One of our recent college grads shared this story: A man was asked to paint a boat. He brought his paint and brushes and began to paint the boat a bright red, as the owner asked him. While painting, he noticed a small hole in the hull, and quietly repaired it. When he finished painting, he received his money and left. The next day, the owner of the boat came to the painter and presented him with a check, much higher than the payment for painting. The painter was surprised and said "You've already paid me for painting the boat!" The boat owner answered, "But this is not for the paint job. It's for repairing the hole in the boat." "Ah! But it was such a small service... certainly it's not worth paying me such a high amount for something so insignificant." "My friend, when I asked you to paint the boat, I forgot to mention the hole. When the boat dried, my kids took the boat and went on a fishing trip. They did not know that there was a hole. I was not at home at that time. When I returned and noticed they had taken the boat, I was desperate because I remembered that the boat had a hole. Imagine my relief and joy when I saw them returning from fishing. Then, I examined the boat and found that you had repaired the hole! You see, now, what you did? You saved the life of my children! I do not have enough money to pay your 'small' good deed."



No matter who, when or how, let's actively look for ways to help, sustain, wipe tears, listen attentively, encourage, and carefully repair all the 'leaks' we find. We never know who is in need, or when God holds a pleasant surprise for us to be helpful and important to someone. Along the way, with our actions of care and compassion, we may help repair many 'boat holes' for others without realizing how many lives we have blessed and maybe even saved.

From Our Faith Community Nurse

Arrowhead Agency on Aging/Arrowhead Changemakers

Area Agencies on Aging (AAAAs) were established under the Older Americans Act. Our agency located in Duluth carries out a localized plan for long-term services and supports customized services for our region for persons aged 60+. The region includes Aitkin, Carlton, Cook, Itasca, Koochiching, Lake and St Louis counties. This support and these services are supplied for this region based on information shared by the Arrowhead Changemakers-a group of ambassadors who are working towards an Age-Friendly Minnesota to end ageism. This is a volunteer group of community persons 50+ who make meaningful, lasting change in their communities. They bring local issues and experiences to inform the AAAA, the Governors Council on an Age-Friendly MN, and other local leaders working on policies and practices that prioritize quality of life as persons age and living longer. In the US, the number of people aged 65+ exceeds the number of children aged 5 and under. Keeping that in mind, you see that keeping people as healthy as possible as they live longer is a priority, especially now with cutbacks to Medicaid and Medicare looming. Access to health care will not be as readily available and we know that rural hospitals in some areas will close. Input from this volunteer group of Changemakers is even more vital now. One thing I agree with the new HHS director on is emphasis must be placed on chronic disease--its prevention.

Examples of what these changemakers can do are:

- Presentations to City Councils and elected officials to advocate for housing.
- · Contact local elected officials.
- Foster collaboration by group discussions with community leaders.
- Submit articles to local media informing them of aging advocacy.
- Help to develop campaigns on the end to ageism (discrimination, prejudice and negative stereotypes based on age).
- What can I bravely do today in service of something I'm passionate about?


Our faith and God's creation - what's the relationship?



Sandra Moe is graduating from Rocky Mountain College in Billings, Montana with a master's degree in physician assistant studies.







WLSSD rebrands to Resource Renew

This spring, Western Lake Superior Sanitary District (WLSSD), changed its name to Resource Renew—a name that better reflects its mission: transforming waste into something life-giving. Though, if you are one of the "cool kids" into sustainability, the letters WLSSD probably roll off your tongue. But others—especially those not steeped in the environmental world—might think WLSSD sounds more like a radio station.

"WLSSD is a difficult acronym, and it doesn't really explain what we do," said spokesperson AJ Axtell. Resource Renew better captures what the agency is all about.

Resource Renew is now generating its own electricity.

Biogas pulled from digesters that break down organic waste is about 65% methane. Rather than flaring it off as waste, the agency now routes it into large engines that produce electricity. Have you ever noticed a flame while driving over the Blatnik Bridge? That is the biogas flare. You will no longer see it as that gas is now being put to work for a greater good.

Founded nearly 50 years ago to clean up the St. Louis River, the agency leads regional efforts in sustainable waste and water management. Its work includes composting, hazardous waste handling, recycling, and education—all focused on renewing creation.

While the legal name WLSSD still applies in government settings, Resource Renew now tells the public story: a mission of stewardship, not just sewage.

"We're not just about sewage—we're about sustainability," Axtell said.

And speaking of renewal, there's been a leadership transition, too. Longtime executive director Marianne Bohren has retired, and Carrie Clement has stepped into the role.

Freedom from addiction starts here.


