Thanksgiving Reflections: From Childhood Feasts to a Food Waste Wake-Up Call

As a child we lived far away from relatives, so we usually spent Thanksgiving at our friend's house. After our Thanksgiving feast, we would play board games and card games. Supper would be turkey sandwiches and reheated squash and whatever else was leftover. Leftovers tasted yummy, and as a child, I didn't worry about how much was wasted.

In recent years six million turkeys were thrown out during


Thanksgiving. That's a hard number to swallow. This year please consider and help reduce that number. This website, Savethe-Food Guestimator

savethefood.com/guestimator, created by the Natural Resource Council and the Ad Council, can help you determine how much food you will need. This tool



includes options for how many guests are attending, how big their appetites are, how many meals' worth of leftovers you want, and whether the meal will be turkey-based or vegetarian.

Now let's zoom out a bit. Did you know that a whopping three billion metric tons of food are wasted globally every year? That's according to the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United



Nations. This waste amounts to onethird of all food produced. Just think of all the time, water, and energy used to make that amount of food, as well as the land and labor that was wasted.

I recommend reading *Waste-Free Kitchen Handbook*, by Dana Gunders, published by the Nature Resources Council. "Nobody walks out of the grocery store carrying four bags with the intention of tossing out one," says Gunders.

So this Thanksgiving, as we gather with loved ones to give thanks and share in a bountiful meal, let's also make a pact to give back to the planet by reducing food waste. The first step? Utilize resources page 8 like the "Save-the-Food Guestimator" and educate yourself about the issue through resources like *Waste-Free Kitchen Handbook.* After all, a more sustainable and mindful approach to Thanksgiving can be just as fulfilling as those scrumptious turkey sandwiches from my childhood. Bible Verse, John 6:12 ESV "And when they had eaten their fill, he told his disciples, 'Gather up the leftover fragments, that nothing be lost.'"

Sanctuary Organ Update From the FUMC Organ Committee

Last month Bill had a cover story in First Family entitled "Progress

We Can See." We are happy to report that since then, more progress has happened, with more yet to come. The Violone rank of pipes (the façade pipes that you can see attached to the back wall of the Sanctuary) are completely installed and working, as are a rank of Oboe pipes that are installed in the organ chamber. The



sweeping design of the Violone pipes really looks stunning! There is future work to be done, but we are waiting for some specific supplies. As we mentioned in an earlier *First Family* article, the organ refurbishment process has been much slower than anticipated, primarily caused by the COVID pandemic and supply chain issues. While the project has been slow, we are extremely happy with the quality of Robert Hoppe's work. (Robert is the organ restorer with whom we contracted.)

Future work to complete includes installing a new electronic system in the balcony console. In addition we will mount the balcony console on a new dolly that we are anxiously awaiting to receive from the Austin Organ Company. Once the dolly is received, Robert can install the new electronic system into the console, completing that phase of the project. The final step in the process will be for him to voice and regulate the new pipes as well as many of the existing pipes, which will greatly enhance the sound quality of the organ.

Give to the Max Day—Strikepoint

For more than a decade, Minnesotans have donated generously to a variety of nonprofit organizations each fall as part of GiveMN's "Give to the Max Day" fundraising campaign. More than \$290 million has been given to more than 10,000 organizations across Minnesota.

This year, Give to the Max Day is **Thursday, November 16**, with an early giving period beginning **November 1**. Strikepoint is hoping you will all pay particular attention to this, as they continue to raise funds to purchase more Very Large Bells, to refurbish our bell sets, and to restore a historic set of Dutch-made Petit & Fritsen bells.

You may have seen—and heard—the first three Very Large Bells in recent church services and concerts. A fourth was added this page 10

summer through a generous memorial gift. Of course, once the group heard what a wonderful sound these bells add, they found more music that could use additional bells. Each of the Very Large Bells (and its equally large case) costs approximately \$5,500.

Refurbishing bells includes replacing old inside parts, updating handles, cleaning and polishing the bell castings, and getting rid of any blemishes that our ringers have not been able to remove by hand polishing. It is advisable to periodically refurbish bells; it will extend their playability since the bells will play and sound better with parts that aren't worn out.

The Petit & Fritsen bells were cast in a foundry that began in the Netherlands in 1660 but ceased operation in 2014. These old bells have leather parts and handles, many of which need to be remade. The P&F sound is quite different than the Schulmerich bells we are all used to, but adds a different color that can be very effective in certain pieces of music.

2023 Fall Roast Beef Dinner Thank You

"Volunteers are Love in Motion!"

Thank you to the supporters and volunteers of the 2023 Fall Roast Beef Dinner!

Here is a brief report of how things went on Thursday, October 5:

There were 819 roast beef dinners purchased in two-and-a-half hours in this drive-through-only event. (Last fall 724 roast beef dinners were purchased.)

There were 100 volunteers during the two days. (Last fall, 111 volunteers.)

Eleven volunteers canceled, ten due to COVID and one from pneumonia.

Seven volunteers were Denfeld High School and Marshall School Community Service volunteers. (Last fall there were six volunteers.)

Expenses:

The cost of beef increased by \$4.31 per pound from last year. Twenty-seven roasts were used, adding up to 684.35 pounds. Last fall we used 643.80 pounds, an increase of 40.55 pounds.

The cost of frozen apples ordered was \$860.62 and these were the wrong type of apples! We then ordered the correct apples (which is apple pie filling) at the cost of \$989.63. Unfortunately the frozen apples were nonreturnable. So... if you would like to help us out and love apples, a 30-pound bucket of frozen and sugared apples is \$54. If you are interested, please call the church office at 218-722-5021. We will use the remaining frozen apples for other church fundraisers.

Leftovers

Some of the leftovers were delivered to CHUM, and most of the rest will be morphed into additional fundraising opportunities for ministries at FUMC.

Purchases:

We purchased four anti-fatigue mats and a "Pay here" flag.

Income (both monetary and intangible)

We raised \$5,032.32. (Last year, \$3,089.72.)

What is priceless is the offering of warmth and

hospitality to the community and doing this important outreach ministry fundraiser together while strengthening our relationships.

We thank God for all of you and the gifts you so graciously give to the church community.


