

From Bishop Lanette Plambeck ~ We Need a Better Way ~



The killing of Charlie Kirk stops us in our tracks. A life ended by political violence is not simply a headline - it is a rupture in the body of our nation, a wound to our shared humanity, a grief that must be named. And this is not the first time. We remember Gabby Giffords, shot while meeting her constituents. We recall the congressional baseball field turned battleground. We lament the assaults on Rand Paul and Paul Pelosi in their own homes, the assassination attempt on now-President Donald Trump, the death of Minnesota's Rep. Melissa and Mark Hortman, and amid all of this we cannot ignore the epidemic of school shootings plaguing this country most recently at Annunciation days ago and in Evergreen, Colorado today. We must also name the long shadow of racialized violence. From the killing of George Floyd here in Minnesota to the murders at Mother Emanuel AME Church in Charleston, from Buffalo's grocery store to Jacksonville's Dollar General, violence fueled by racism continues to poison our land.

These wounds are not separate; they are threads of the same tapestry of hate, fear, and division.

This past week, after my return from the Dakotas, I turned on CNN, Fox, and MSNBC - watching each for 30 minutes or more. Three channels. Three different spins. And yet one common thread: an undercurrent of us vs them, right vs left, good vs evil, liberal vs conservative. Even our news can seduce us into categories that divide, inflame, and harden our hearts. We must be cautious, discerning not only of the violence in our streets, but of the voices we choose to follow in our homes. Bias is real. Narrative is powerful.

And the stories we consume shape the lives we live, the opinions we hold, and who we see as friend or foe. As a priest, I hold all this before God in prayer. I invite you to join me in lifting these names, these lives, and this wounded nation into the hands of the One who heals the brokenhearted and binds up their wounds (Psalm 147:3).

As a pastor, I ache with you. Fear grows when we cannot trust that schools are safe, that homes are sanctuaries, that political disagreements will not end in death, that skin color will not make someone a target, that even our sources of information will not deepen division. Yet even in our fear, we are not alone. The Spirit of Christ remains in our midst, whispering, "Do not be afraid, for I am with you."

As a prophet, I must speak plainly: violence - political, racial, or domestic - is not the way of Christ, nor is it worthy of a people who claim liberty and justice for all. The normalization of guns, the idolization of power, the demonization of opponents, the dehumanization of neighbors, and the manipulation of truth - these are false gods demanding sacrifice. We must repent, we must turn, we must choose life. To lawmakers, to leaders, to neighbors alike: now is the time for courage, accountability, and change.

And as a poet, I dream still. I dream of a nation that listens more than it shouts, that builds bridges instead of barricades, that dares to believe our better angels can rise again. I dream of plowshares where once there were swords, of children who can sing without fear, of streets where love is louder than gunfire, of communities where no one is hunted down because of the color of their skin, and of citizens who hunger more for truth than for outrage.

Let us refuse the voices that divide us. Let us resist the powers that pit us against one another.

Let us walk instead in the way of Jesus - who turns mourning into dancing, strangers into neighbors, and enemies into friends.

This is not naïve hope. It is the deepest truth of our faith: that light shines in the darkness and the darkness cannot overcome it, that love is stronger than hate, that death does not have the final word, and that God's goodness and grace can heal the soul of humanity.

Beloved, the better way is before us.

By God's mercy, may we have the courage to walk in it - together.~ Bishop Lanette



A Faithful Walk: Rethinking How We Get Around

Many of you who live east of the church have seen me walking to Faith Forum on a Sunday morning. Some might think it's serendipitous that we live so close, but when Terry and I moved to Duluth in 2005, it was actually part of a plan.



When we were searching for our first Duluth home, I asked Terry if we could look for a place within walking distance of his job in Canal Park. We drew a radius around his work and eventually found a turn-of-the-century duplex in East Hillside. We loved both the architecture and the location.

Do you know what a Walk Score is? It's more than just having sidewalks. Walk Score measures how easy it is to live at an address without relying on a car—how close you are to groceries, banks, restaurants, and transit.

In East Hillside, we could walk to the grocery store, the bank, a restaurant and the pharmacy. The bus stopped nearby. Terry rode it daily, and later biked down to Canal Park via the Lakewalk. Coming home uphill was tough, but we loved being so connected. That's why I felt a sense of loss when we later moved to Skyline Parkway. Suddenly, every errand required a car.


A friend once teased me about my buyer's remorse concerning walkability, "Pffft, you have a sidewalk!" True, but walkability is about much more than a sidewalk.

Recently, the sustainability committee shared ideas about how we get to church. One person observed, "We all drive here—or almost all. Naomi normally walks! But let's think about alternatives—cycling, car-pooling, walking, public transit."

When Terry and I moved from Grand Forks to Duluth, our new home had a Walk Score of 80 (Very Walkable). Most errands could be done on foot, and buses came every 20 minutes. Our current home scores 33 (Car-Dependent), buses are hourly. (In East Hillside, they had been every 20 minutes.)

When I lived in Seattle, I had a friend who looked for the words "close-in" when real estate shopping. She said this meant that even if it was far from downtown, it was still a short distance to grocery stores, libraries, medical facilities and other amenities.

My challenge to you: the next time you move, consider whether your new home is walkable—or at least "close-in."



As people of faith, we're called not just to walk humbly with God, but to consider how our daily choices shape the well-being of our community. Greetings, I would like to offer information about Faith Community Nursing (FCN) aka (Parish Nursing). I have been serving and ministering to people of this church for many

years! This form of nursing was created long ago with the early church. In the Gospel of Mark, the Greek word Sodoz is used which can be translated as to save, to heal, and to make whole.

The purpose of serving in this capacity is to respond to the unique needs of the congregation blending nursing and faith. All FCN's minister to individuals and families using health education, spiritual resources and community resources to promote wellness of body, mind, and spirit; a holistic approach as was the very nature of the early church to be a healing community.

Issues of health are basic to all people. We all struggle with illnesses, stress, injury and loss. Most of us have the desire to function to the best of our abilities. In my roll I, with the assistance of Pastor Jeanine and Deacon Mary Ann Korsch provide comfort, prayer, support, encouragement, and offer resources which can be of help to those we minister.

Through the years we have had a team of individuals and couples who have been instrumental in helping to provide care and concern, support and prayer by phoning, doing visits in homes, hospitals, and extended care or rehab facilities to those in need or to those unable to get to church.

It is now time to seek more people to help serve on our care ministry team previously known as Lay Pastors. This team offers care and ongoing visitation and response for those who desire prayer and connection through times of illness, aging, or struggles.

If this kind of mission is something you would like to gain more information about, you can contact the office if you are interested in my absence and I will get back to you when I return. This is a very important ministry that can be provided by our this team serving our church community.

We also have an ongoing prayer team which the Donahue's have maintained. You can join that team also. I look forward to talking to some of you this month to answer your questions and provide information. The Denfeld Historic Organ Restoration & Preservation Alliance has been laying groundwork for the restoration and preservation of the Denfeld auditorium organ for almost 4 years.

DHORPA is funded through grants, alumni, groups, and individuals. The fundraising dinner for the Denfeld Music Department and its students and DHORPA is known as "Dining at Denfeld", Friday, October 24 between 5-7 pm. The purpose of DHORPA is to help build community, and a space of hope and community building, supporting the surrounding region and beyond. You are invited to come to the dinner on Friday, October 24, 5-7 pm. For tickets and Denfeld's history, go to www.dhorpa.org. Ticket prices: \$10 for adults and \$5 for students and youth.

The organ was purchased for the whole of Duluth, when the new school's construction of 1926 was completed. In 1927, the auditorium organ was completed, and purchased the organ the four manual (keyboard plus pedal board) by area residents, students, teachers, and merchants from the St. Paul Capitol Theater for \$25,000. This was after a period of pain from the first World War. An observation: the gift of music has brought people together in many difficult situations. What would the world be like without music?

2025 An Early Reminder about Scholarships

The Ardath Gibson Scholarship Selection
Committee is inviting all eligible students to plan ahead. To be eligible to apply for the Ardath
Gibson Scholarship, one must be a member of
First United Methodist Church or someone who has family who are members. The applicant must be pursuing at the undergraduate or graduate level a degree in health care, physical sciences, or business. The Ardath Gibson Memorial
Scholarship Selection Committee will have discretion in determining if the applicant's studies meet these criteria. To apply, one must have a GPA of 3.0 or above.

The Memorial Funds Committee is delighted to announce that for the first time The Margaret Swanberg Scholarship will be open for application. To be eligible for the Margaret Swanberg Scholarship, the applicant must be:

- A woman (divorced, widowed, single parent)
 who needs to return to school to be trained or
 retrained to find a suitable job in the working
 world, or
- A student graduating from high school who wishes to prepare to become a minister, Christian education director, counselor, or social worker, or
- A student graduating from high school who wishes to become an early education teacher, kindergarten teacher, or primary school teacher.

The Margaret Swanberg Scholarship Selection Committee will have discretion in determining if the applicant's studies meet these criteria. The application and selection process occurs during November. As part of the application process, the applicant will be required to submit two letters of recommendation from unrelated adults who know the applicant well.

The First United Methodist Church's Memorial Funds Committee, who oversees the Ardath Gibson Scholarship Fund and the Margaret Swanberg Fund, encourages all individuals who meet the criteria to apply.

There will be a formal announcement in the First Family Newsletter detailing the criteria, the application process, and the award date. Stay tuned.

Application Forms will be available on the church's website on November 1, 2025. They will need to be fully completed and turned in by 4pm on Friday, November 21.

Applicants will need to compile all materials (completed application form, transcripts, recommendations, and candidate statement) into a single electronic file and send to Terry Wallin at teto62@charter.net.

Previous scholarship recipients are expected to provide letters of recommendation that have not been previously submitted.

The Lennon-Berini Scholarships for 2025 will be \$2000 each.

Incomplete applications will not be considered. The scholarships will be awarded during a worship service at the end of December.







"The Dance Boots", Linda LeGarde Grover, 2010.



Shelter expansion shifts use of building spaces

With funding from the federal government and the state of Minnesota, renovation and construction work to upgrade and expand Chum's main building starts in October. Work will be completed in 12–18 months. The new facility will provide 168 beds and more room for continued support.

Surround Chum with your prayers this month as we transition our Drop-in Center and Shelter from 1st Avenue West to the Damiano building on 4th Street. Damiano's third floor has been renovated with county funds for Chum's temporary use during construction.

The Chum office will move to our recently purchased building at 25 West 1st Street. Right around the corner from the current location, this building will provide office space for Chum staff and be a location to receive donations of winter gear, coats/jackets, etc.

Buying the building saves costs and makes more cash available for Chum programs. Money we have been paying to lease office space will help cover monthly payments. Also, potential retail space on the first floor can bring in rent revenue. This building is an asset that can be sold or used for another purpose once Chum's Shelter

Expansion Project is complete. A grant secured by Chum's HUB Team helped make thispurchase possible. Note: HUB programs promote increased participation in government contracting and procurement processes by historically underutilized businesses (HUBs). These programs, often at the state or federal level, aim to support small businesses owned by minorities and women.

Safe Bay success stories

In August, a Safe Bay client had brake trouble. A Chum outreach worker contacted Kenwood Muffler who not only got the brakes working again, but also donated to the repair! What a blessing to have people in our community who will step up and help a stranger.

In September, three Safe Bay clients moved from living in their vehicles to indoor housing!

UCare grant brings dental care

About 50 people per day stop into Chum's Health and Wellness Office for various needs, about 10% of which are dental concerns. With a Dental Access Grant from The UCare Foundation our Health and Wellness Office was able to help schedule 105 dental appointments with free transportation for people staying in our shelters or residing at Steve O'Neil or St. Francis Apartments.



Trustees' Tidbits

Your Trustees have had a busy summer filled with projects!

We continue our work with LHB Architectural and Engineering firm and our Community Partner regarding our leaking sanctuary. BPL Enclosure conducted window forensic testing on June 10 and 11, 2025 and recommends we replace the sloped window units with a new sloped glazing system and provide a shading system on at least three sides of the sanctuary. Fortunately, the roof itself does not need to be replaced for at least 10 years. We are in the process of creating a scope and sequence of work and will be entertaining bids for window replacement.

Mid-August, we also had acoustic testing completed by Reidel & Associates in the Sanctuary (funded by an angel from our congregation) and we are awaiting the results.

Pastor Jeanine's brother, Nick Alexander, conducted a security assessment of FUMC. We will be analyzing the assessment and are researching coded security systems for the safety of both our congregation and University Nursery School.

The LED lighting project is now complete and you can truly "see" the difference in brightness. Thank you to all of you who donated money for the project. And a huge thanks to Joel Smith, Tom Brown, Alex Flinner, Dave Johnson, Randy Bowen, Daryl Harper, Claude Williams, Gary Fortney for installing the lightbulbs. New lights for the Three Brothers Chapel have also been ordered and will be installed when the electrician is available.

A waste water pump failed in the spring and has been replaced. Our second pump is old, so we have purchased a second pump and will have it installed soon.


Interior painting was completed the last two weeks of August. Thanks to another congregational angel, multiple rooms (including the Lakeview Social Hall) and hallways were painted. In addition, a group of church members funded new curtain panels for the Lakeview Social Hall and that well-used space really looks wonderful!

Multiple dead ash trees were removed from our property, which has improved the safety of the University Nursery School playground and has opened the view along the lake. The overgrown shrubs along the east side by the Library and Bell Room windows were also removed.

Railing replacement in the front entry of the church has been completed and is now solid for use and looks much more inviting.

Larry and his nursery team have converted the old movie room into additional nursery space for the expanding group of children in the church. With assistance from Todd Kurth, the carpet has been updated where the chairs used to be. Larry painted the walls and everything has been refreshed. Abbi asked the congregation for furniture, toys and other equipment and you stepped up. Thanks to all that donated to this new nursery space. The children will truly enjoy it!

Autumn Word Search




