Extinguishing of the First Lenten Candle

In the season of Advent, as we prepare for Christmas, we light a new candle each Sunday. In this One: season of Lent, as we prepare for Good Friday, we extinguish a candle each Sunday to remind us of the approaching darkness of betrayal and death.

All: Jesus came into the world to be the light that guides us to God. During this time of Lenten preparation, we think of those who turned away from the light of Jesus. Jesus was approached by a rich man. He said he wanted eternal life, but he was unwilling to change his lifestyle, and he walked sadly away. We, too, are often unwilling to change even the smallest part of our lifestyle in order to follow Jesus. The darkness approaches when we sadly walk away from Jesus. We extinguish the second candle, confessing our unwillingness to do what is necessary to follow Jesus.

Let us sing our Lenten song of prayer as we call upon God's presence. One:

In the same way, faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead.

One: But someone will say, "You have faith; I have deeds." Show me your faith without deeds, and I

will show you my faith by what I do.

All: As the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without deeds is dead.

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Ways You Can Help Your Church




Volunteers are needed to help staff the Welcome Table on Sunday mornings. Talk to Pamela Brown for more information.

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Putting FEET To Our Faith – A Study of the Book of JAMES

James 1:19-2:26

¹⁹My dear friends, take note of this: Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak, and slow to become angry, ²⁰for a person's anger does not bring about the righteous life that God desires. ²¹Therefore, get rid of all moral filth and the evil that is so prevalent and humbly accept the word planted in you, which can save you. ²²Do not merely listen to the word, and so deceive yourself. Do what it says. ²³Anyone who listens to the word but does not do what it says is like a person who looks at their face in a mirror ²⁴and, after looking at themself, goes away and immediately forgets what they looks like. ²⁵But the one who looks intently into the perfect law that gives freedom, and continues to do this, not forgetting what they heard, but doing it– they will be blessed in what they do. ²⁶If anyone considers themself religious and yet does not keep a tight rein on their tongue, they deceive themselves and their religion is worthless. ²⁷Religion that God accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after orphans and widows in their distress and to keep oneself from being polluted by the world.

<u>CHAPTER 2:</u> As believers in our glorious Lord Jesus Christ, don't show favoritism. ²Suppose a man comes into your meeting wearing a gold ring and fine clothes, and a poor man in shabby clothes also comes in. ³If you show special attention to the man wearing fine clothes and say, "Here's a good seat for you," but say to the poor man, "You stand there" or "Sit on the floor by my feet," ⁴have you not discriminated among yourselves and become judges with evil thoughts?

⁵Listen, my dear friends: Has not God chosen those who are poor in the eyes of the world to be rich in faith and to inherit the kingdom he promised those who love him? ⁶But you have insulted the poor. Is it not the rich who are exploiting you? Are they not the ones who are dragging you into court? ⁷Are they not the ones who are slandering the noble name of him to whom you belong? ⁸If you really keep the royal law found in Scripture, "Love your neighbor as yourself," you are doing right. ⁹But if you show favoritism, you sin and are convicted by the law as lawbreakers. ¹⁰For whoever keeps the whole law and yet stumbles at just one point is guilty of breaking all of it. ¹¹For he who said, "Do not commit adultery," also said, "Do not murder." If you do not commit adultery but do commit murder, you have become a lawbreaker. ¹²Speak and act as those who are going to be judged by the law that gives freedom, ¹³because judgment without mercy will be shown to anyone who has not been merciful. Mercy triumphs over judgment!

¹⁴What good is it, my friends, if a person claims to have faith but has no deeds? Can such faith save them? ¹⁵Suppose a person is without clothes and daily food. ¹⁶If one of you says to that one, "Go, I wish you well; keep warm and well fed," but does nothing about their physical needs, what good is it? ¹⁷In the same way, faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead.

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¹⁸But someone will say, "You have faith; I have deeds." Show me your faith without deeds, and I will show you my faith by what I do. ¹⁹You believe that there is one God. Good! Even the demons believe that-and shudder. ²⁰You foolish person, do you want evidence that faith without deeds is useless? ²¹Was not our ancestor Abraham considered righteous for what he did when he offered his son Isaac on the altar? ²²You see that his faith and his actions were working together, and his faith was made complete by what he did. ²³And the scripture was fulfilled that says, "Abraham believed God, and it was credited to him as righteousness," and he was called God's friend. ²⁴You see that a person is justified by what they do and not by faith alone. ²⁵In the same way, was not even Rahab the prostitute considered righteous for what she did when she gave lodging to the spies and sent them off in a different direction? ²⁶As the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without deeds is dead.
