

### Pastor's Column

We are currently in the midst of a 5-week sermon series called, "Looking At the Prodigal." We have been looking at 3 parables Jesus told in Luke 15. We learned the word "prodigal" doesn't necessarily mean wayward or troublesome. It's an adjective that means recklessly extravagant – spending until you have nothing left. These parables describe the prodigal nature of God - the lavish, extravagant love of God for us, a love that would spend all it has, to seek and save us. We've reflected on how Augustine defined sin as disordered love. We looked at how humans have the tendency to love, rest our hearts in, and look to things, to give us the joy and meaning that only God can give.

We've been looking at how we all, in some ways, are spiritually lost. What can we do about this condition of being lost?

- Can we gather our courage and really examine our own lives? And see where we are lost in our own sense of the way we think things and people should be?
- Can we recognize that we don't have to earn God's love ... it is always there for us. And recognize also, that God's love is equally there for all people?
- Can we stop competing with others and instead celebrate blessings and accomplishments in the lives of others?
- Can we be freed to allow other people to understand God and live their life differently from us – and offer a hand of respect, care, help and love to them?
- Can we come to the banquet ourselves
   knowing God loves us with an everlasting love
   – no matter what ... and find joy in the
   knowledge that God loves and accepts other
   people just as deeply no matter what!
- Can this church be a banquet table where everyone is invited elder and younger types alike? Can this place be so appealing, so compelling, because it is a place where all are celebrated and wanted and seen as beloved? Can this place be so incredibly Spirit-filled: Because it is a place for all. No exceptions?

The truth is we are all lost. But being lost is not all bad. Being lost can bring us to a new place if we are willing to admit we are lost and reach out for help and healing ... hope and direction. Will we choose the way of the Father in our story ... choose the way of extravagant love ... choose the way of grace?

The older brother is standing outside of the banquet hall. The father is inviting him in. What will he choose? What will we choose?

## Women of Influence Thursday, March 13th at 6:30PM ECOLIBRIUM3, 2014 West 3rd Street

League of Women Voters of Duluth invites you to meet and hear the story of an extraordinary advocate. This event is free and open to the public. Bring your friends and family!

Deyona Kirk, Executive Director and founder of Divine Konnections Inc. (DKI), is a BIPOC woman who has personally experienced homelessness. She was a mother at the age of 12, spent time in the foster care system, and was in and out of housing and domestic violence shelters throughout her young adult life. With the support of programs and people in the local

Duluth community, Deyona was the first in her family to get a full scholarship to college and go from homeless to homeowner. Her lived experience drives DKI's purpose and makes her a key expert in advising on the work being done.

Deyona has a degree in Organizational Behavior, is a certified nonprofit accountant, and has worked in leadership positions at nonprofits and housing authorities across the country for over 25 years. She is experienced in developing, managing, and reporting on seven-figure projects that are multi-funded and complex; involving a mixture of loans, grants, and historic tax credits. Deyona has an extensive history of providing care and support to teen mothers, women and children DV survivors, families and veterans experiencing homelessness, individuals who have been incarcerated, survivors of sexual exploitation and trafficking, and youth both in and aging out of foster care. She started her career at Women's Transitional Housing in Duluth. For over a decade she was the youngest and only Black female developer in the community. Deyona was part of an amazing team of women who developed, renovated, built, and managed some of the best renovation and new construction projects in several neighborhoods throughout Central Hillside, Lakeside, East/Endion, and West Duluth, including Alicia's Place, Sheila's Place, Eco Home, Lakeside Cottages, and others. After moving to Texas, Deyona established DKI in April of 2020 and, soon after, her tie to Minnesota brought her back to Duluth to develop affordable housing and provide culturally centered care to young BIPOC mothers. In honor of her own mother, Deyona opened Annie's House of Refuge & Restoration in May of 2022.

## Your landfill is closing

What would you do if there was nowhere to dispose of your waste? Think you don't have to worry about that? Think again. The Superior landfill is scheduled to close in mid-2026.

If you attend the Coppertop this affects you. If you live in the WLSSD catchment area this will affect you. This area

includes all of Greater Duluth, Carlton County and most of the North shore, Superior and parts of Douglas County.

I became a UMW Green Team Member and ultimately an Earthkeeper all because I loved the study of landfills: What goes in them, how those items break down and produce methane gas and other toxins and how a landfill affects wildlife and humans.

When I lived in Grand Forks, ND they needed to close the landfill because it was too close to the airport and too many scavenger birds were a risk. It was proposed that a new landfill be sited about 15 miles north. Well, that's near where my daughter lived with my ex-husband. Though most of the area near it was farmland. However, no one wants to live near or farm near a landfill. As a journalist, I attended countless public meetings and read countless studies of landfills and ways to manage waste. It's a huge topic.

When I was a little girl, we called them "dumps," the new and improved name is a "sanitary landfill."

According to the University of Colorado Environmental Center, "The United States has over 3,000 active landfills and 10,000 closed landfills. Landfills are necessary for the proper disposal of solid waste. They reduce the amount of waste that makes it into the environment, help prevent disease transmission and keep communities clean. However, landfills still have significant environmental and social impact. While landfills are a societal necessity, there are practices that can reduce the reliance on landfills and decrease their effect on the biosphere."

## Negative impacts of landfills:

Release of methane gas

While required to have plastic or clay lining, these liners tend to have leaks. This produces a leachate, a liquid which pollutes water.

Leachates contain a high amount of ammonia. This can cause dead zones for animals

## **Social Consequences:**

Higher risk of congenital defects to children born to families living near landfills Decreased value of land

Minorities and low income people are more likely to have their homes near landfills and hazardous waste sites.

Every time you refuse to use a single use item you are helping prevent the use of citing new landfills.

If you would like to have a more nuanced conversation about landfills, please find me sometime after church and we can visit over a cup of coffee.

## Your Trustees have been busy with projects!

Our generous community partner family is in agreement that our roof and windows are a top priority and have given us their approval to proceed. We are working with architects from LHB Inc and received proposals from two companies for water intrusion testing. We have shared our recommendation with Pastor Jeanine and she has shared it with our community partner family. We hope to begin testing as soon as the weather permits.

We are in the process of researching which Computerized Maintenance Management System (CMMS) would be the best fit for our needs and hope to make a decision later this year.

We have received a grant from the Greystone Foundation to upgrade our building's security. Research will begin in the near future.

The LED Project is moving along, with new bulbs installed in several main floor rooms and hallways. Lakeview Social Hall lighting is partially completed.

Exterior railings will be replaced at the main entrance later this spring.

You will see a request for your participation in spring painting elsewhere in this issue of First Family. We are hoping many of our members will give their service to this important project.

Recently completed projects include installation of a new water fountain (with bottle filler) in the Lakeview Social Hall, repair of the sewer pump, and air duct cleaning.

#### FROM OUR FAITH COMMUNITY NURSE

Greetings to All, As I write this it remains below 0, so very cold, which allows people to gather more indoors. My message to you is: if you're sick stay home. As many of you are aware COVID still circulates and will continue for time eternal, flu is rampant, and the number of pneumonia cases are high. If you have not received a flu vaccination, there is still time to do so. Seven out of 10 people have not received a flu injection. If you are a person with low immunity wear a mask and wash your hands. If you need medical care call your provider, or go to an urgent care if possible rather than an emergency department as waits there are quite long.

I also would like to share that measles has been in the news lately. Many know there is a measles outbreak now in Texas in a Mennonite community who usually don't vaccinate. By last count the number of individuals has doubled. I want to remind people that measles is highly communicable. Take for example if you were in a room say a large bedroom with a person who has measles, at least 18 people who shared their air space would be exposed and probably end up with measles if you hadn't been immunized. When data was more available from the CDC, measles vaccinations for all kindergarten children has gone down to less than 93%. That number should be at least 95% which signifies a large number of children to achieve what's called "herd immunity". Measles can spread easily to those who have not been immunized. Measles isn't just a rash, it can cause encephalitis, pneumonia and death. When you get vaccinated for measles it creates memory cells which are present if you are later exposed and these cells help to protect through your lifetime. Adults that were vaccinated as children do not need another vaccination.

I want to mention COVID again here too. It is desirable to get the boosters when available, especially for adults over 65 years old and those with chronic conditions-check with your health care provider. The vaccination for COVID does not create long-term memory cells, your body needs the antibodies that the vaccine helps your body to produce and more protection is needed as the antibodies don't stick around for much time. Those of you that have underlying conditions check with your health care providers as to their recommendation for you.
