From Our Faith Community Nurse



Greetings all! I hope you are having a fine, safe summer thus far and can enjoy the remainder! This month I thought I'd clarify some points about generic vs. authorized generic and the commonly known brand name drugs.

Both generic and brand name drugs undergo rigorous testing by regulatory

authorities like the FDA to ensure safety, the drugs' efficacy, and whether those two types of drugs work in an equivalent manner.

A statistic, from 2021 showed that using generic medications saved the US healthcare system an estimated \$373 billion. Most generics are cheaper, but recently prices have been rising even on generics that have been used for years. Pharmaceutical companies have also faced criticism when marketing brand generics to increase profits without investing that money into research and development.

There are two types of generic drugs: generic and authorized generic. By law, generics contain the same active ingredients but may have different inactive ingredients. Companies that produce these must prove that the medication works in an equivalent manner as the original brand name drug and file an application with the FDA.

Authorized generics are identical to the brand name medication, but look different and are marketed with a different name, either by the company that holds the original patent or another company which is given permission by the company that holds the patent. Since the drug is identical, it does not need any new research. These drugs may or may not be cheaper.

When a medication is prescribed, find out if it's of the generic type. Some people on Medicare D could get a better price for the brand name drug.

Generic drugs are considered to work in the same manner as the brand name drug and can be substituted. State laws allow pharmacists to substitute a generic for a brand name medication, but if your clinician wants you to have the brand name drug, it must be stipulated on your prescription. Some drugs such as seizure meds, digoxin, warfarin, and levothyroxine may need to be the brand name drug.

Annual Conference Summary



The Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church recently met in St. Cloud. Participating from our church were Rev. MaryAnne Korsch, Cindy Hedlund, intern Kelby Werner, intern Lydia Kantonen, Elizabeth Nelson, Cynthia and JoJo Coffin-Langdon, and Pastor Jeanine Alexander. JoJo received a blessing on her status as a licensed local pastor for her Moments Hospice position.

Here is a written summary by our conference Director of Communications, Christa Meland:

The theme of this year's gathering was "Encounter, Transform, Respond: The Emmaus Experience." This post-resurrection story, where everything has changed and the implications still seem a bit cloudy, mirrors the time and space we are living in as a church. We, like the two disciples, are on the road, asking deep questions and trying to make sense of what it means to be a disciple of Jesus today. And we, too, are finding

that we encounter Christ in transforming ways when we do.

Bishop's Episcopal Address: In the Emmaus Road story, the impossible becomes possible as the world is made right again through encounters with the resurrected Christ who brings healing, reconciliation, and hope. Bishop Lanette Plambeck, in her inaugural Episcopal Address, reminds us that this story for the two disciples on the road is our story too. During this challenging time in The United Methodist Church, she invited those of us in the Minnesota Conference to lean in to one another and declare that there is enough love for all of us, and she reminded each person: You are loved. You are a child of God and a person of worth. There are no exceptions.

Milestones in Ministry: Gatherees honored, thanked, and celebrated 14 clergy entering retirement; celebrated four pastors ordained as elders, two commissioned as provisional members, three local licensed pastors who completed their five-year course of study, and 13 people authorized to serve as local pastors in the congregations and ministry areas in which they are appointed.

Fresh Expressions With Michael Beck: Rev. Dr. Michael Beck is co-pastor of two Florida churches and a network of "fresh expressions" led by laity that gather in various community venues

and public spaces around shared interests and hobbies. He talked about fresh expressions as a new movement of Christian communities where people with no connection to the church are finding life and encountering Christ. Dinner church, whereby people gather to share a meal, is an easy starting point for a fresh expression, Beck said. Some of the other fresh expressions he's involved with take place in a tattoo parlor, at a restaurant, in a virtual reality space, at a dog park, and even at Tesla charging stations.

Connectional Address by Bishop

McAlilly: Bishop William "Bill" McAlilly of the Nashville Episcopal Area took part in Annual Conference and reminded attendees that we are a connectional church. In his connectional address, he spoke about what it means to live with courage and boldness. This includes knowing and living our "why" as Christians, loving God and our neighbor, and leaning into the future with "holy boldness"—not knowing exactly what's in store but trusting that God is with us.

Sermon by Rev. Becky Jo

Messenbrink: This year's conference preacher (selected by a random drawing at the end of last year's Annual Conference) was Rev. Becky Jo Messenbrink, who serves Eden Prairie UMC. She talked about her desire for an expandable table and reminded those gathered that Jesus' table was for everyone. "Perhaps the church is called to mirror the table which Jesus setsan expansive table of belonging and community where all are welcome, where all are included and celebrated and treasured. an expansive table at which Jesus can be recognized, and where the -continued on next page *—Summary, continued from page 5* kingdom of God is present and talk about God turns into encounters with the living God," she said.

Love Offering: Conference members, on behalf of their churches, gave just over \$40,000 to the 2023 Love Offering. Sixty percent of it will fund a new grant to support churches that have partnerships with mental health services offered in local schools or communities, thirty percent will go to three Minnesota nonprofits engaged in mental health education and advocacy, and ten percent of the Love Offering each year goes to Volunteers in Mission scholarships, which support first-time mission trip participants. You may continue to *donate* throughout 2023.

Legislation: Hundreds of voting members in attendance at Annual Conference approved all pieces of legislation before them, including resolutions opposing assault-style weapons, addressing the Israeli detention of children, and supporting both a U.S. Regional Conference and the removal of all discriminatory policies and harmful language related to sexual orientation from the Book of Discipline.

Disaffiliating Churches: Members ratified the terms of disaffiliation agreements made between the conference Board of Trustees and 14 local churches that have discerned that their path goes a different direction from the Minnesota Annual Conference. After the vote, Bishop Lanette asked Minnesota United Methodists to keep these congregations in their hearts and to pray that, even as we part ways, they may continue to live out their faith and serve as a beacon of light and hope for all. page 6

FUMC Rhubarb Festival Report

Our participation in the annual Rhubarb Festival had some impressive totals. FUMC production: 194 pies, 30 large crisps for the festival coffee shop, 180 frozen yogurt strawberry-rhubarb sundaes, 58 jars of jam, and 47 jars of topping. Twelve other churches or groups baked for the festival. Our new pie makers were Northeast Regional Corrections Center, a minimum security prison for adult males. They regularly participate in farm production and culinary arts. Their goal was to make 1,000 pies. Local churches also made pies, crisps, scones, jams, breads, and muffins.

Here are some additional statistics:

- Volunteers, more than 30
- Rhubarb donations from more than 20 different gardens
- 600 pounds of rhubarb were donated
- More than 100 pounds of strawberries were used
- Positively 3rd Street Bakery donated all the pie dough
- Super One Foods helped with donated ingredients
- Room At the Table Catering and Bakery helped with equipment and expertise

Sustainability Summer Reading

The book I'm recommending for sustainability summer reading is *Active Hope: How to Face the Mess We're in Without Going Crazy,* by Joanna Macy and Chris Johnstone. I read the original version, but it's now been revised. This book is written from a distinctly spiritual/ Christian perspective. Partly because of that, the whole emphasis is on the possibility of hope leading to change.

The book begins with three stories we tell ourselves: the story of the **Status Quo** and the story of the **Great Unraveling** (everything is falling apart), both of which lead to despair and hopelessness; and the story of the **Great Turning**—how people are beginning to see the world in a new and more hopeful way, and taking action based on that vision.

The authors of the book develop the "spiral model," which while describing the Great Turning is also a great model for worship! (If you read the book, see if you can see that!). The model has four stages:

• **Coming from gratitude.** Rather than coming from fear, our journey of transformation is rooted in gratitude. One quote I really loved says, "When we come from gratitude, we become more present to the wonder of being alive in this amazing living world, to the many gifts we receive, to the beauty we appreciate."

• **Honoring our pain for the world**. Often we recoil from pain and see it as undesirable. Instead, the authors point out that when we feel pain for the world, it's a step to seeing the world through new eyes.

• Seeing with new eyes. In this section, the authors describe different elements of seeing our world anew: moving away from selfishness and individualism ("affluenza"), and then becoming aware of our interconnectedness and community with each other and the world around us, developing a "long view" of time and developing a new vision of what our world could be.

• **Going forth**. This arises from our new vision, coming to believe that change is indeed possible, and realizing that you don't need to—and shouldn't try to—change the world on your own.

Overall the book is a delightful antidote to the overwhelm my students and I often feel when we think of the magnitude of change needed to right our world. I highly recommend it as an uplifting summer sustainability read! ~Geoff Bell

A Stack of Books and a Fascinating Life Story



Recently, a gentleman visited our church office with a stack of books and a fascinating story. The man's greatgrandfather, Dr. Charles W. Bailey, was a Methodist minister and

district superintendent in eastern Kansas from 1887 until 1938.

Charles Bailey was born in Watertown, Wisconsin in 1848. His family moved to western Wisconsin,

where they worked cutting timber and running a sawmill. When Charles was 15, he enlisted in a Wisconsin regiment and went off to fight in the Civil War. He was wounded twice while fighting in Ulysses S. Grant's army at the Battle of Vicksburg. At 17 he returned home and spent time working as a lumberjack, cutting trees and floating them down the Mississippi. Looking for a different life, he intended to join a wagon train headed for Oregon but ended up staying in Kansas. His early Kansas years were spent as a cowboy, riding the Chisholm Trail herding longhorn cattle from Texas to Dodge City, Wichita, and Kansas City. Bailey did not smoke, chew tobacco, drink alcohol, or swear, which earned him the nickname of "Preacher" from the other cowboys. He married in 1877 and settled down on a farm, eventually having nine children.

Living up to his "Preacher" nickname, Bailey served as a substitute minister at funerals and other events when an ordained minister was not available. The local Methodist minister urged him to continue his education at Baker University, a Methodist school that was the first four-year university in Kansas. Bailey was 33 at the time and 39 by the time he graduated and was ordained. He went on to serve churches in seven communities across Kansas and retired in 1916. When the U.S. joined World War I, Bailey was asked to serve two churches temporarily, and he ended up remaining with one of them until he finally retired in 1938 at the age of 90. Most of this information comes from a 1948 newspaper profile of Dr. Bailey, as he celebrated his 100th birthday. At the age of 101, he took his first airplane ride, from Kansas to California, where he baptized his great-grandson, doing the service from memory.

> That great-grandson, the man who walked into the church office last month, now lives in Duluth. The stack of books he brought belonged to Dr. Bailey, and he wanted to return them to a Methodist environment. The books include three commentaries on the New Testament (published in 1866, 1871, and 1875), *Elocution: The sources and elements of its power* (1870), and *The Life of John Wesley* (1906). An 1887 *Hymnal of the*

Methodist Episcopal Church with Tunes includes some of the hymns we still sing today. And there is *The Story of Methodism Throughout the World from the Beginning to the Present Time; Tracing the Rise and Progress of that Wonderful Religious Movement, Which, Like the Gulf Stream, has given Warmth to Wide Waters and Verdure to Many Lands; and Giving an Account of its Various Influences and Institutions of To-day*, published in 1889. Church staff are trying to determine what is the best eventual home for this historic collection. In the words of Dr. Bailey's great-grandson, "I appreciate that these books will return to their Methodist roots and be treasured for the faith of those who have cared for them over the significantly more than a century since they were first published."

Legislative Advocacy Pays Off



Legislative advocacy pays off with \$100 million for shelter capital.

In partnership with the Minnesota Coalition for the Homeless (MCH) and the Joint Religious Legislative Coalition (JRLC), the CHUM community really stepped up to engage in advocacy throughout the session with letters to the editor, countless phone calls, and hundreds of letters and emails. Focus on the Pathway Home Act impressed Minnesota lawmakers and the session closed with \$100M budgeted for Shelter Capital and funding for Emergency Services Provision to provide adequate staffing. Funding for shelter capital means CHUM can apply for a grant to repair and expand the shelter, along with the capacity to hire enough staff to run it.

Thank you all for your prayers, persistence, and commitment to care for our neighbors' needs, both in Duluth and throughout the state through advocacy for a more just and compassionate community. Lennon-Berini Scholarship

Attention College Students: The 2023 FUMC Lennon-Berini Scholarship is here!

In the 1950s two young men, John Lennon and Joe Berini, served as First Methodist staff members and worked with Duluth youth, particularly in the Central Hillside area. To commemorate their work, a scholarship fund was developed in 1985.

Subsequent contributions have helped to sustain the fund and have allowed for the presentation of 110 scholarships totaling \$130,190. The Lennon-Berini Scholarships for 2023 will be \$2,000 each.

The criteria for qualifying as an applicant are:

- 1) Be a member of Duluth's First United Methodist Church
- 2) Have completed two full years of college
- 3) Be pursuing a people-centered career

Application forms will be available on the church's website July 1, 2023. **They must be fully completed and turned in by 4pm on July 22.** Incomplete applications will not be considered.
