint."
- 2 Chronicles 15:7 "But as for you, be strong and do not give up, for your work will be rewarded."
- Romans 12:12 "Rejoice in hope, be patient in tribulation, be constant in prayer."

There was another important life lesson I was reminded of that snowy day. When my neighbor and I worked together on clearing the mounds of snow from our driveways, we accomplished the work in far less time than if we both worked alone. And it was so much more rewarding, and even fun, doing it together. Scripture talks about this truth, too:

- Psalms 133:1 "How good and pleasant it is when God's people live (and work) together in unity!"
- Ecclesiastes 4:9-12 "Two are better than one, because they have a good return for their labor: If either of them falls down, one can help the other up. But pity anyone who falls and has no one to help them up. Also, if two lie down together, they will keep warm. But how can one keep warm alone? Though one may be overpowered, two can defend themselves. A cord of three strands is not quickly broken."
- Proverbs 27:17 "As iron sharpens iron, so one person sharpens another."

As winter hopefully comes to a close, may Scripture guide us in everything we experience and do and say.

Meditative Breath Prayer

Greetings! I thought I'd write about a prayer technique that some of you may already do, but many probably don't. It is one that can relieve anxiety and is easy to do. It's called the Breath Prayer and it allows you to make an intentional shift

from those emotions that give you angst—in other words, a switch from an unhealthy place. God has breathed life into us and, therefore, a symbol of the Holy Spirit.

In doing the Breath Prayer, one should sit for a moment in silence, then take four deep breaths. Breathe slowly and deeply from your abdomen. Fill your lungs. This deep breathing begins to relax you.

Then think what name of God is most endearing to you, which brings you greater comfort—God, Jesus Christ, Father, Mother/Father God, Creator, Lord, or possibly Holy One.

Next, think what your greatest need is—peace, strength, healing, comfort, love, guidance, or forgiveness.

Then you combine your answers into a Breath Prayer for yourself.

Have your eyes closed, take several deep breaths, and focus on just your breathing.

Next, combine the God name you have chosen while breathing in with your request while breathing out.

An example would be: breathe in—"Lord"—breathe out—"help me to forgive." Another could be: breathe in—"Jesus, my savior"—breathe out—"the light of the world." This you could do four times, and after, take some normal breaths as you rest in God's presence, then repeat. If other thoughts arise, you acknowledge them and let them flow away.

This may take a little practice. Your God name may change until you have a good fit, and your need, of course, may change. Find what works the best for you, and take it to heart.

Summer really is coming, and today I share things you may not know about our gardens. In the church archives, there are wonderful pictures of the first gardens when the "new" church was built. Petunias in a cross design laid out and

carefully planted was a favorite. Bright red geraniums welcomed people as they came into the parking lot. Many couples and individuals worked long hours planning, planting, and maintaining the gardens, just as we do today. The plantings and



gardens have been enlarged, and red geraniums still greet you as you arrive. In 2015 a generous gift was shared in memory of long-time member Dorothy Ottinger. She loved red geraniums, and her wish to have them welcome everyone at the main parking lot entrance continues each year. This winter we have again cared for 120 geraniums in the lower-level windows, stretching that memorial gift yet again. Memorial donations and gifts, plant donations, and fundraisers help keep the gardens going, as it is not a budgeted item or program.

The Garden Group does a lot more things than planting. A few years, ago slabs of exterior granite were repurposed into beautiful benches for the front platform entrance. In the winter the benches move to the Atrium to provide seating as well. The wonderful cedar benches in the gardens were made and donated by one of the garden guys, providing spots for guests and members to take a break, to

rest, and reflect. The beautiful teak bench in the lower level stairwell was saved and refurbished by another garden guy. Others repair signs, spread mulch, move rocks, and put up fencing to protect the perennial gardens. After such activities, we often find time to enjoy a visit, and a cup of coffee too!

This great group of volunteers invites and welcomes you to come and get involved. Singles, couples, families, youth—everyone is invited. Some of the Garden Group team are ready to "age out" and look forward to sitting on the benches!

Every toilet paper brand received votes, although "Brand B" (Everspring from Target) received no first-place ballots. So, what do your answers tell us? Overall, **Cottonelle** was your preferred brand, receiving 18 1st place votes, as well as 26 overall votes. After that, while **Charmin** was marginally preferred to the others, voting was much closer. **Charmin** received seven 1st place votes, while **Green Forest**, **Seventh Generation**, and **Who Gives a Crap** each received four. In addition, and interestingly, while **Everspring** received no 1st place votes, it received a total of 20 votes (it was lots of people's second or third choice) as compared to **Charmin's** 24. Therefore, it seems that although people at the Coppertop prefer the main-line brands, many of you appreciate the feel of recycled products, particularly **Everspring** from Target, and to a lesser extent, **Seventh Generation** and **Who Gives a Crap**.

Importantly, one person formally voted "I cannot tell a difference," and at least one other of you told us that informally. That is important—if you really cannot tell the difference, why not switch to an eco-friendlier option?

Thanks again for participating! Making small changes can produce a big difference.



Connect Cards: Why They're Important

Each week Pastor Jeanine asks people in the congregation and online to fill out a Connect Card. The printed and online bulletins and the pastor's weekly emails also ask that. But why?

Connect Cards replace the attendance pads that used to be found in each pew. Using the individual cards allows the church staff to list ministry opportunities and church needs on the back of the cards. If you are looking for a way to help your church, this is where you can find out each week what is most needed. The opportunities change regularly, so please look often at the back of the card.

Connect Cards are also used to record your attendance in worship. The church keeps track of attendance for several reasons. Statistics are reported each year to the Annual Conference. Our membership rolls are reviewed at the annual meeting, and people who have not registered their attendance for some time are then contacted to see if they still want to be a part of the church or should be removed. If church staff see that someone who has been attending regularly is now not coming, they can check in with that person to see if they're all right or need something from the church.

PLEASE fill out the Connect Cards! Worship leaders and musicians—this means you, too! Make it a habit to pick up a card along with a bulletin when you enter the Sanctuary; completed cards can be placed in the offering plates. 

PART ONE

Sarah Mallet was one of a few women preachers accepted and encouraged by John Wesley in the early days of the Methodist movement. Despite physical and financial hardships, as well as attitudes and policies against female preachers, she traveled extensively, preaching for at least 55 years.

Early years (1764-1777)

Sarah was born in 1764 into a working-class family in the village of Loddon in Norfolk, England. Sarah and her siblings worked with her father and uncle in the family tailoring business. From a note she wrote in a letter to Wesley, it appears the family did not produce garments for wealthy people, but largely for people who were poor or of modest means.

As a family with nine children, the Mallets would not have been able to afford public education for their children. Sarah's mother instructed the children, and Sarah became interested in religion at a young age. Learning to read and write was not encouraged for lower-class people. However, Sarah did learn to read and write, and corresponded often with other women and with Wesley in his later years.

Wesley made many visits to the Norfolk area, including 18 visits to Loddon between 1772 and 1790. He became familiar with Sarah's father and uncles and may have stayed with Sarah's family during a visit. When her parents became members of the Methodist Society, they page 10

enrolled Sarah, too.

Conversion and "fits" of preaching (1778-1786)

As a teenager, Sarah suffered bouts of depression, and her initial enthusiasm for religion waned. At age 16, she went to live with her Uncle William, a Methodist class leader. There she experienced God, but she fell seriously ill and had to return home. Health problems plagued her throughout her life but she continued to feel a strong call to speak publicly about God.

As she struggled with this call, she began having "fits," preaching while seemingly unconscious or in a trance. The "fits" continued for several weeks, word spread, and more and more people came to hear her speak. A crowd of about 200 gathered to hear her on one occasion. These episodes clarified God's call on her life and convinced her of God's desire that she preach. When the episodes subsided and she regained her health, her uncle asked her to speak in his Methodist preaching house. She spoke there every week and began to get invitations to preach in nearby villages.

Thus began her long career as a traveling preacher.

A Methodist local preacher (1787-1793)

The Methodist Societies allowed women to be class leaders, lead in prayer, and visit the sick. Women were allowed to exhort, calling for repentance and testifying about personal conversion. They were also permitted to preach one of Wesley's "Sermons on Several Occasions." But exhorters, male or female, were not allowed to "take a text," that is, expound on a biblical text of their own choosing on their own. Wesley did not authorize women to preach as a general rule, yet he did come to recognize some exceptional cases. Sarah Mallett was one of them.

Changing Hearts and Minds with 2022 Christmas Offering



With support from FUMC, Gina Davis and Laurie Ash led 16 nursing students on a two-week trip to Mary Johnston Hospital in the Philippines last month. In a student blog, Bekah Davidson wrote:

"Reflecting on my experience in the Philippines, I feel incredibly grateful for this transcultural learning opportunity. Going into this trip, I didn't really know what to expect, but looking back I think the growth I experienced during my time abroad is very evident. Specifically, my view on self-awareness and white

privilege has dramatically changed.

"Although I carry my privilege of being a white American with me every day, I feel like being in the Philippines, having traveled to a country that has repeatedly been hurt by both white people and Americans, felt very emotionally heavy and uncomfortable. In the Philippines I experienced a "white savior" complex. Filipinos wanted to take pictures of me, give up their chair for me to sit, and would go to extreme lengths to ensure I was being well taken care of. These experiences were a lot to process, and emotionally I struggled with guilt and how to make sense of these programmed instincts of the Filipinos. I am grateful to have been able to debrief these stories every day and have thoughtfully honest conversations with my professors and classmates. I learned not only about cultural congruence but also my own humility and how I go about carrying my white privilege with me every day."
