Extinguishing of the Third Lenten Candle

One: In the season of Advent, as we prepare for Christmas, we *light* a new candle each Sunday. In this season of Lent, as we prepare for Good Friday, we *extinguish* a candle each Sunday to remind us of the approaching darkness of betrayal and death.

All: Jesus came into the world to be the light that guides us to God. During this time of Lenten preparation, we think of those who turned away from the light of Jesus. We will never know the motivations of Judas's betrayal. All we know is that Judas thought his agenda was more important than Jesus. We, too, are all often willing to put our agendas and priorities ahead of the Light of the World. We extinguish the third candle, recalling with regret the times we have betrayed Jesus by the darkness of our own self-centered willfulness.

One: Let us sing our Lenten song of prayer as we call upon God's presence.

One: Not many of you should presume to be teachers, my friends, because you know that we who teach will be judged more strictly.

All: We all stumble in many ways. If anyone is never at fault in what he or she says, he or she is a perfect person, able to keep his or her whole body in check.

One: When we put bits into the mouths of horses to make them obey us, we can turn the whole animal. Or take ships as an example: although they are so large and are driven by strong winds, they are steered by a very small rudder wherever the pilot wants to go.

All: Likewise, the tongue is a small part of the body, but it makes great boasts. Consider how a great forest is set on fire by a small spark. The tongue also is a fire, a world of evil among the parts of the body. It corrupts the whole person, sets the whole course of his life on fire, and is itself set on fire by hell.

One: All kinds of animals, birds, reptiles, and creatures of the sea are being tamed and have been tamed by people, but no person can tame the tongue. It is a restless evil, full of deadly poison.

All: With the tongue, we praise our Lord, and with it we curse those who have been made in God's likeness.

One: Out of the same mouth comes praise and cursing. My friends, this should not be.

All: Can both fresh water and saltwater flow from the same spring? My friends, can a fig tree bear olives, or a grapevine bear figs? Neither can a salt spring produce fresh water.
