and many churches), and I feel it deserves my focus. My hope is that the program grows, we gain a clearer understanding of what we are wanting/able to do/offer, more adults in the church are a part of the ministry, more kids participate, and we eventually hire staff who will be set up for success. When change happens, it can be a natural tendency to want to do the same thing we have been doing, whether it has been working well or not. And it is also a natural tendency to want to quickly make decisions without experimentation and deep reflection, as that can be a bit uncomfortable. I am putting my focus, effort, and time here, with Larry's help and the help of others, to see where God leads us. Our Staff Parish Relations Committee and I feel this is the right and strategic way to go. I'm quite excited to be a part of the Children's Ministry Team for this season and am trusting God's guidance.

Thank you to those of you who filled out the surveys about children and youth ministry this past July. We heard clearly your desire for information well in advance so you can make events a priority, for opportunities for your kids to both have unstructured play time, and opportunities for service. We also heard how busy you are and that you are making church a priority and are looking for less activities, but focused and well done. One hundred percent of families of children who responded indicated music opportunities are important.

In some ways, things are happening as usual with new leadership; in other ways, we are experimenting with new ways of leading and inviting and engaging children and youth. Please offer your support through encouragement, prayers, and participation.

From Our Faith Community Nurse

With the aging population and deaths we have experienced in our own congregation and the many lives lost due to disasters like hurricanes, fire, and heat, I thought I'd write a little about wills. A normal will is where you bequeath your possessions, valuables, property, and animals. But there is another type of will called an ethical will. This will is a non-legal record of what you've learned that you'd like to share—beliefs, doubts, stories, instructions, memories, hopes, and disappointments, among other items. Ethical wills were believed to have begun in the early days of Israel's history.

Writing an ethical will does take effort. Some questions you could ask yourself as you begin your soul-searching to leave your spiritual legacy could be

- Who has influenced you the most in your life?
- Where are some of your favorite places, and what did you learn?

• What has been the happiest or most challenging time(s) in your life?

• What do you most appreciate?

Some people begin writing or recording their wills to their children, some write letters to their loved ones who have passed (which has helped them through grief), and others have written information each year.

Some people have shared their most cherished values. I will share a few here:

- Realize the wonderfulness of being alive in God's universe.
- Forgive yourself; Bless yourself and others.
- Care about doing things well.
- Appreciate ordinary days.
- Focus on the love you can give.

Their principles of life and relationships were spelled out to their loved ones. Sometimes these letters can have a profound effect on a family. What's most important is passing on your beliefs in a personal way.

"By the time we realize that the years ahead are far fewer than the years we have already lived, we confront the discouraging truth that, unless we do something about it, all that hard-won wisdom will disappear with us when we die."

A Message from our Staff Parish Relations Committee

Dear Congregation;

As Chair of the Staff Parish Relations Committee (SPRC), I write with a few important words about our pastor. She is an amazing human being and a tireless servant of our congregation. In part because of her tirelessness, SPRC has approved exploring a "renewal leave" for her next year. With our support she has made application for a temporary leave of absence, which is a common sabbatical mechanism in the United Methodist church. The dates we are looking at are May 20, 2024–August 19, 2024.

Normally a pastor has a renewal leave every seven years. Pastor Jeanine has not had one in 20 years. As you may know, we recently celebrated her 30th year in ministry. Her success in church leadership and growth over that time is undeniable. Therefore it is critical that we support this regular leave mechanism which she has not taken for two decades.

There are two mechanisms by which she may attain this leave, one of which is supported by the Lily Foundation. The other is supported by our District. As is typical of Pastor Jeanine, she presented these options to us having completely thought through nearly every logistical and financial detail. Her first concern, as ever, is that the congregation would continue to be served in all the ways it is while she is here. We are confident that whichever mechanism eventually may support her leave, the congregation will continue to be served well. Deacon MaryAnne Korsch will assume lead pastor duties, and we are lucky to have her talents on hand to do so.

Despite being a lifelong member of the UMC, I have never served on an SPRC committee until coming here to First United. It is a pleasure to serve in this way, but it has also been eye-opening to see the mechanics of how a large church body runs. Two observations come to mind that are worth sharing here. First, while the long history of this beautiful building is impressive and wonderful, it is no match page 8 for how beautiful is the servanthood and compassion that exists among the people who serve its mission in one or many ways. It is inspiring to get to be a part of it. Second, our pastor is—it bears repeating—a tireless servant of our church body. She works six days of seven per week, if all goes as planned (which it seldom does), and must constantly scale up and down her work to meet each moment. In short, she has done so much in her six years here to organize and energize and rightsize us for a strong future. Suffice to say these have not been a normal or easy six years, and Pastor Jeanine's unique leadership was critical to the health of the church over this time.

It is in fact Pastor Jeanine's efforts over her first years here that have put us in an excellent position to be able to support this request. She made it an easy decision. Though she will be missed for the few months while she is renewing her mind, body, and spirit, we are in a good position to encourage it.

If you have felt a calling to become more involved as a lay leader in our church, I would invite you to explore doing so over the next year or so. In our proposal to the Lily Foundation, Pastor Jeanine wrote about the special healing power of water. She is from Duluth, of course, and like many of us finds deep meaning in the waters that surround us. As I was reading it, I was struck by the thought that in so many ways, it has been a turbulent time to lead a church. Water seeks a level, so sometimes there will be waterfalls and rapids and riptides. She has navigated our congregation through some of the most difficult waters, including a global pandemic and a global cleavage in the United Methodist Church. While she is on leave, our church will remain perched atop this gorgeous hill overlooking the largest body of fresh water on Earth. I invite you to pray with me that Jeanine will be in some sense baptized anew with the waters that surround her wherever she may be, and that those waters will replenish a deep wellspring of faith to sustain her for another 30 years of leadership in Christ.

Mission and Social Justice

Time to update FUMC's Reconciling Statement



In September 2020, the Reconciling Ministries Network (RMN) adopted new gender and inclusivity language for affiliated organizations:

"We celebrate God's gift of diversity and value the wholeness made possible in community equally shared and shepherded by all. We welcome and affirm people of every gender identity, gender expression, and sexual orientation, who are also of every age, race, ethnicity, physical and mental ability, level of education, and family structure, and of every economic, immigration, marital, and social status, and so much more. We acknowledge that we live in a world of profound social, economic, and political inequities. As followers of Jesus, we commit ourselves to the pursuit of justice and pledge to stand in solidarity with all who are marginalized and oppressed." <u>rmnetwork.org</u>.

FUMC joined RMN with the adoption of our Reconciling Statement in 2002. Now we are asked to engage in conversation about this new statement and vote to embrace it. A vote to adopt this statement, as written, will serve as the foundational requirement for continuing our affiliation with RMN.

...And Compassion for All

I'd like to see us add one word to our beloved Pledge of Allegiance.

Let it say, "I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty, justice and compassion for all."

In all my 99 years of living, I have never seen our country so completely splintered and so downright mean in its social discourse. The growth of social

media has added tinder to a fire already burning.

The two major forces of politics and religion are both embedded in the problem. Families sometimes hesitate to hold a family gathering, and some school boards have asked armed police to be present at their meetings for safety and security. My lifelong denomination, The United Methodist Church, is in worldwide disarray and confusion over LGBTQ issues.

I suggest that adding the word "compassion" to our flag pledge would implant a spirit, an attitude, and an action into the hearts and minds of all who recite it. Millions of school children would recite the pledge each school morning, as I did 90 years ago. Teachers would begin to explain the new word and relate it to classroom and playground issues. Parents would become learners with their children. Service clubs and others would weekly ponder the word "compassion" and how it might relate to their daily lives.

It was my reading of the words of Archbishop Desmond Tutu, the Dalai Lama, and writer *Karen Armstrong* that triggered my interest in this issue.

The Dalai Lama wrote, "Our basic human nature is compassionate. The problem is that children go to schools where they are not taught to nurture these deeper human values, so their basic human potential becomes dormant. When we relate to others from the place of compassion, it goes to the first level, the human level, not the secondary level of difference. Then you can even have compassion on your enemy."

Armstrong points out that the Golden Rule—"Do unto others as you would want them to do unto you"—is the common name given to compassion, but that all ten of the world's great religions have identical statements as a central part of their faith. Hinduism, for example says, "... do not to others which if done to thee would cause thee pain." Sikhism says, "... as thou deemest thyself, so deem others. Then thou shalt become a partner in heaven."

And our founder, John Wesley, in his sermon, "<u>On Zeal</u>," reminded Methodists of the necessity of showing compassion if they wished to experience compassion from God. "If you have not 'compassion on your fellowservants,' neither will your Lord have pity on you," he wrote.

Imagine a community, a nation, a world, where compassion in both creed and deed is the norm of life. Let us officially place it in our flag pledge, and let us celebrate that on July 4, 2026, the day we celebrate our 250th anniversary as a country.

How Are United Methodists Present in Ukraine?

United Methodists have both congregations and mission partners on the ground in Ukraine, offering hope, support, and aid in every way they can.



The nation of Ukraine is included, with Moldova, in the Ukraine-Moldova Provisional Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church, part of the *Eurasia Episcopal Area*, led by *Bishop Eduard Khegay*.

This episcopal area also includes the Central Russia Conference, Eastern Russia and Central Asia Provisional Annual Conference, Northwest Russia Provisional Annual Conference, and Southern Russia Provisional Annual Conference. These include the nations of Russia, Belarus, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, and Uzbekistan. There were 1,123 professing members recorded across these conferences in 2017.

Methodism in Eurasia began with a missionary pastor from Sweden, Carl Lindborg, in 1882. He founded the first Russian Methodist congregation in St. Petersburg in 1889. A few congregations were planted in Ukraine prior to the first World War, notably near Uzhgorod and Ternopil, but of these, all but the community in Uzhgorod were shuttered during the Soviet era. The outreach that would lead to the current churches in Ukraine began after the end of the Soviet Union, which brought an influx and spread of United Methodist missionaries from the United States, Germany, and Liberia into many of the newly independent nations in the 1990s.

While numbers of United Methodists in the Ukraine-Moldova Provisional Annual Conference are small (351 total across six congregations based on 2017 data), the congregations are strategically located in or near larger cities, including Kharkiv, Kyiv, Poltova, and Chernivtsi, as well as the two breakaway areas recognized by Russia in Donetzk and Luhansk. This means that they are well positioned for outreach across the whole of the country and that several of their cities are among those most under attack at this time. Indeed, many in the church at Luhansk had previously fled in 2020 because of attacks by pro-Russian insurgents that hit their church building.

Global Ministries encourages United Methodists to give generously to UMCOR's <u>International Disaster and</u> <u>Recovery fund</u> to enable United Methodists and other mission partners on the ground to deliver support where it can do the most good.

We pray with the people of Ukraine and all those affected by this campaign of war against its sovereignty within its own borders
