

On The Journey With You

Thank you for giving me time in this last two weeks to be with my dad, and in the time since then showing much love and patience as I am walking through the grieving process. A special thank you to Rev. MaryAnne Korsch who covered worship services and other pastoral needs, the rest of the staff, and others who made things happen in my absence. I am understanding more deeply than before the profound grief so many of you have experienced, and are experiencing. I am thankful we are here for each other.

Thank you for your outpouring of gestures of love and care for my family and your expressions of admiration and gratitude for my dad, Patrick Alexander. The two memorials we chose in dad's name are:

- CHUM Food Shelf. They are in great need of food donations, and especially money donations. Because of the state of the economy and the high cost of food they used to be able to purchase \$7 worth of food for every dollar we donated, now they can purchase \$3 of food for each dollar we donate. You can imagine the impact of that, and at a time when the need for food is increasingly significantly. A reminder that we have a cart at church for your food donations and we have special focus on bringing food (or financial gifts) for the food shelf on communion Sundays. You may also make financial donations through the church. Additionally our congregation also makes a monthly gift to CHUM.
- Amsoil Northland Law Enforcement K9 Foundation. K9s put their lives on the line for their human partners, track felons, search for and rescue lost people, and sniff out drugs, weapons and critical evidence. K9s are invaluable members of our law enforcement teams. They make officers' jobs safer, and help those officers work more efficiently because, with the K9's sharp sense of smell, it can detect suspects and evidence much more quickly than a person ever could.



I am delighted that several thousand dollars have been contributed to each of these worthy causes in the name of my dad. That makes me feel so happy as I know he would be pleased by this.

Many of you know my dad and mom sat in the back of this church for many years, and in recent years, due to his health, worshipped on line together. One of the Scriptures we included in dad's service is from Philippians 4. It talks about being gentle, not worrying, but instead praying. It implores us to focus on all that is true, honorable, just, pure, pleasing, commendable, excellent and worthy of praise. And it promises us if we do this, the God of peace will be with us. This is a Scripture that reflects my dad well. He lived his life for others was generous, gracious and understanding. He was always helping others. He never held a grudge. He easily forgave. I never heard him talk negatively about anyone. His life is a model for faithful, peaceful living.

My dad had the deep and hope-filled confidence that though his earthly journey was ending, his life continues – he promised to always love us and watch over us. God promises us all the same thing – promises to surround and comfort us. Promises us that nothing, not even death, can separate us from love, and that nothing can eternally separate us from each other. Let's cling to that hope together! **On the journey with you! For the healing of the nations, Lord, we pray with one accord, for a just and equal sharing of the things that earth affords, to a life of love in action help us rise and pledge our word.



Reduce your fiber waste to reduce your garbage!

Are you wanting to reduce your garbage? Would you like to know about a new way to keep your old fibers (clothes, sheets, and so on) out of landfills?

The company Trashie.com offers "Take Back Bags" as an easy way to keep fibers out of landfills. Trashie has an innovative sorting and grading system that diverts 90% of unwanted clothing and textiles to the next right place. Some of it is given to homeless shelters, some is taken apart and reused, and only a small amount ends up in landfill. They accept clothing (anyone thinking of spring cleaning your closets??), shoes and boots of all kinds, home goods like towels, robes, sheets, comforters, and blankets, backpacks, purses, belts, hats, helmets, jewelry, and costumes etc.

"I would prefer to win, but struggle is about much more than winning. It always has been. And there is nothing revolutionary about fatalism. I suppose the question is, are vou antifascist? Are vou a revolutionary? Are you a defender of decency and life on Earth? Because no one who is any of those things has ever had the odds on their side. But you know what we do have? 
